ARCHKids Program gets brand new space

The Arizona Recreation Center for the Handicapped (ARCH) recently kicked off construction on a dedicated space for its ARCHKids program with a ceremonial groundbreaking on Jan. 22, shining a spotlight on the Phoenix-based nonprofit and the service it provides for children and adults with disabilities.

More than 50 community leaders and ARCH supporters were in attendance for a day that was years in the making.

ARCH first opened its doors in 1975 and has been a hub of activity in the special needs community for decades. The nonprofit provides therapeutic recreation, socialization opportunities, health and wellness programs, and life skills education. Programs for children, teens and adults are offered simultaneously at the 5-acre main campus, located at 1550 W. Colter St., and the stream of participants coming and going is constant; nearly 300 individuals pass through

Local nonprofits putting people to work

Need a cup of coffee? How about a custom made T-shirt? Two Phoenix nonprofits are offering more than just a sale—they're training formerly homeless people vital job skills so they can get back on their feet and work.

Tumbleweed Center for Homeless Youth takes a group of people ages 18 to 25 and trains them on how to make custom screenprinted T-shirts at its new TumbleTees operation, located near 7th Street and Osborn Road.

"TumbleTees is a full-scale commercial storefront design and production center," says Ashley Wain, general manager. "Yet TumbleTees is much more than a screen printing shop. It is an opportunity for youth to escape the trauma of abuse, exploitation and fear that accompany life on the streets. It is a place where they are promised an opportunity to receive the power, and the paycheck."

Each youth earns minimum wage. They also get additional training.

"First they get life skills training," explains Rick Fresia, chief operating officer, "such as how to carry themselves, be on time (for work), anger management, budgets, etc." He says employers tell him two big issues they have with hiring homeless or at-risk youth revolve around showing up on time and not fighting with co-workers. The TumbleTees program addresses those issues and more.

If an organization wants to order customized T-shirts, polo shirts or, as Wain puts it, "anything that lays flat," TumbleTees can fill your order. The shop can even help you with a design if you aren't sure what you want in addition to your name on the shirt. The cost is based on how many colors you want on your shirt and how many shirts you need. All prices are listed on the website: www.tumbletees.com. If you agree to have the TumbleTees logo printed on the shirts, you get a small discount. Other nonprofits also receive a discount.

Listing a home for sale

First of all, thanks again to all of you for allowing me sell 170 homes in 2014 and 19 homes so far in 2015! It is always a challenge to start over every



year with my sales and new listings but I could not do without my North Central neighbors.

My biggest challenge when listing a client's home is agreeing

on the price with the seller that is realistic to get showings and, more importantly, an offer. Since I have sold more than 1,500 homes in North Central, many of them more than once, I have a pretty good idea what the value will be, although remodeling will change that value and also neighborhood prices. I have never had a seller tell me that they just want to sell it for lower than the market will support. My latest challenge going into my listing appointments is that 1 word that begins with a "Z" Zillow

Zillow is the most popular online real estate information site with 73 million unique visitors just in December. Zillow lists active listings for sale as well as information on houses that are not on the market with their "Zestimate." Herein lies the problem with the public .. Realtors and appraisers do not use Zillow because it is not an accurate source. Zestimates have a median error rate of about 8 percent. On a \$600,000 home, that would be \$48,000. In some parts of the country, Zestimate values have ranged from 12 to 25 percent off the final sales price and in some sales, as much as 50 percent off. I understand that Zillow is

made easily available for the general public but a more reliable source is your Realtor and the checks and balances in the end will be the appraiser. Look at Zillow as the starting point in pricing discussions but trust the authorities on local real estate values—experienced agents and appraisers

Another difficult issue involves the sellers who said they paid X dollars for their home in 2005 when the market was crazy and expect to get more money than they paid, which often is not always the case. The other difficult issue is when sellers say they need a net number on their sale to pay for private schools and or college and my reply is "Here are the comps" to support a certain number, knowing that the appraisers will never support a number that just does not comp out. I was fortunate in 2014 to list around 190 homes and sold 170 homes...some of those homes are still active on the market. Certainly I have made mistakes on evaluations because sometimes it does matter which appraiser we get to evaluate the home, since their job is difficult if an area has not had much

Free tax filing help for lower incomes

The city of Phoenix Human Services Department has launched its Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) campaign to help low- and moderate-income working families who earned less than \$53,000 in 2014 with free tax-filing services and an EITC tax credit up to \$6,143.

