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Light rail meetings to look at new segments

Two community meetings are scheduled in North Central Phoenix this month about the light rail train, operated by Valley Metro. The first meeting will provide an update about the Northwest Phase II Extension project, which will continue the light rail from where it current ends at 19th and Dunlap avenues, on to Metrocenter Mall.

However, it is the second meeting that is drawing a lot of attention, as Valley Metro begins the process of determining a route to Paradise Valley Mall. And one of the proposed routes would take the train right through the heart of the Sunnyslope community.

That "Future Light Rail Northeast Expansion" meeting is set for 10 a.m.-12 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 13 at the Sunnyslope History Museum, 737 E. Hatcher Road. The meeting is free and open to the public; a light lunch will be available for purchase for \$5.

There are two proposed routes to Paradise Valley

Proposed center draws ire from neighbors

A development by the nonprofit Native American Connections (NAC) planned for the Sunnyslope community that includes a 55-bed rehab center is causing controversy among neighbors adjacent to and near the site at 1431 E. Dunlap Ave.

NAC first acquired the property known as the Mountain Preserve Reception & Conference Center in March 2018 but has been working on a site plan before that, after having viewed the property last fall. The property was first listed for sale about two years ago.

The site currently has a large building dating back to the mid-1960s that has previously been used as a fire-fighters union hall, and boasts a large courtyard area that has been used for weddings. Area organizations such as the Sunnyslope Village Alliance have used the building in the past for various events and receptions.

The plan is to remodel that building inside and out, freshen up the courtyard, remodel another small building on the site, and construct a new, three-story multifamily apartment building on the west side of the property.

The development of dining facility with communal educational and crafting space, permanent supportive housing component with 55 units, and large multi-use courtyard are allowed by right under the R-

5 multifamily zoning. However, it is the 55-beds for short-term, inpatient drug and alcohol rehabilitation that is causing the roadblock for the project.

In April of this year, the city of Phoenix passed a text amendment to its zoning code specifically related to these types of residentially based drug and alcohol rehab facilities. Any operations related to these kinds of facilities are now required to get a use permit from the city, whereas six months ago there was no need for the use permit, or the associated public hearing before a zoning administrator.

The use permit process required NAC to post a sign on the property regarding the zoning hearing, and to notify via mail all property owners within 150

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


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

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

feet of the project's address. NAC followed those requirements, but many homeowners nearby—but outside the 150-foot radius—were angered that NAC didn't make more of an effort to notify them, particularly since this type of project doesn't typically garner neighborhood support.

They accused NAC of trying to slip the Patina Mountain Preserve project under the radar and drop a bomb on their neighborhood that they contend will significantly harm their property values.

Supporters of NAC point to its long history in Phoenix, and its many high-quality projects that dot the city.

NAC started in Phoenix in 1972 as a grassroots organization to operate a safe haven for Native Americans recovering from substance abuse. Since that time it has grown into a multi-service, community-wide organization, with a host of behavior health and housing programs that serve all members of the community.

"The only program we had at the beginning was residential alcohol and

drug treatment. This is not something new for us," pointed out Diana Yazzie Devine, CEO of Native American Connections.

Some neighbors who were at first opposed to the Patina Mountain Preserve project were invited to tour some of NAC's other, similar developments, and ultimately spoke in favor of the Sunnyslope plan at the Phoenix Zoning Administrator hearing on Sept. 20. Even one man who lives directly across the street from the project said he is now in favor of it.

But the vast majority of people who spoke at the hearing, as well as a community meeting held on Sept. 6 that drew more than 100 residents, were strongly opposed to it. A website has been launched in opposition to the project: www.ResidentialNotRehab.com.

Many neighbors expressed concerned about the safety of their neighborhood should those receiving treatment decide to simply walk out and not complete the program. Devine said that no one leaves without a structured care plan, and that more than half of those voluntarily seeking treatment

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have families to go home to. Those who are homeless when entering the program are assigned case managers who work to connect them with permanent, stable housing—whether with NAC or elsewhere—prior to discharge. And those who simply choose not to complete the program are given transportation to their destination of choicethey cannot simply walk out the door with no means of transportation and no destination in mind.

In addition, NAC officials emphasized that its rehab centers do not take referrals from the Arizona Department of Corrections, and in addition to a 30page medical assessment, background checks are conducted to ensure that no potential clients are registered sex offenders or have outstanding warrants. All employees must obtain a DPS fingerprint clearance via a background check.

Brian Greathouse, secretary for the NAC board and a real estate attorney with Burch & Cracchiolo, said that some residents had asked that a sign be posted clearly stated that there would be "no walk-ins" at this facility, as all intake is done at NAC's Central

Avenue office. He said NAC was amenable to the suggestion.

