D28 seats have many contenders

Three seats are up for grabs on Aug. 30 in Arizona's District 28, and some of the candidates have very familiar faces.

Arizona's Legislative District 28 includes nearly the entire core of North Central Phoenix, largely from Thunderbird Road south to just short of Camelback Road, and 19th Avenue all the way to Scottsdale Road. It stretches as far west as the I-17, north to Union Hills Road, and south to Thomas Road.

Both House seats are up for grabs and so is the one Senate seat, as Republican Adam Driggs opted not to run for what would have been his fourth and final term for that senate seat. Over in the House, Rep. Eric Meyer (D) reached his term limit of eight years but fellow legislator Kate Brophy McGee (R) could have tried for one more two-year term. Instead, they will face each other as they vie for the senate seat

Big changes coming to Metrocenter area

The Phoenix City Council has unanimously approved a Planned Unit Development (PUD) application for 130 acres in and around the iconic Metrocenter Mall development, located on Interstate 17 between Peoria and Dunlap avenues. The new zoning allows for multiple new uses besides retail, such as office, senior housing, multifamily housing and healthcare.

It also allows for increased height and density at the infill site, which boasts the highest surrounding residential density in all of the metro Phoenix market. The PUD encompasses 130 acres, with 83 acres of that occupied by Metrocenter Mall, the adjoining Macy's and Sears anchor spaces, and the 10-acre land site of a future Walmart Supercenter, which broke ground on July 20 after months of demolishing and clearing the old Broadway location, which had been vacant since 2006. The mall was first opened in 1973.

"This is a landmark moment that we have been working toward for quite a long time," said Warren Fink, COO of Carlyle Development Company, the owner of Metrocenter Mall. "After several years of collaboration with the city, the community and its leaders, we now have the official green light to rede-

velop this valuable infill site in a very significant way, first and foremost by bringing in dynamic new uses that will make this a true urban village for Phoenix residents."

Under the PUD, approved uses at Metrocenter could range from senior housing and multifamily housing to corporate office, healthcare and additional retail, restaurant and entertainment amenities. The PUD allows for a height increase up to 180 feet (approximately 15 stories). It also allows Carlyle to almost double its current 800,000 square feet of existing space, to a total 1.6 million square feet. The PUD additionally includes an amendment to the sign



in the same district.

Meyer, who grew up in Scottsdale, was first elected to the Arizona House in 2009. He earned a degree in economics from the University of Southern California and a medical degree from University of Arizona Medical School. Meyer's background in economics and medicine has given him an insight into the growing problems of access to quality, affordable health care—especially for children—and to identify ways to work for solutions in strengthening the state economy. Meyer, who served two terms on the Scottsdale School Board, also has been a strong advocate for public education and affordable college tuition.

"I tried this past session to restore the \$116 million cut from K-12 schools and to restore \$50 million cut to our state universities using existing revenues. Unfortunately we didn't have the votes," he said.

"I am running for the State Senate because I have a very different vision for our state than what we've seen from our current majority leadership or from my fellow LD28 representative," Meyer said. "As a state senator, I will support different legislative leaders who will take our state in a different direction. I supported Prop 123 and the restoration of KidsCare but that is not enough.

"With one in four children living in poverty, 1,500 cut off from temporary assistance on July 1 and 19,000 children in foster care—all while Arizona sits on a budget surplus—our priorities are wrong, and need to change," he pointed out. "This election the voters have the chance to bring competition and choice to the state legislature. As a state senator my goals going forward are to ensure that we have many more legislative successes that improve the lives of Arizona's families and children. The voters of District 28 have the chance this election to alter the political landscape of our state.

"Without change, the current majority will continue to cater to special interests at the expense of our children's future—and our state's future."

Brophy McGee was in the midst of her third term in the Arizona House of Representatives when she decided to run for the vacant senate seat. "My decision to run for Senate was a result of Sen. Adam Driggs' decision not to seek a fourth term in the Senate," she explained. "I've been a very effective leader in the House, and want to continue that leadership in the Senate."

Brophy McGee is a third-generation Arizonan, born into a ranching family and raised in southern Arizona. She graduated from the University of Arizona and worked as a community banker lending to small businesses. She and her husband have lived in the North Central Phoenix area for more than 30 years, and all three sons attended Sunnyslope High School.

