# Property taxes to increase this year

It's that time of year again, when some Valley school districts decide to help their budgets through a hike in residents' property tax rates. And while the city of Phoenix itself is not raising its rate (for the second year in a row), the city does expect to see its tax revenue increase thanks to the rising value of properties around town.

The Phoenix Union High School District Governing Board voted on June 20 to raise its primary property tax levy by \$3 million, which will increase the primary property tax of a \$100,000 home within the district boundaries from \$124.27 to \$130.70. State law allows school districts to increase their tax levy by a certain amount each year without voter approval.

Homeowners citywide also can expect to see another bump in their primary property taxes this

### K-9, family need help with expenses

Hunter loves going to work every day with his fellow officers of the Phoenix Police Department Bomb Squad. But his service is coming to an early end, unexpectedly, due to some serious health issues. And both his police family and his handler family are rallying together to make sure that whatever time he has left is surrounded by love.

Hunter, a yellow Labrador retriever, is a highly trained Explosive Ordnance Dog (EOD) for the Phoenix Police Bomb Squad. His handler since the beginning of his service has been Det. Keith Crouse, who has been an officer for 24 years and with the bomb squad for 13 years. Hunter is his first K-9 partner.

EOD K-9s are used on almost every call the bomb squad responds to. An officer within the specialty unit says they respond to an average of 400-plus calls a year. That's more than one a day. But the public generally doesn't hear about it because they stay off radios and police scanners in case a potential explosive device may have a radio trigger. Plus, they don't need the public showing up to an active site as spectators.

Most of the time, the calls turn out to be false alarms.

Hunter's job, like his two fellow K-9 officers, is to go into a potentially dangerous situation and either

clear the scene, or alert as to where, specifically, bomb-making materials might be located. The K-9 will go in ahead of their human officers as an extra layer of protection.

"There is a strong bond with the officer handler, but the dog is a tool, it is a working dog, and God forbid something should happen, it does protect the other officers from potential harm," said Timothy Thomas, president of the Phoenix Police Foundation. For that reason, these dogs play a critical function with the bomb squad.

So with Hunter's recent diagnosis of kidney failure, his handler is working to make him a permanent part of the family, even though Crouse and his wife,




### RAMMS team gathers funds for tourney trip

Jill, know they will be facing some hefty medical bills.

Keith explains that with Hunter's kidney failure, there really isn't a cure. They can manage the symptoms, to an extent, through diet and medication to help with side effects like nausea.

"Some days he's great, some days he throws up every time he eats," admits Jill, who refers to herself as "Hunter's mama." "He'll require regular blood tests, special prescription food, and regular medication," which could get very costly four the couple.

The Crouses are in the process of transferring ownership of Hunter from the Phoenix Police Department to themselves, which basically is a document that transfers liability so the city is no longer legally responsible for him. The anticipated cost of the transfer is \$1—it's more of a formality than anything.

However, Hunter is just over 8 years old, and the expected term of his service wasn't anticipated to end for a few more years yet. Which leaves the city in something of a lurch, as it has not yet begun to save and budget for a new EOD dog.

So the Phoenix Police Foundation has stepped in to both help pay for Hunter's medical costs, and to raise funds to purchase a new specially trained K-9 to replace him. Because of that specialized training, these dogs can cost upwards of \$13,000.

The Phoenix Police Foundation held a fundraising event on June 17 at Hance Dog Park. Hunter and the Crouses made and appearance, as did several members of the bomb squad, their response vehicles, and a couple of the robots they send in to examine—and in some cases, explode—suspicious packages.

Several local businesses donated items for a silent auction, including Doggy Daze, a grooming and pet supply store at 7th Street and Missouri Ave. Owner Sean Kirk donated 15 drawstring backpacks with pet food samples, which were given out to those who made a minimum \$20 donation. Kirk also donated four \$20 gift cards for raffle prizes, and some Blue Wilderness dog food chubs.

Other donors include AMC Theatres, the Arizona Diamondbacks, and the Crescent Ballroom.