Neighbors also wanted a commitment from NAC that there would never be more than the 55 beds for the rehab center on this property. Greathouse responded that the request would have to be run through NAC's finance department and board first to see if such a suggestion was feasible. But he emphasized that NAC wants to work with the neighbors to try to resolve some of their concerns, where possible.

But no amount of reassurance could convince some of those who live right by the site that their property values would not drop with a rehab center for a next-door neighbor. Three of the residents who spoke at the zoning hearing worked in residential and commercial real estate, and one said he would move out of the neighborhood if this facility was built.

The potential adverse impact to the neighborhood can't necessarily be predicted in advance. Most concerns are speculative, at this point—but that doesn't make them any less real for the

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

people who live, and work nearby.

Peggy Huffman is one of the owners of Montessori Day School, which serves children ages 3 through middle school. She expressed concern that her enrollment could drop if parents learned that a residential rehab center was to be built less than two blocks from her school. But in the zoning code, placement near schools, churches or other community gathering places is not prohibited for these "community residence centers."

Under the terms of the new use permit for these types of centers, the facilities: cannot be within 1,320 feet of a similar home or center; must have a maximum lot coverage of 25 percent; must provide a minimum of 100 square feet of usable outdoor open space per bed; and must allow vehicular access only from an arterial or collector street.

The basic use permit conditions also still exist, which state that use will not cause an adverse impact on adjacent property or properties in the area. Adverse impacts would include, for

example: a significant increase in vehicular or pedestrian traffic in adjacent residential areas; emission of odor, dust, gas, noise, vibration, smoke, heat, or glare at a level exceeding ambient conditions; and contribution in a measurable way to the deterioration of the area or contribution to the lowering of property values.

It is that last one that neighbors are focused on. Some noted studies that reflect a similar drop in property values, however, it was pointed out many of those studies include methadone clinics, which are non-residential. In addition, NAC does not administer methadone as part of its treatment plan.

The granting of a use permit is at the zoning administrator's discretion. Zoning Administrator Frank Dolasinski exercised the option to "take it under advisement," which meant he has no more than 30 days from the Sept. 20 hearing date to make his ruling. Neighbors have already stated that should Dolasinski approve the use permit, they will file an appeal with the city's Board of Adjustment, which likely would hear the case in November or December.

Mall. The 2004 Regional Transportation Plan identified a 12-mile route that would travel from Indian School Road to around 24th Street, possibly up the I-51 or close to it, and then over to around Tatum and Cactus. The other proposed route was developed from the Phoenix Transportation 2050 Plan, launched in 2015, offering an 8-mile stretch that would travel from the Metrocenter Mall station east along Dunlap Avenue to 7th Street, and then up Cave Creek and east on Cactus Road.

These are still very conceptual, as "feasibility studies," with a goal to identify the best option for potential further analysis by the city of Phoenix and Valley Metro. The projected opening date is tentatively set for 2034.

Residents have expressed concern on the Nextdoor.com online platform about the crime activity that has plagued the station at 19th and Dunlap avenues being extended into Sunnyslope, which already struggles with a high transient population. They also are aware of the negative impact light rail construction has had on other businesses in the past, and worry that it might harm businesses in the heart of Sunnyslope between Central Avenue and 7th Street, along Dunlap Avenue.

Many think the money would be better spent fixing up some of the crumbling city streets and replacing the "melting" large street signs at many of the lighted intersections in the North Central community. Others have suggested investing the transportation funds into increasing security on the trains and platforms.

Some spoke out in favor of an extension to Paradise Valley Mall, saying it is both an employment hub and shopping destination, and pointing out that ending the light rail at a non-destination like 19th and Dunlap avenues has contributed to the problems there. They also support adding more public transportation options to decrease traffic congestion and air pollution.

After the last of the community meetings are held, Valley Metro will complete its evaluation and prepare a final feasibility report with its recommended route. Valley Metro will then coordinate with the city of Phoenix on the "next steps." For more information, visit https://www.valleymetro.org/projects and click on the "Northeast" box.

The community meeting to update

residents about the progress of the Northwest Phase II Extension to Metrocenter Mall is set for 6-7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 4 at College America, 9801 N. Metro Parkway E.

The 1.5-mile Northwest Phase II route includes three stations, a parkand-ride lot, a traction power substation, and the bridge across the 1-17 freeway to the perimeter of the mall. The route will travel up 19th Avenue and eventually over to 25th Avenue, crossing the freeway at Mountain View Road. The projected opening date of the extension is 2023.