"As Arizona has recovered from the Great Recession, I've worked for and succeeded in restoring funding to K-12 and higher education, and increased and protected funding for our most vulnerable children, the elderly and the disabled. Much more work remains to be done on these issues going forward. I've consistently demonstrated the ability to garner the necessary votes in the House, in both a partisan and bipartisan manner. Many of the bills I've sponsored, including the formation of the Department of Child Safety as a standalone agency whose director reports to the governor, have also passed the Senate and been signed by the governor," she pointed out.

"I've also had some bills die in the Senate that passed with broad support in the House. An example includes Angel's Law, which requires DCS to conduct a background check on adults living in the home before returning an abused, neglected child to the home. The bill passed twice in the House with overwhelming support, but was held in the Senate. This legislation is important for our most vulnerable children, and if I am elected to the Senate it is one of my top priorities to enact."

As for the two vacant House seats, there are several contenders, including Republicans Kenneth Bowers, Mary Hamway, Matt Morales, Maria Syms and Alberto Gutier III and Democrat Kelli Butler. Information on these candidates appears below.



Bridge to Hope expands offerings

Festive balloons greeted guests, supporters and clients at The Bridge to Hope ministry, 1815 E. Missouri Avenue, Ste. 105, on June 4 as the non-profit organization celebrated the expansion of its ministry.

Launched in January 2012, The Bridge to Hope works with homeless women with children by encouraging them along the road to recovery from homelessness. The Bridge to Hope (B2H) finds a partner Christian church to take a vested interest in a single mother and her children in crisis—a family that has lost hope and direction.

The mothers who come into the program may have experienced domestic violence, a financial crisis or are recovering from substance abuse.

The ministry saw its first graduate of the program in April 2014. Recently, The Bridge to Hope completed a large expansion of its offices, which included four new areas. These included conference center space for workshops for the

Bridge Mothers and a new job search area for mothers to search for employment. In addition, there is a greatly expanded "Bridge Boutique" area where donations of clothing and household items are received and processed which serves as the store for mothers to "shop" for clothing and household items with

their "Bridge Bucks."

Also added was a Child Enrichment space developed by Bright Horizons, a Foundation for Children, which gives the children a cozy environment for care while their moms are receiving different programming classes.

Lowes of Glendale donated materials

for building of The Bridge Boutique and employees from Grand Canyon University donated their time and talents to construct this space. Office Furniture Now of Phoenix donated all of the furniture for the conference and life skills programming.

Directed by Amy Sue Seiser, The Bridge to Hope currently serves four mothers mentored by church teams across the Valley including La Casa de Cristo of Scottsdale, Bethany Bible of Phoenix, Faith Bible of Phoenix and First Southern Baptist of Scottsdale.

ordinance, allowing construction of three electronic billboards along I-17 between Peoria and Dunlap avenues.

"I grew up just a few blocks from Metrocenter, which has been an important part of my life and the lives of so many other Phoenix residents," said Mayor Greg Stanton. "It feels good to help this area maintain its vitality as one of our Valley's most important and recognizable retail and employment areas."

"The zoning designation for this project was unanimously supported by the Village Planning Committee, Planning Commission and Phoenix City Council, a clear message that our community is anxious to see this development plan move forward," said Councilwoman Thelda Phoenix Williams, in whose district Metrocenter is located. "Many people have worked hard to move this project forward and the end result will be such an asset in our community."

The balance of the PUD—approximately 45 acres—encompasses land and businesses around the mall loop road, such as Castles-N-Coasters, College of America and the former Sports Authority big box.

"Our objective is to develop projects that respond to market demand and that reinvigorate this land site as its highest and best use," said Fink.

One of the first projects to move forward at Metrocenter will be the construction of a 148,000-square-foot Walmart Supercenter. The anticipated new Supercenter will sit directly adjacent to Metrocenter Mall, at the site of the former Broadway building. The development, which is in pre-construction, marks the single-largest capital investment in Metrocenter Mall in decades.

Other benchmarks on the horizon include the extension of Light Rail to the Metrocenter site. That on-property Light Rail stop is expected to be open and operational by 2023.