The Phoenix Police Foundation is

### Homebound seniors need help in summer

year. The city of Phoenix's primary property tax supports the General Fund services such as police and fire, parks and recreation, libraries and senior and community centers. The city's primary property tax rate for 2017-18 will be unchanged from last year's rate of \$1.3359 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Of course, the city of Phoenix does not control property values. But as the economy grows, property values have increased and some property owners likely will pay more in taxes as a result. The city anticipates a 4-percent increase in its primary property taxes. By law it is required to adopt its tax levy, which the Phoenix City Council will do on July 6 at its regularly scheduled meeting.

Though it hardly will be noticeable, the city's secondary property tax rate for 2017-18 will decrease by \$0.01, from \$0.8341 to \$0.8241 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Secondary property taxes pay the bonded debt service for facilities like libraries, police and fire stations, storm drains and parks. For

In addition, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, which also governs the Flood Control, Library, and Stadium districts, adopted a budget of \$2.49 billion on June 19. As part of that budget, the board agreed to put forth a primary property tax increase of \$17.8 million, or 3.5 percent, which would raise primary property taxes on a \$100,000 home from \$135.33 to \$140.09. But the board also voted to issue two secondary property tax increases: \$2,874,615 or 4.9 percent for the Flood Control District, which would increase secondary property taxes on a \$100,000 home from \$17.08 to \$17.92; and \$710,702 or 3.5 percent for the Library District, which would increase secondary property taxes on a \$100,000 home from \$5.37 to \$5.56.

Maricopa County is required to stay below a maximum levy each year. With the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2018 budget, the county will be \$148.2 million below that limit. Maricopa County receives only 12 percent of every dollar paid in property taxes.

In accordance with State statute, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors will vote on the final tax levy proposal 10 a.m. Monday, Aug. 21, at 301 W. Jefferson St. All interested citizens are invited to attend. If approved, the tax increases will go into effect in the next round of property tax bills, which will be sent out beginning in September.

### Blood donations needed in summer

The American Red Cross urges eligible donors to give blood this summer for hospital patients in need. Only about 3 percent of the U.S. population gives blood, which means a heavy reliance on repeat donors to maintain a sufficient blood supply. New blood donors are especially needed during the summer months because many schools where blood drives are held—and where new donors give—are not in session, and current donors often delay giving due to summer vacations.

Type O negative blood and type AB plasma are two of the most in-demand


blood products by hospitals. Those who give can help patients locally or across the country as the Red Cross has the ability to move blood products where and when they are needed most.

### Nonprofit opens home for veterans

A local nonprofit recently opened a second home specifically for Phoenix veterans working to get back on their feet financially—and emotionally. The home can house up to 9-10 men at a time and is a licensed dehp therapeutic

treatment facility, helping provide veterans with the tools to overcome the effects of post-traumatic stress disorder.

Soul Sanctuary in the Desert was first established to work with at-risk families to break the generational cycle of substance abuse and domestic violence through its support of women and children. In 2004, Soul Sanctuary opened its first nonprofit housing program for women, allowing mothers and children to have their own bedroom and personal space. It has since branched out to include its nonprofit housing program for veterans.

An open house was held at the second veterans' home, near 20th Street and Indian School Road, on April 22, as a way to welcome the veterans to their new home and the neighborhood. A local troop of Boy Scouts held an official flag raising ceremony to open the event.

The Veterans Home is a transitional program to help veterans reach financial and emotional stability and return as a productive members of society. The home was made possible due to supporters like Arizona Cardinals wide receiver Larry Fitzgerald, who has been a past supporter of Soul Sanctuary's transitional housing for women and also contributed to the new Veterans Home.

### Proposed apartments raise density concerns

Scottsdale-based Wood Partners is in the process of acquiring a large chunk of assembled land just east of 7th Street and south of Maryland Avenue, in order to build approximately 245 high-end apartments. However, in order to build that many units, a Planned Urban Development (PUD) rezoning must first be approved by the city.

Several neighbors have come out in opposition of the PUD, saying the density is too high for the area that is largely single-story commercial and two-story older apartments which taper into single-story residential. The bulk of the project lies behind the strip center that includes Christo's Ristorante and C&S Sporting Goods, and also juts to the north behind Inman & Sons.

Neighbors also worry about the only access and exit to the development being off Stella Lane, which means the new residents would have to turn left or right onto 7th Street, including during reverse lane hours.