Individuals and families who qualify also may be able to file for the child tax credit, dependent care credit and the education tax credit at the city's free tax preparation sites.

Fourteen primary sites, located in Phoenix, offer free tax-filing services. A list of Phoenix sites, including hours and days of operation, is available at phoenix.gov/eitc. It is important to note that hours and days of operation vary for different locations.

Taxpayers must bring a picture ID for themselves and spouse, Social Security cards and/or Individual Tax Identification Number cards for all household members, proof of income—including W-2s and 1099 Retirement Income—information for other income, 1095-A verification of medical insurance premium tax credit, verification of all deductions/credits and the amount of money paid to child care provider (if applicable). If filing jointly, both adults must be present to sign the return.

For information about the city of Phoenix EITC program, call 1-877-211-8661.

In addition, the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program will provide free assis-

tance with tax preparation for those with low to moderate income. People do not need to be a member of AARP or a retiree to use this service.

AARP Foundation Tax-Aide volunteers are trained and IRS-certified each year to ensure their knowledge of revisions to the U.S. tax code. The program will be offered this year at more than 70 sites statewide including senior centers, libraries and other convenient locations.

the doors each week.

In recent years, ARCH experienced a 30-percent increase in program attendance largely due to state budget cuts that affected other service providers. "As participation in our adult programs increased—particularly our Adult Drop In program—we were suddenly bursting at the seams," says ARCH Program Director Vera Martinez. "It was clear that we needed a dedicated space for the kids program, ensuring that we would be able to accommodate the unique needs of the various age groups relying on ARCH for supervision."

ARCHKids provides after school and respite care when school is not in session and is widely popular for working parents because of its extended hours.

"It's difficult for families to coordinate care for special-needs kids, particularly high school students because there are few programs available," says Cynthia Bennett, board president of ARCH and a longtime North Central resident. Her son, Brian, participated in ARCHKids for while in high school and Bennett explains that leaving a teenager with special needs home alone is simply not an option for families.

With the help of community leaders, the possibility of a dedicated space was realized. In 2014, ARCH was a recipient of the Arizona Diamondbacks \$100,000 Grand Slam Award, which helped to fund the new space. Contributions from The BHHS Legacy Foundation and Del E. Webb Foundation also helped with early

funding for the expansion, and the city of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department has been instrumental.

The new ARCHKids area represents 2,000 square feet dedicated to programs for children and teens and will include a computer lab, relaxation station and a large activity area, as well as restrooms and prep area. The new space will be able to accommodate the program's existing needs and will allow for future growth.

"This is an exciting time for ARCH and we're incredibly grateful for the community partners and funders who stepped forward to make this new building a reality," Bennett said. "We're thrilled about the new space the possibility of serving even more families."

The ARCHKids Dedicated Space will be complete in early September and will be commemorated with a Grand Opening Celebration in the fall.

TumbleTees also can come to your event. Recently the Phoenix Art Museum held an event and had T-shirts made on the spot for guests. Fresia says they take a manual machine for off-site events. Since each event is a little different, contact TumbleTees directly for pricing on such services.

All proceeds go right back into the main organization and that's important for the future growth of both organizations. Fresia points out that, "If we sell 10,000 T-shirts every month, we will make about \$200,000 in profits for Tumbleweed in a year." Another way to look at how your purchase can help the organization is that every order of 280 shirts will provide a homeless young adult room and meals for one week in a transitional shelter.

TumbleTees is located at 3508 N. 7th St., Suite 140. Hours are 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. For more information, call 602-257-4454 or visit www.tumbletees.com.

Another local program is helping the homeless learn how to work a register, make a cappuccino, and fold up a breakfast burrito.

"You have helped me gain the skills I need to be successful and employed," writes Michael, a graduate of the barista program offered by UMOM New Day Centers. He now works at Helpings Café, Catering and Market, 3333 E. Van Buren St. Like TumbleTees, this program offers job skills training to formerly homeless people. UMOM helps all families, not just single mothers but also single fathers and even grandparents raising grandchildren.

Helpings Café opened a year ago in April. UMOM signed a contract with Starbucks to purchase and serve the well-known company's coffee and train dozens of people in the intricate world of gourmet coffee. In the morning you can order breakfast burritos or enjoy several varieties of freshly made muffins. Lunch is also served and there are several salads on the menu as well as a hot meal.

The barista program also offers childcare to parents so they can learn the skills and not worry about where or how they will cover childcare. So far 28 individuals have graduated from the barista program.

