Clinic delayed, SB 1535 advances

Community activists in the Sunnyslope area received some welcome news last month, as officials with an opioid treatment center slated to open later this year have agreed to look at alternative uses for the space—even as new legislation moves through the Arizona Senate that directly targets these types of opioid treatment program (OTP) facilities.

Community Medical Services (CMS), which announced in November that it would open a new OTP clinic at 15th Avenue and Hatcher Road by summer, has instead taken a step back on its plans as it works with neighborhood businesses and other area stakeholders to potentially find a less controversial use of the property, located at 1507 W. Hatcher Road.

CMS doesn't own the property but has entered into a lease agreement with Scottsdale-based Western American Investments LLC, which bought the property in early November. After receiving a lot of push-

Dutch Bros. at busy corner to close

The Dutch Bros. at the northwest corner of Central Avenue and Camelback Road, which has created traffic and parking issues almost since the day it first opened, will shortly be closing.

While a firm date to shut down Dutch Bros. at 4 W. Camelback Road has not yet been set, the closing itself was confirmed at a Feb. 15 Phoenix Zoning Adjustment hearing. A lawyer representing Dutch Bros. said at the hearing that a new location is planned to open further west, at 140 W. Camelback Road.

The city of Phoenix Planning and Development Department filed an application to seek possible revocation of the business's use permit for its drivethrough, as well as a variance to allow use of the public right-of-way (alley), after receiving numerous complaints from adjacent business owners who said their customers couldn't get to them because the alley was continuously clogged with cars, or people were parking in their businesses' spaces so they could walk up to the order window at Dutch Bros.

The traffic congestion at that corner, a busy intersection across from a light rail stop and with a bus bay directly in front, became a public safety concern, according to city officials.

The store closed its walk-up counter in attempt to

be a good neighbor and lost 17 percent of its sales, said Jim Thompson, the franchise owner of the store. It was assumed that if nobody had to park a car, the issue could be resolved.

That clearly was not the case, according to Trent Martin, owner of the 22-year-old skateboard shop Cowtown at the strip mall directly to the north. Martin said that he has had customers that are Yelp users publish that they left before entering the store because they were inconvenienced by the lack of parking.


"It's an old building where there is one row of parking. When you back out of our parking lot you are backing onto Central, basically. They can't loop around the property because the Dutch Bros. drive-

Local activist Green lauded on her birthday

If you've lived for any length of time in Sunnyslope, you have heard the name Winifred Green. Maybe you've seen her speak in front of the Phoenix City Council. Maybe you've driven by the park at 17th and Peoria avenues that bears her name.

Or maybe you've popped into Antique Outpost and found Green behind the counter—where you can find her on most days since she and her husband, Frank, opened the shop in 1967.

Green, who turned 90 last month, shows little sign of slowing down. When asked about retirement, she shoots back, "Why should I? What else would I do?"

Green is originally from West Virginia and moved to the Globe/Miami area in the early 1950s, before moving to Sunnyslope around 1960. She is one of the founding members of the Sunnyslope Village Alliance (SVA), and served as its first woman president in the early 1990s. She also was the first president elected to a two-year term instead of a one-year term.

She was active in the Sunnyslope Historical Society for many years and still attends meetings and programs at the History Museum.

Over the years Green has served in many volunteer roles, including various block watch and neighborhood Fight Back programs, community improvement projects through First Christian Church, and she served as chairperson for the citizen advisory committee that was instrumental in the development of "her" park's master plan. Of course, at the time she had no idea the city was

going to name the park in her honor. The city built the park on a blighted dirt lot next to the Sunnyslope Youth Center and named it after Green in March 2007.



through blocks the lanes," Martin explained.

Kimber Lanning, owner of Stinkweeds, located in the Medlock Plaza directly to the west, spearheaded a letter-writing campaign by affected businesses owners who had long fought against the illegal parking issue, even going so far as to make up "No Dutch Bros. parking" sandwich boards that could be placed out near their designated parking spaces.

Dutch Bros executives contend they attempted to address the complaints they had received. However, Lanning argued their security guards don't enforce the rules.

"Management says 'that's not the Dutch way'," Lanning said in a form letter she drafted, proving that "the guards are just for show and not actually there to make it safer."

Gammage and Burnham lawyer and Dutch Bros representative, Cameron Artigue, admitted the current site has unique and perhaps unfixable problems. "Were we opening a brand new store in 2019, this is not the sight we would pick," said Artigue, adding that attempting to reconfigure the property was not an optimal long-term solution.

As a result, he had a pre-application meeting with the City of Phoenix on Feb. 14 to discuss transitioning the shop's location to 140 W. Camelback Road. Due to that meeting's pending decision, Artigue requested a 30-day continuant to the zoning adjustment hearing.