Sunnyslope VFW Post bans smoking

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 9400 in Sunnyslope has become the first Phoenix metro area VFW veteran club to alter its policy to ban all indoor smoking. The new policy is designed to promote the health and wellbeing of current post membership and increase its appeal among younger veterans.

Private clubs such as the VFW are currently exempt from the Arizona state smoking regulations. Post Commander Mark Short said, "The post specifically chose to switch to a smoke-free policy to prevent second-hand smoke exposure, thereby making our facility safer and contributing to a better overall environment. For many of our vets, smoking is a real problem. It prevents them from visiting the post and taking an active role in post affairs. We want Post 9400 to be a place that everyone can enjoy."

In addition, research has found that a smoke-free facility has greater appeal to younger veterans, especially those with children. "We need to make our post more accommodating for the younger vet because they are the future of our organization," Short added.

The initial response to the new policy overall has been positive; several members with breathing problems who haven't attended post events in months or years have now started coming back in.



ments: she patrolled North Central Phoenix as part of the Neighborhood Enforcement Team (NET) for the bulk of her career; she also provided security for three presidents and two Super Bowls; and she's received 111 commendations for her superior work.

"I enjoyed my time in the area," Nez says. "The people I dealt with, talked to, are really nice and friendly to the police department."

Ong also noted, Nez is extremely healthy having never taken sick leave in at least the last 20 years. She worked undercover with skill and finesse, flushing out perpetrators with her partner. She also helped people she met in her daily patrols and was part of the Secret Santa group handing out cash to anyone who caught her attention and obviously needed a little help around the holidays.

Nez is Hopi from First Mesa. The tribe has several clans and each one has certain roles and responsibilities. The chairman of the Hopi Tribe, Herman Honanie, attended her retirement party and presented her with a plaque honoring her years of service. He noted that the men of her clan are guards of the village. "You showed up your men," Honanie said, and went on to say he hoped her relatives were proud of her.

Her last partner, Officer Ken Harbaugh, said a day never went by which Nez didn't tell him about her tribe, her clan and her family, to the point where Harbaugh joked, "I was envious and jealous." He says she is very proud of her Hopi heritage. He also noted her ability to handle inebriated people on the street and to figure out how to take out drug dealers without violence.

"You are a great cop. I'm proud to serve to have served with you all these years," said Harbaugh.

Now that she's taken off her badge, Nez is contemplating her next phase of life. Community service work is on her list. No job means being able to finally watch her granddaughter compete in some cross country meets.

She plans to keep active in the community she patrolled for so long. And she looks forward to finding out what opportunity comes next because, as she says with a laugh, "You can only clean the house so much."

Dogs barred from trails during extreme temps

The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Board has taken steps to protect pets on city hiking trails during high heat.

The board on June 30 unanimously approved a three-month pilot program to prevent hikers from bringing dogs on city trails when temperatures rise above 100 degrees. The new rules took effect immediately. Because their bodies do not have the same cooling mechanisms as humans, dogs are especially at risk of heat exhaustion, heat stroke or even death when exposed to extreme temperatures.

"While people can make their own decisions and take proper precautions

when hiking on hot summer days, the heat can be just as dangerous for their dogs, who don't have a choice to be on those trails," Mayor Greg Stanton said. "Restricting access to pets on hot days is a sensible step, along with our continued efforts to educate the public on the potential dangers of hiking during extreme heat."

The board also unanimously declined to limit access to hikers during times of extreme heat, although the Parks and Recreation Department does still have the authority to close parks if there is a public health emergency.



Traditional storage and filing of estate planning documents raises many potential risks for consumers—from misplaced documents to inaccurate updates—which is why the Beals developed Document Trunk as a solution.

"My wife and I created DocumentTrunk from a personal need," said Brian Beal. "We were faced with the same inadequate options that everyone is given once your will, trust, or other important documents are finished. Phoenix resident Jacob DiMartino launched Raadr Inc. in 2015 with the intent to curb the cyberbullying epidemic. He has since launched two unique apps.

Raadr alerts subscribers whenever selected categories of keywords—such as bullying, drugs or sex—are detected on a specific child's social media feeds. Raadr uses an artificially intelligent proprietary web-based application to achieve these results.