"As part of their training they go through assisting with our catering," says Jessica Palacio, director of marketing for UMOM. Catering jobs can be as small as 10 people for breakfast or lunch or up to 100 people for dinner. "We book through our corporate partnerships," explains Palacio. "It's been a really successful model. We had a really good first year."

She's proud to point out that one graduate is now working at a Starbucks in Tempe. "We know our service and trainings are working."

Besides learning how to make a good latte, the workers learn customer service skills as well as assisting with taking phone orders and putting together food items for catering jobs.

Help celebrate the one-year anniversary in April by bringing this article to Helpings Café to get a BOGO (buy one get one free) beverage of your choice. If you forget the newspaper, just mention you saw it in North Central News, says Palacio.



North Central beauty up for sale ... again

When Chris and Katinka Bryson saw the home at 7110 N. Central Ave. was for sale, they couldn't resist the lure of both a good investment—and the chance to live on a property rich in both history and beauty.

The home, originally built in 1951 and added onto significantly over the years, was the childhood residence of Cindy McCain, whose father, Jim Hensley, founded Hensley & Company in 1955. This liquor distribution enterprise has become one of the largest companies in Arizona by selling brands of Anheuser-Busch beer.

Sen. John McCain and wife Cindy raised their family in the home and decided to downsize in 2006, selling the nearly 3-acre estate for \$3.2 million—at that time, the highest price ever paid for a home in the North Central area.

The new owners were Las Vegas investors and sunk nearly \$1 million into the home to make it more "resort-like,"

and add a little Vegas glitz and glamour. When Sen. McCain ran for president in 2008, the investors hoped to cash in on his public image and profile—they were betting on making big bucks if he won the U.S. presidency. After turning down

a \$6.5 million offer, the results of the election came in and the offers on the home evaporated. A foreclosure notice from the bank soon followed.

In the meantime, the investors let the home out to renters, who did some dam-

age. The home was eventually sold in November 2011 to the Brysons in a short sale for \$1.8 million, but a lot of work had to been done, including replacing the high-end custom kitchen appliances that had been removed by the former owners. In addition, the grounds and the pool were in great disrepair.

The Brysons spent nearly \$400,000 to bring the home back to its original beauty, fixing the damage, repairing the roof, repainting the exterior, and even upgrading the security system. But a 13-bedroom home with acres of property is a lot to maintain.

The Brysons decided in 2014 to put the renovated home back on the market. It currently is listed for \$2.5 million.

The real estate agent is the same one who sold it for the McCains and the Las Vegas investors—Bobby Lieb of HomeSmart Elite Group (www.centralphx.com).

"This is a one-of-a-kind North Central estate with a lot of history and heritage," pointed out Lieb when the home was for sale in 2011. "It would be a shame for some out-of-town investor to tear this home down and build a

frame and stucco home with tile roof, considering the charm and style that this home has."

Lieb says the biggest challenges in selling this home are its uniqueness, and its size. "You don't see a lot of 14,000-square-foot homes in this area," Lieb explains. And while the "historic" nature of the home and its many original features would appeal to many, the very scale of the home could be daunting.

He adds that longtime residents in the North Central community generally don't like it when an older home gets torn down on a large lot, and three homes are put up in its place. But often that is what the underlying zoning allows for by right, and also, the seller wants to get the best profit he can, and the buyer wants to maximize his investment if he isn't planning on actually occupying the home. It's a reality of today's real estate market.

Both the sellers and Lieb are hopeful that the "right" buyer will come along who will appreciate the home as it is now, with all its charm and history.



Grant funds help rehab historic homes

The city of Phoenix Historic Preservation Office is accepting new Exterior applications for its Rehabilitation Grant Program. The program provides funding for repair and restoration work on historic homes. Owners of properties located in city-designated historic districts or individually listed on the city's historic property register are eligible to apply.

The program reimburses owners on 50-50 matching basis for preapproved work with grant funding between \$5,000 and \$10,000 per project. In exchange for receiving financial assistance, the property owner agrees to sell the city a conservation easement to protect the historic character of the property's exteriors.

A successful project is one that retains and preserves as much of the original historic fabric as possible while maintaining the historic, characterdefining architectural elements of the home. Eligible projects include items such as foundation repair, roofing repair or replacement, masonry repointing, stucco repair, window and door repair and removal of non-historic additions.

Two businesses turn to crowdfunding for help

Two longtime Valley businesses are using a crowdfunding website to bring in much-needed revenues that will help guide their respective futures. And they have a lot on the line, because with Kickstarter, you either make your goal 100 percent, or you get nothing.