Thompson deeply apologized for inadvertently creating what had become an unworkable situation for many. Thompson said that after the recession, he didn't expect sales to blow up to \$10,000 dollars a day. He recognized the grief caused, and said that after a lot of contemplation, the win-win situation would be to move the store.

Lindsey Leavitt, a lawyer from Jennings Strouss, which represents many of the businesses adjacent to Dutch Bros., is confident the shut down will occur whether Dutch Bros. commits to another location or not.

Neighboring shop owners requested that Dutch Bros. spend the remainder of its time at that location bringing its security guards back and providing them with the teeth to enforce the no parking regulations and prevent cars from blocking the alley or city bus bay.

Circle K relocates to Hatcher and 7th Street

A brand-new Circle K gas station and mini mart opened last month at 9418 N. 7th St., on the property where a former Shell gas station and drivethrough car wash once stood.

The built-from-the-ground-up store at the northwest corner of 7th Street and Hatcher Road replaces the older, smaller Circle K at the southwest corner of 7th Street and Mountain View Road, less than half a mile to the north. That store had two aging gas pumps—and a wealth of problems, according to nearby neighbors. Drug activity, panhandling, theft, loitering by transients and more issues plagued the small store, spilling over to the public bus stop adjacent to it on 7th Street.

The property at Mountain View, purchased by Circle K in January 1998, has been fenced off, and the company says it will be sold with deed restrictions that prevent another convenience store, liquor store, smoke shop or gas/motor fuel station opening there.

But it was the single-serve liquor sales, residents contend, that kept bringing the transients to the area, with their pockets full of change to buy a single can of beer or 40-ounce bottle.

The new Circle K store is selling single beer/wine, "but we will not sell in containers of 40 ounces or greater," says Suzy Peel, director of Circle K's Real Estate Development-Arizona Division.

That's small comfort to residents who worry the same "bad element" will now travel the short distance down the street to continue to purchase their single beer/wine at the new, larger location, which is open 24/7, 365 days a year.

"Security needs are continually evaluated and we are working with local law enforcement agencies to ensure the safety of our employees, customers and the community," Peel said, adding that the new store has 20 security cameras with 24/7 monitoring from the Circle K Arizona Security Center. Law enforcement has immediate access to video.

In addition, the site is very well lit and the back of the store is fenced "to deter vagrancy and trespassing," Peel said. An Authority to Arrest is on file with Phoenix Police Departments for any vagrants or trespassers.

back from the neighborhood, including members the Hatcher Urban Businesses (HUB) alliance, CMS agrees to look at alternative uses of the site, such as enhanced counseling services.

"Our goal is to provide additional service options to the hundreds of people in the Sunnyslope area that already use our OTPs," said Michael Eggers, Chief Operations Officer for CMS. "We are working with community leaders on what this looks like and we feel their input is an important part of that process."

Members of the HUB are hopeful CMS will continue to work with them going forward and come up with a solution for the space that allays their concerns while still serving CMS's clients—but in a capacity other than daily medication distribution.

In the meantime, a bill directed at the operators of these OTPs passed its first hurdle last month as it received a unanimous vote to move forward from the eight-member Senate Health and Human Services Committee.

Senate Bill 1535, sponsored by Sen.

Kate Brophy-McGee and co-sponsored by Sen. Heather Carter, Sen. Tony Navarrete and Rep. Robert Meza, establishes reporting requirements for OTPs who receive reimbursement from the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS), as well as AHCCCS contractors.

If passed, the bill would essentially direct OTP providers that receive reimbursement from AHCCCS or its contractors to submit an annual report that contains, among other things, a Community Relations and Education Plan that includes procedures to minimize the negative impact the OTP may have on the community. The plan must contain consideration of community needs and impacts when selecting a site for the program or program growth, and consideration of community input on the potential impact the program may have on the surrounding neighborhood.

Under the plan, the OTP would designate a liaison to work with community leaders to address or resolve community problems, including patient loitering, parking and traffic, and ensure that program operations "do not affect community life adversely."

SB 1535 contains additional directives, such as compliance with all tracking, reporting and evaluation requirements already set forth in federal regulations. Those reports include average daily patient census, square footage of the provider's location, and the number of patients served by each medication-assisted treatment type offered by the provider (generally, Suboxone, methadone, and Vivitrol).

In addition, the annual report must include a comprehensive plan related to the care of all patients and how the OTP program ensures that appropriate standards of care are being met.