The work to underground or relocate utilities along the 1.5-mile extension will begin next year. The Oct. 4 meeting is to update the community about the project's Environmental Assessment (EA), which details the level of potential impact the project will have on noise, vibration, traffic and parking, as well as recreational and historic resources. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Two books highlight Phoenix attractions

In the late 1950s, philanthropist Robert Maytag, the grandson of the Maytag Company founder, had a dream that the growing city of Phoenix needed a world-class zoo. Under Maytag's leadership, the dream became a reality in 1962.

A new book by Debbie Veldhuis explores the history and present of the Phoenix Zoo, one of the biggest privately owned nonprofit zoos in the United States—and one of the most visited places in Arizona.

Veldhuis and her brother, Doug, were at the Phoenix Zoo on opening day in 1962. An author, photographer and animal lover, she spent three years in the Army as a photojournalist on a joint service newspaper. She currently works for the Phoenix Public Library. "Phoenix Zoo" is published by Arcadia Publishing, based in Mount Pleasant, S.C., and retails for \$21.99.

Last month saw the release of "Pioneer & Military Memorial Park of Phoenix," by Derek D. Horn with assistance from members of the Pioneers' Cemetery Association.

Pioneer & Military Memorial Park, located at 1313 W. Jefferson St. in downtown Phoenix (http://www.azhist cemeteries.org), exists to honor the legacies of early residents buried in seven historic cemeteries established in 1884 and closed in 1914.

Horn, along with members of The Pioneers' Cemetery Association, delve into the past and bring to light the movers, shakers and regular folks who built this ever-growing desert city. Henry Garfias, a popular and prominent lawman, once served the town as constable and marshal. Rose Gregory, once of the Phoenix's most colorful forerunners, is remembered as benevolent madam. Charles Posten was once regarded as the "father of Arizona."

Medical school to be built at Park Central

Phoenix's health care landscape is about to change significantly—as is one of Phoenix's most iconic properties.

Creighton University, a Jesuit, Catholic University located in Omaha, Neb., has reached an agreement on the construction of a new, nearly \$100 million health sciences campus at Park Central in midtown Phoenix, a significant expansion of the university's current presence in the state.

Phase one of the project includes a new building totaling 200,000 square feet that eventually will house nearly 800 Creighton health sciences students in Arizona. The expansion will include a four-year medical school, nursing school, occupational and physical therapy schools, pharmacy school, physician assistant school and emergency medical services program. A second building adjacent to the first may be added in the future.

The new building will be located along Central Avenue on the Park Central property, on land that is currently a parking lot. Construction on the new building will begin in spring 2019, and is expected to be completed in spring 2021.

In the interim, Creighton University's College of Nursing, which launched its first Phoenix-based Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing program in January, will move into a temporary home at Park Central effective January 2019. The School of Medicine, which first came to Phoenix in 2009, will continue operating its

third- and fourth-year programs out of space adjacent to Dignity Heath St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center until construction is completed.

The new Phoenix campus for Creighton will meet the university's current needs while providing ample room for expansion in the future, and the central Phoenix location makes it convenient for students doing their residencies and other studies at nearby hospitals.



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



about how American educators work with diverse student populations.




AmeriSchools offers school lunch program

Teacher creates detailed carving

A new carved corpus of Christ hangs from the cross in the Chapel of Our Lady on the Xavier College Preparatory campus. Joining the other carved pieces of the altar and ambo, this exquisite work completes the interior of the chapel. The corpus was completed in June and installed before students returned to campus in August.

Carved from soft maple, this newest work, by Xavier teacher Nathan Ward, took three years to carve.

"There are so many anecdotes from my time working on this piece," Ward said. "I wasn't sure how I would accomplish it. I eventually asked Jesus to guide my hands and they became his power tools for the carving."

Never having carved a sculpture with mallet and chisel, Ward worried about using hand tools while mastering the technique on the carving. His greatest challenge was carving the drooping head with all the technical aspects involved in that portion of the corpus.

Ward recalls, "I traveled to Lourdes on the Xavier pilgrimage a few years ago. While there, I was struck by the life size crucifixes and got a lump in my throat when I saw them. I got the same lump in my throat when I saw the corpus installed in the Xavier chapel."

School for Seniors begins on Oct. 15

For many seniors with cognitive issues, the idea of going back to school might seem daunting, or even impossible. But at SunTree Center, 4120 N. 20th St., a new program has launched that keeps seniors mentally active and engaged.

Van Nguyen, program director at SunTree, developed the School for Seniors curriculum which she says follow three fundamental concepts: Purpose, Engagement and Socialization (PES).

Those who are already members of the center's Adult Day Program can take School for Seniors at no additional charge. The next session begins on Monday, Oct. 15. New members are welcome to enroll in the center and take advantages of the School for Seniors classes. The 12-week curriculum may include courses incorporating dance or music, storytelling and other topics that touch on the participants' emotional, cognitive and physical health.