Subscribers pay \$4.95 a month and the service, which allows up to six child profiles, includes daily and weekly updates, text and e-mail alerts, and



This is the second full-featured child protection application the company has on Apple's app store for iOS devices, such as iPhones, iPods and iPads. While Raadr is geared toward parents to help them monitor their

children's online activity for red flags, the new BullyRaadr was created for children, as it will allow them to directly report bullying incidents to school

officials and parents alike.

"I created the Raadr and BullyRaadr apps to help prevent potential harmful and deadly situations online, in the classroom and community," says DiMartino. "The app gives parents and children an 'online pulse' of what's going on around them in the cyberworld, and that's what I truly wanted to accomplish when I created these apps."

The BullyRaadr application will initially allow students to record videos up to one-minute-long, upload pictures, and send in written reports to school officials for review. With documentation backing claims, school officials will be able to take action against bullying in their systems. The free app can be downloaded directly from iTunes.



To Care for Others, Care for Yourself

"Your program at North Mountain Cardio sounds like just what I need, but I don't know where I'd find the time. I already have so many things going on in my life. As it is, I'm always tired—I feel like I'm burnt out."


At North Mountain Cardio, we have a different perspective, based on two rules that we find helpful to remember.

"Secure your own mask first before helping others," the airline cabin attendants always remind us. Our own name should always be on the list of people and projects we are working for or on. 





Many reasons to linger longer here

What's in a name? Everything—when it comes to the Linger Longer Lounge, 6522 N. 16th St.

"The concept behind the bar was to create a dark and cozy neighborhood tavern that would be a neighborhood goto," says Tucker Woodbury, majority owner of the business. The concept was "...a spot with such a fun, comfortable environment that people might come for a beer or a bite to eat, and end up sticking around or lingering a bit longer. Plus I love word play, alliteration and coming up with clever and memorable names for our projects. Linger Longer Lounge covered all those bases."

Woodbury certainly has covered all the bases for a good local hangout. On each table is a Jenga game, in the back the shelves are filled with other board games and you can't miss the huge collection of vinyl records that are put to use weekly by a DJ. That's all just in the main room. There also is a patio for patrons and a separate game room that's like a mini arcade.

"Beyond food, cocktails and conversation, people like something to do and games keep our guests lingering longer," Woodbury explains.

When it comes to the food the Linger Longer Lounge has more than just burgers and wings. "I wish more people were aware of the fact that we serve really great food," points out Woodbury. "Our pizza is seriously some of the best pies in town and our fried pickles are badass!"

The panko-crusted fried pickles are on the "Intros/Apps" menus as well as baked brie or the Big board loaded with cured meats, artisanal cheese, roasted vegetables, olives and fruit. The price range is \$7 to \$13.

One 12-inch pizza is named the "Leon Brussel" and features brussels sprouts, bacon, roasted garlic, extra virgin olive oil, lemon zest and an egg over easy for \$13. "Bonus Tracks" are items you can add to your pie such as egg, chorizo, jalapenos, or bacon for \$1.50 each. Salads and sandwiches are \$13 or less.

The bar features craft cocktails starting at \$8 and beer, a few from

"I think I realized in college that the kind of parties I liked to attend, no one was having," recalls Woodbury. Today he and his partners are busy creating the kind of environment that makes people feel comfortable and relaxed. He opened his first bar/restaurant in 1991.

It's definitely a fun atmosphere at the Linger Longer Lounge and it's a brand Woodbury and his partners are building. "All of our locations are operated by Genuine Concepts, a hospitality management company we started a couple years ago to oversee not only our growth, but also the day-to-day management of each store. We'll have 10 stores by year's end and more on the drawing board."

Logan Purser is the director of operations, Jorge Gomez is the executive che and Cesar Cramton is the event coordinator.

On Wednesday nights the record player is opened to Vinyl Valley where, as Woodbury puts it, "...the best local DJ's spin nothing but wax." The game room is available for private parties or to host a business meeting.

"I hope people know the Linger Longer is a 'pretension-free zone,'" says Woodbury. He wants to stress that the atmosphere is casual, fun and approachable—no attitude—and that "we have a killer parquet wood dance floor, disco ball and dancing every Friday and Saturday night."