Mary Coyle Ol' Fashioned Ice Cream, which shuttered its doors last year, had been a staple for North Central families since 1951, when the Coyle family moved to Phoenix from Akron, Ohio. Serving its signature homemade ice cream, as well as lunch and dinner selections, the building and business changed hands in 2011 when Phoenix resident and loyal customer Mike Stoffey bought it, with the hope of reviving the sagging business.

However, after refreshing both the décor and the food menu, business still continued to lag behind increasing costs, and Stoffey was forced to close in September 2014.

But the ice cream shop's following continues to remain strong and the Mary Coyle Facebook page is filled with fond memories, nostalgia, and a staunch hope that the popular ice cream will one day return.

A recent post to the Facebook page announced the launch of the Kickstarter campaign, with the goal of raising \$45,000 to make Mary Coyle ice cream a mobile product.

Stoffey envisions the new Mary Coyle as a good ol' fashion ice cream truck, serving real ice cream scoops all over Phoenix. But first he needs the community's help to purchase a used truck, outfit it with some freezers and other gear needed to scoop the ice cream, dress it up in the Mary Coyle colors, and put it on the road.

"I'm putting up the location to make the ice cream myself," Stoffey explained.

Once the project is funded, Stoffey expects to have the truck on the road 90 days after that.

"We'll be competing with everyone else on the road serving dessert, but we think our product is unique and that people love it, so we'll be able to handle the competition," Stoffey said.

The Kickstarter campaign will run through March 28. For a \$5 pledge you get a free scoop of ice cream, and there are various levels of donation up to \$10,000, which can get your name on the truck as a sponsor (only 3 available). For more information, visit http://kck.st/1KNLUrY.

Another longtime Valley business also will be closing its doors shortly, but only to move to a new site around the corner. The move comes not by choice but by necessity, as All About Books and Comics lost its lease and has



to find a more affordable space for its hundreds of thousands of comics, collectibles and more.

All About Books and Comics, 5060 N. Central Ave., has been in business in uptown Phoenix since 1973 and has a rich history as the oldest comic book store in the Valley, with more than 4,000 square feet devoted to comics from 1940 to the present.

Now the owners are renovating not one but two adjacent spaces in the small strip center less than a quarter mile away, at 24 W. Camelback Road. "It had to be close because we wanted to keep our existing customer base," explained Alan Giroux, who owns the shop with his wife, Marsha.



Nursing students make pillow hearts

Students in the Medical Assisting program at Carrington College's Phoenix North Campus on Feb. 17 delivered 400 homemade heart-shaped pillows to Phoenix Children's Hospital (PCH).

The community outreach was part of Carrington's Heart Pillow Project, which aims to raise awareness of congenital heart defects. As part of the program, now in its sixth year, the pillows are cut, sewn, stuffed and stitched by students, staff and faculty to donate to the children at PCH over the course of six weeks. And, to bring a smile to each child's face, they also attach cards of encouragement to each pillow with a ribbon and pin.

"Not only is the message included with the pillow meant to be inspirational, but the pillow will have a practical use," said Traci Chace, medical assisting instructor with Carrington College's Phoenix North campus. "For some patients, the pillow will be placed under the back of their necks so their heads can be tilted back to change the breathing apparatus. For others, a pillow helps patients who cough to sit up and hold on to the pillow and cough. It helps children because it's something to cuddle with, and it helps the parents by having something to hang on to."

Although the pillow project is intended to raise awareness of congenital heart defects, young patients with other ailments also received pillows.

According to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, congenital heart defects are considered to be the most common birth defects in the United States, affecting 1 in 100 births each year, and are a leading cause of birth defect-related deaths worldwide.

"Despite the fact that congenital heart defects affect approximately 1.8 million families in the United States, a relatively small amount of funding is currently available for parent/patient educational services, research, and support," says Chace.

This project is one of many the local campus undertakes each year as part of its Carrington Cares community outreach program. Vocal group seeks help for NYC trip

Senior Living Protect your identity during busy tax season

The AARP Fraud Watch Network has launched an education effort to help people protect themselves from tax scams, releasing a new video, a tip sheet and encouraging people to take advantage of AARP's free tax preparation services.