It's a safety concern and a traffic issue, meaning the new tenants might choose to cut through the neighborhood instead, opponents contend.

Wood Partners and its zoning attorney, Earl Curley & Lagarde, have held two community meetings, the first on June 6 the most recent on June 20. Large renderings of the proposed "Alta Marlette" development were available to view, and results of a traffic study commissioned by the developer also were laid out on several large poster boards.

The results compiled by J2 Engineering show little impact on the overall 7th Street traffic flow, and noted regular "gap" periods where the lights at Maryland Avenue and Rose Lane are red, allowing cars from Stella—which falls between the two lights—to exit onto 7th Street with little traffic flowing at that time. Some neighbors disputed the results, saying it is already very difficult to get in and out of the neighborhood off of 7th Street during reverse lane hours, and adding hundreds more cars to that equation is only going to make things worse.

Alta Marlette would offer high-end one- and two-bedroom apartments ranging in rent from \$1,500 to \$3,000, with some three-bedroom penthouse units available. A 420-space, four-story parking garage would lie within the interior of the project, not visible from the street. Zoning standards require one parking space per bedroom. That's a lot more cars heading in and out of the area, opponents point out.

Neighbors also are worried that if the PUD is approved, it will open the door for other developers to come to the city with high-density infill projects in the midtown corridor using the same rezoning method to get around existing zoning height and density limits. Currently at least two other developers are considering similar projects within a couple of miles of Alta Marlette, but much closer to existing homes.

According to the Alta Marlette proposal, "This type of new housing in appropriate locations upgrades residential living choices and expands diversity, which in turn supports the existing and new restaurant venues as

well as other commercial retail shops."

The proposal has gone before the Camelback East Village Planning Committee for information purposes only, but the more detailed draft is still being reviewed by the Phoenix Planning Department and a staff report had not yet been issued as of press time. Once a staff report has been generated, the developer has the option to move the plan forward for a formal review and recommendation at the VPC, before it moves on to the Phoenix Planning Commission and finally the Phoenix City Council.

Camelback East VPC agendas are posted 10 days prior to scheduled meetings, which are 6 p.m. the first Tuesday of the month at the Devonshire Senior Center, 2802 E. Devonshire Ave. Agendas can be viewed online at www.phoenix.gov, under "Public Meetings."

There are a lot of kids here, and they like to congregate outside the cafeteria, and there was no place to sit, and a

space like this was very much needed."

Joseph worked with the companies, and the school to create a plan and color scheme that complements the school colors—orange and blue.

"They wanted to call it Joseph's Corner, but 'Hangout' sounded better," Joseph explains. "It has a ring to it. I like the way it sounds."

Joseph's gift did come with some anxiety. The seating area replaced the bell tower. During the assembly he was a little worried. He hoped students wouldn't remember him as the kid who got rid of the bell tower.

But on the plaque that will designate the space, his true message is recorded: Selflessness is all the heart needs.

Joseph, a former football player at Camelback, also was recognized by the Phoenix Union High School District just prior to his graduation with a Community Outreach Award, presented at the All-Phoenix Union Sports Awards event on May 9.







program at Camelback. The Toastmasters club also encourages its members to contribute through the Arizona Education Tax Credit program.

Anti-bullying program a success at Sunnyslope

Since its inception 20 years ago, North Star Youth Partnership has been providing positive, life-changing services to youth in the community. With the concern of bullying at the forefront, North Star created the Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL) program, aimed at combating bullying in schools.

Diane DeLong, Program Manager of North Star explains, "Bullying has escalated over the past 20 years and has now reached epidemic proportions due to social media. The bullying continues, long after the school day has ended."

Christine Williams manages the PAL program at three local schools—including Sunnyslope Elementary. "Participants in the program use the peer helping model, which includes communication, group dynamics, active listening and problem-solving. It was through the participants in the program that we identified a major source of bullying: limitations in the ability to practice good hygiene," explains Williams.

To eradicate this need, the program accepted donations of soaps and toiletry items throughout the school year. To coincide with North Star Youth Partnership's 20th anniversary, these donations were distributed to local schools.

North Star also combats bullying by empowering youth through mentorship programs, linking younger students with older students. This encourages social support and builds confidence in teens.