What gives the bill its teeth is that if an AHCCCS-contracted OTP provider's annual report is rejected because the administration identify areas of concern regarding compliance with state rules, federal regulations and administration policies, or because the report does not demonstrate enforcement of public relations plans, security plans and other required plans, then the OTP provider has 30 days to fix the issues identified. If at that point the

OTP provider doesn't get the revised plan back in the 30 days allotted, or the revised report is still not approved, the administration will cut off all reimbursements by AHCCCS or its contractors until the report is approved.

While opponents argue the legislation adds an unnecessary extra layer of government to policies that already exist for OTPs under federal regulation, proponents point out that those policies regarding community relations, safety plans, etc. are considered "guidelines" and are typically unenforced.

By adding the financial penalty for non-compliance, OTP providers now have the incentive to work with the adjacent communities or face costly consequences.

The Senate Health and Human Services Committee gave unanimous approval to pass the bill to the next stage during its public hearing on Feb. 20. Carter and Navarrete are members of the committee, and McGee is the chair.

But the bill still has a long way to go before it reaches the governor's desk, and it may undergo several changes before then.

Kiwanis launch library project at apartments

Every child should have access to books, no matter their economic status. So believes the North Phoenix Kiwanis Club, and members backed up that belief last month in a tangible way.

In keeping with Kiwanis International's Read Around the World Initiative, the local Kiwanis club on Feb. 15 set up free lending libraries in the leasing offices of two Phoenix apartment complexes: Dunlap Falls at 3333 W. Dunlap Ave., and Villa Toscana at 10201 N. 33rd Ave. Three more "lending libraries" are in the works, also planned for area apartment complexes that serve more socioeconomically challenged families.

The Kiwanis purchased an assortment of books from the First Book Marketplace, using grant monies from Walmart and Ross Dress for Less. In addition, members held a book drive and brought in several hundred donated books just via word of mouth.

The Kiwanis then contacted the

Friends of the Phoenix Public Library, the nonprofit organization that supports the city's library system. The Friends group works with area organizations that provide literacy programs for children, and allows those organizations to come to their warehouse and select up to 250 to take for free. This offer is available to these groups

one time each year.

With nearly 1,800 books in hand, from beginning readers to mid-teen, the Kiwanis were ready to launch their first lending library. Members recalled having worked with Dunlap Falls on a different project, and found the property's new management company, Chamberlain & Associates, to be accom-

modating and eager to participate.

From there, the North Phoenix Kiwanis reached out to other business partners in the community, including American Furniture Warehouse, which donated 10 bookshelves, and Rockler Woodworking, which custom engraved each bookshelf. In addition, Williams Express Printing created custom labels, and workers in the vocational program at ValleyLife placed those labels inside each book that will go into a Kiwanis lending library.

More than 400 books—from fantasy, to literature, to educational topics like science, math and geology—were placed in each of the two lending libraries unveiled on Feb. 15. Additional books are still be gathered, not just for future lending libraries, but also to replace books that may go missing or unreturned at the existing locations.

The North Phoenix Kiwanis is continuing to collect books and also is looking for volunteer readers to come to these spaces on a periodic basis and be available to read to children after school and on Saturdays. For more information, e-mail KiwanisLibrary@yahoo.com.







Hearing loss can lead to isolation, dementia

Everybody thinks "we hear with our ears," and while that is partially correct, the process of hearing actually happens at the level of the brain. If your clinician thinks hearing first and not brain first in his or her treatment plan, you are missing out on many long-term lifestyle benefits, according to Dana L. Day, a clinical audiologist with Arizona Balance & Hearing Aids (ABHA).

Age-Related Hearing Loss, a progressive and degenerative disorder resulting from the loss of receptor cells (i.e. hair cells) in the ear, can have a significant impact on several key brain areas, including the memory, hearing, speech and language portions of cognitive function, Day explains.

Several key research studies have pointed to the potential links of hearing loss and dementia, including a

groundbreaking study from Johns Hopkins Medical Center that indicated untreated hearing loss can increase risk of dementia by 200-500 percent.



Online platform helps fund club supplies

Arizona native Amy Armstrong, a mother of two, was alarmed several years ago to learn about Arizona's high dropout rate.

Already active in the philanthropic community, Armstrong founded Support My Club in 2012 after attributing part of the growing dropout numbers to the lack of extracurricular activities that help take some of the stress off academics, build camaraderie and support, and give students a place where they belong. She started with raising funds for programs at Camelback High School, and it quickly grew from there.

Since crowdfunding was already becoming a familiar presence in the general population, she used that idea to build an online platform to connect students in need with community donors. By providing an e-commerce solution where donors can supply needed items, Support My Club is able to equip students to pursue their interests and reduce their own out-of-pocket costs and time spent on fundraising.