Many taxpayers are putting themselves at greater risk of tax identity theft, according to a recent national study released by the AARP Fraud Watch Network in conjunction with the education campaign to help prevent scammers from stealing Arizonans hard-earned money.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, Arizona ranks seventh in the nation in the number of I.D. theft complaints reported. Scammers can electronically file a tax return under someone else's name to collect their tax refund by using their birth date and Social Security number. Many taxpayers make their personal information easy pickings by:

- Failing to lock their mailbox: Almost six in 10 (59 percent) Americans do not regularly lock their mailbox, which leaves them open to a criminal stealing bills, tax forms and other documents that contain personal information.
- Leaving valuables exposed: Over half (54 percent) of Americans have left at least one valuable personal item in their car in the last week (e.g., a purse/wallet, paystub, laptop) that could be used to steal their identity.
- Failing to destroy personal information: More than one in five (21 percent) Americans say they never shred any of their personal documents that could be used to steal their identity.

If you want to help keep your identity safe from potential scammers, don't give out personal information unless you know who's asking for it and why they need it. Also, regularly shred personal and financial documents



Café Chat

New eatery walks on the 'wild' side

By Teri Carnicelli

Carnivores and "foodies" alike have a new reason to dine out in Phoenix, with last fall's opening of Wild Game Grill.

The niche eatery at 2445 E. Thomas Road offers an intriguing assortment of "game meats" along with traditional restaurant fare such as classic burgers, sandwiches and salads. But for those in a more adventurous frame of mind, there are selections such as the wild boar and pork carnitas; the bison and fontina cheese quesadilla; elk, venison and bison brats; Rocky Mountain oysters; open-faced rabbit sloppy joe; and a melt-in-your-mouth tender wild game steak.

All of the meats are free-range, high-protein and organic.

"When you begin to see Costco offering wild game in the meat department, you know people are looking for clean, healthy food options," says Michelle McGee, partner and cofounder of Wild Game Grill. "But not everyone has time to buy and experiment in the kitchen. That's where Wild Game Grill comes in. It's a place for delicious food that's good for you, and perfect for the healthy-minded and adventurous types."

Ryan Mirau, a co-owner of the

restaurant, grew up in northern Minnesota and spent many years hunting the white tail deer that are prevalent there. "Game meat can be tricky to cook," Mirau says. "It's easy to dry out."

Which is why he and McGee were thrilled when Chef Victor Cabrera came on board. He was originally hired as a kitchen assistant but was quickly promoted to head chef after the owners saw his skill and creativity with game meat.

"He really became the star of the kitchen," McGee says. "Victor tamed the wild game," she adds with a laugh.

Cabrera previously worked at Searsucker in the Scottsdale Gaslamp Quarter, Postino WineCafe and Distrito, a Mexico City-style eatery inside the Saguaro Hotel in Scottsdale created by James Beard Award-winner Jose Garces, who also won on "Iron Chef."

"I'm the only one in town doing this (wild game) right now," Cabrera says. "I love it."

Cabrera works with the owners each Thursday to come up with a special for that day featuring a game meat. Past Thursday specials have included alligator kabobs, ostrich ravioli, kangaroo shepherd's pie, and Muscovy duck breast. Specials are posted to Facebook and to the blackboard inside the bar area by 3 p.m. each Thursday.

McGee says the wild game meat concept for restaurants is really "hot" right now in southern California, so

Wild Game Grill, a member of Local First Arizona, also is making its mark by its location. It's pushing south of Indian School to extend the growing Central Phoenix dining district. The restaurant is inside a remodeled 1940s strip center, with the entire structure

restaurant is inside a remodeled 1940s strip center, with the entire structure transformed using design elements of original concrete, brick, iron and wood. Interior walls were torn down to create a large open floor plan, keeping a comfortably inviting industrial and authentic feel.

"We've retained the original brick, wood rafters and even the concrete flooring, re-stained, of course," McGee explains. "So we're respecting the history of the building, and the neighborhood, too."

And speaking of neighbors, Wild Game has received a warm welcome from the surrounding community, including some apartments just south of the property. Those renters used to complain about homeless people sleeping and urinating in the back parking lot area of the old strip center, of trash and noise and crime. Now, they have a great neighborhood joint just steps from their home that offers a unique menu, a cool bar, and a great patio.

It's a bright, open space with lots of flat-screen TVs for another kind of "game night."

Wild Game negotiated an agreement with the office building next door so that the restaurant's customers can use the office's parking spaces after 5 p.m. With an already generous parking lot in the back, McGee says between the two lots they can accommodate up to 100 cars.

"Where are you going to find that kind of parking in Central Phoenix?" she points out. "Our customers don't have to cruise neighborhood streets or deal with valet services just to park here."