"School for Seniors is about stimulating what was once learned and what was once everyday knowledge. It is about stimulating the senses, reactivating parts of the brain and the memories—remembering one's history," Nguyen explains.

Handouts are available for care-

givers to continue the exercises at home. "Instead of homework, we call it 'Home Fun,'" Nguyen says. "The caregiver works with our senior scholar to expand on their knowledge and experience."

Some classes are taught by SunTree staff members, while others are taught by Valley nursing students. The seniors

scholars not only benefit from these courses that can tap into their long-term memories, but also benefit from being with others through socialization, peer support, and emotional connectivity.

"They are excited to be students again, and it helps preserve their dignity and elevates their quality of life," Nguyen says.



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

Dogs and doughnuts worth sitting up and begging for By Marjorie Rice

There's an old saying that when life hands you lemons, make lemonade.

In a twist on that adage, Brad and Kat Moore, handed lemons by the Great Recession of 2008, decided to make hot dogs. And doughnuts.

Really delicious hot dogs—on puffy naan bread, served with a creative array of toppings (think mango chutney with a drizzle of mayo; or chipotle cream cheese with sautéed onion and fried bread-and-butter pickles). And divine brioche doughnuts, from traditional favorites like maple-bacon to spicy Thai coconut and chocolate cake doughnuts topped with peanut butter icing and chocolate covered pretzel crumbles.

All this deliciousness is rooted in professional challenges for the husband and wife team. He was in banking, she

was an interior designer. When the recession hit, his bank closed, and her employer hit the wall when home construction came to a screeching halt in the state.

They decided to take a very different road.

"We've always been passionate about food, and Kat is an exceptional cook," Brad says. "When Kat was in college, she wasn't sure if she wanted to go into culinary or interior design. I talked her out of doing culinary, and here we are, 12 years later, in the food business.

"The food truck was a perfect opportunity for us," Brad explains. "It was less expensive to start than a brick-and-mortar restaurant, and we could do it on a part-time basis with less overhead. We thought if we love it, great, and if things don't go well, we'd have the food truck to sell and recoup some of our investment."

Fortunately for the Moores—and for Valley hot dog aficionados—the business took off, and today encompasses three trucks and two restaurants, with a third on the way.

"We've had amazing community support and have been able to grow," Brad says.

A big reason is the quality of the dogs.

"Our hot dogs are unique," he points out. "The meat is all natural and

nitrate-free and preservative-free. We offer six types, including a vegetarian dog, so we can accommodate any dietary preferences. And we decided to make our hot dogs truly unique, so our topping combinations not just your typical onions, mustard and relish."

Their best seller is a combo called The Bear. "It sounds weird, but it's very purposeful," Brad says. "It's peanut butter, bacon, smoked Gouda, barbecue sauce and crumbled Cracker Jacks. People think it's going to be a sweet dog, but I say it kind of marries together like a Thai peanut sauce. The Cracker Jacks give it some texture, but it's not sweet at all. Kind of like when you put potato chips on a sandwich as a kid."

All this is packed into puffy naan, Indian-style flatbread.

"I hated hot dog buns because all the stuff just falls out the bottom after the first bite, so we serve all our hot dogs on naan," Brad explains. "It really holds up well with the dog and all the toppings."

Their first brick-and-mortar restau-

rant was on Roosevelt Street in downtown Phoenix. After five years they decided a move to 7th Avenue in the Melrose District was a better fit, which was accomplished in late July. They added Rollover Doughnuts next door, eventually combining the two.

"It's in walking distance to our house, and we've lived in that neighborhood for 17 years," Brad says. The Melrose location also was larger, allowing them to offer breakfast, lunch and dinner and weekend brunches.

A second location can be found in Biltmore Fashion Square, with a walkup window and outdoor tables for diners in the Union Shops area.

And now the Moores are planning a third restaurant, at the northeast corner of 19th and Northern avenues in the former location of For Love of Chocolate. That is expected to open in mid-December.

"One of the reasons we're so excited about being in the 19North community is that it has a lot of the same characteristics in the surrounding neighborhood as the Melrose location," Brad points out.

Meanwhile, the Moores continue to operate the food trucks that go out three or four times a week, primarily for catering and private functions and corporate events. "We still go out to festivals and street fairs, including second Fridays at 19North," Brad says. One more note. What are hot dogs without beer?

"One thing a lot of people may not know about is our amazing selection of beers and whiskeys," Brad adds. "We have more than 90 beers—many craft beers in cans—and 11 whiskeys at our location on Melrose, representing local breweries and distilleries. We're really excited about our beer program and our happy hours."



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
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