Once a year, Support My Club holds a flash-funding event, encouraging community members to go the extra mile, whether by picking a specific school and a specific club, or through cash donations that the organizers can spread among different student requests.

While items that receive funding throughout the year are drop-shipped as ordered, after a flash-funding period, Support My Club brings many of the items to the schools in a an in-person distribution event.

Such an event was held, appropriately, on Valentine's Day at Camelback High School, where Support My Club first began. A total of 26 clubs received nearly \$19,000 worth of items at the Feb. 14 event, including: the Archery Club, which got two packs of arrows; the Wrestling club, which received four packs of ear guards; the Swim Club, getting several swim caps; the Culinary Club, which toted away five boxes of vinyl gloves and two 25-pound sacks of flour; white dress gloves and two wooden flag poles for JROTC; and several packs of Gatorade and bottled water for the Athletics Club.

In addition, two clubs—DECA and FBLA—received monetary sponsorships for future state competitions, and the Dance Team received sponsorship funds for dance costumes.

Earlier in February, The Support My Club organization delivered \$1,965 worth of donations to Metro Tech clubs and sports.

Requested items can range from \$5 to thousands of dollars to cover registration and travel expenses to state and national events. All donations are tax deductible. Potential donors can search by ZIP code, school name or specific club activity. To learn more, visit https://www.supportmyclub.org.

"What's Covered" is available through the Apple App Store and Google Play. Search for "What's covered" or "Medicare." Once "What's Covered" is installed, you can use it to get reliable Medicare information even when you don't have access to your computer.

A 'clever' addition opens Across the Pond

If you think the name "Clever Koi" is well, clever, then you'll love the name of the newest restaurant opened by Nicholas Campisano and Joshua James right across the breezeway. It's called, fittingly, "Across the Pond," or ATP for short.

This 35-seat space tempts with a compact, ever-changing menu of eight different cocktails plus an extensive selection of Japanese whisky served in the traditional Japanese style, craft beer and wine, all paired with an innovative menu of traditional Japanese-style sushi hand-rolled by chef Alvaro Salinas.

Clever Koi, 4236 N. Central Ave., suite 100, opened in 2013 with four original partners. Today, it's just Campisano and James who are left from the original partnership, now called Born and Raised Hospitality, and

their business is booming—even more so with the addition of ATP.

Campisano says they wanted to "...create an environment to have a good time." That model has worked

for the partners so well that when the adjacent space became available, they jumped at the chance to open a cocktail lounge that features sushi.

Across the Pond is in Suite 101

(formerly the home of Central Wine), and the atmosphere "is nice, it's a good vibe," says Campisano.

Guests can enjoy a cocktail at ATP while waiting for a table at Clever Koi. Some of the whimsical cocktail names include, "Almost Always Bad News," which features rum swizzled in a glass and garnished with mint and an orange twist. Beer, wine, and sake also are available.

The décor in ATP mirrors the décor in Clever Koi, especially with the wicker basket lights. Their liquor license also allows guest to bring drinks from one establishment to the other. "We were blessed to take over this space," Campisano said.

While the menu at Clever Koi changes with the seasons, there are some customer favorites such as the Porkbelly steamed buns, which Campisano calls "amazing." There are also vegan and gluten-free dining options. Chef Anthony Dang created the Dan Dan Noodles, a vegan dish that has become another customer favorite.

Kids are welcome to dine and the partners keep a stack of coloring pages ready for the youngsters. Quite often they pin their art on the community board after they finish dining. The children's menu isn't printed, so just ask your server for the daily options.

Campisano is from Tucson and now lives in the North Central area. Work took him first to California, where he and a friend opened their first lounge in San Francisco when he was 22. James graduated from North High School and worked in restaurants as a bartender. The two met when they both worked at The Parlor on Camelback Road. James also lives in the North Central area.

"Nick and I are both very hands-on owners who work side by side with all our employees," says James. And while they can both pitch in on every job, "By no means am I a cook," cautions Campisano with a laugh.

"If there is a take away from both Clever Koi and ATP, it would be that we strive incredibly hard to have the most knowledgeable and educated staff in Phoenix," says James. "All our servers, bartenders and cooks go through a rigorous training process to ensure 100-percent knowledge of our products and, most importantly, our culture of hospitality."

That culture shows, as they have a steady stream of local regulars. "This is a people business," says Campisano, "people taking care of people." They also do their part to take care of the environment. They compost at all of their restaurants and their to-go containers are recyclable.

Clever Koi is open Tuesday through Thursday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., Friday and Saturday from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m., and Sundays and from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. You can reach them at 602-222-3474.