## Café Chat

#### Popular sushi spot is a hidden gem

At the start of each shift at Akai Hana Sushi and Grill (8041 N. Black Canyon Hwy., Suite 112) the chefs sharpen their knives and prepare for a day of sushi, sashimi, teriyaki and tempura. Since 1986, when the restaurant opened as Mr. Sushi, thousands of rolls have been made and served at this location.

In 2003, Kazuo Tashiro purchased the restaurant and took over, renaming it Akai Hana, which means "red flower." Tashiro is from the small village of Nagasaki, Japan. He's worked in the restaurant business his entire life and as a sushi chef for much of that time. America was always his dream destination.

"America is the center of the world," he says. His grandparents spoke often about the riches to be

found in America. "You could grab the move to the United States. gold off the ground in the city," they would tell him. It was the land of opportunity and he was encouraged to

Still, it was a huge choice for the self-described country boy. He went to college in the big city of Osaka, Japan.

"Country boy moved to the big city, wow!" he laughs at the memory. His plan included traveling the world before settling down somewhere, so Tashiro traveled and worked in many countries including Australia and Central and South America. In 1974 he immigrated to the United States.

Tashiro settled in New York and quickly went to work for a sushi restaurant. It wasn't long before he met Farideh, his future wife. She had spent time in Spain, Germany and Japan doing missionary work. "In the beginning I couldn't understand his English," she says. "But I'm polite," so she says she didn't question him or correct him. She also wasn't too keen on sushi. "Who eats raw fish?" she asked herself. Undaunted, Tashiro took her to the sushi restaurant inside the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York and ordered for her. "I was hooked," she says and marveled, "I am going to eat this for the rest of my life? Wow!"

The couple has been married since



1982. Their one son is not in the family business.

After years of braving the New York winters, they decided they wanted some sunshine so they moved to Phoenix in 2003. "We missed the heat," he says and they both laugh. At first he worked for a friend in the Valley who had a fish distribution company—and one of Tashiro's delivery stops was at Mr. Sushi.

In 2003 he took over Mr. Sushi and brought his years of culinary experience to Phoenix. He recently expanded the seating area to 125 people, with a full bar.

The lunchtime crowd is mostly business people from nearby offices. Akai Hana offers traditional sushi but also sushi with a Southwestern flair, which includes jalapeños and cilantro.

Hand rolls range in price from \$5 to \$6.50, sushi averages \$4.50 for two pieces unless you order the sea urchin, which is \$10 or the toro, which is \$12. Sashimi averages \$10 for five pieces. There is a large selection of appetizers such as baby squid, edamame, and tempura vegetables.

Happy Hour is daily at different hours; check the website or Facebook and look for discounted prices on select appetizers, sushi rolls and beverages.

Tashiro likes the wide variety on his menu and says it makes it unique to Phoenix. "If a Japanese chef came today, (he would ask) what is this sushi?" Tashiro laughs.

He wants to bring people happiness, he says. "We try to improve, add new things." When he visits New York or Las Vegas, he watches for new ideas and trends in the food industry to introduce at his restaurant.

Tashiro also offers etiquette tips for customers. Sushi, he explains, is a finger food. You don't have to use chopsticks to eat. You can eat sashimi with chopsticks or a fork. "We don't say no," he says. "The point is to enjoy." Akai Hana provides a spoon to eat the brown rice, which is hard to pick up with chopsticks.

At the Phoenix location (there also is a location in Goodyear), there are many regulars who enjoy eating casual dinners at the restaurant but also celebrate milestones such as birthdays, anniversaries or prom. "We see so many families," he says. "First, second and third generations come together."

As the country celebrates its Independence Day this month, Kazuo and Farideh Tashiro will also celebrate in America in Phoenix, the land of opportunity. But, he points out, they won't be eating sushi. Traditional hot dogs off the barbecue most likely will be on the holiday menu at their home.

Akai Hana is open for lunch Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and for dinner Mon through Thursday from 4 to 9 p.m. Lunch on weekends is from Noon to 4 p.m. and dinner is served Friday and Saturday from 4 to 10 p.m. Sundays dinner is served from 4 to 9 p.m. Visit www.sushiakaihana.com or call 602-864-9202 for more information. 
