Dreamy Draw area to close for installation

Dreamy Draw Recreation Area will be closed for about a year starting in 2021 because a water pipeline is being installed underground and major improvements are being made to the park itself.

The city of Phoenix revealed the plans to shut down the recreational area during two public open houses to share information on the project last month. City officials and an outside firm shared details of the planned 66-inch-diameter water pipeline, as well as a rehabilitated/replaced 48-inch-diameter water pipeline in North Central Phoenix.

The 66-inch-diameter pipeline that is expected to begin at the 24th Street water treatment plant around 24th Street and Maryland Avenue had drawn concerns from residents in three neighborhoods and with the Phoenix Mountains Preservation Council, Inc. over the last several months. The pipeline, which is needed to address drought concerns on the Colorado

Nonprofit aims to protect foster children

Angela Barba and her husband, Sean, have hearts for helping children and quickly bonded with the foster children they cared for in their home but their journey to adopt one of them hit a major obstacle that could have forced them to lose him.

That is when the couple had to fight to keep custody of the young boy when his biological grandparents expressed an interest in adopting him. Luckily for the Barbas, they were able to keep and adopt the little boy thanks to legal help they obtained from Generation Justice, a non-profit organization based at 3900 E. Camelback Road that advocates for foster care children. At the helm of the non-profit organization are North Central Phoenix residents Darcy Olsen, founder and CEO, and Rebecca Smith Masterson, vice president and chief counsel.

Barba said that the young boy had been severely abused and was close to death when they became his foster parents in 2017. His grandparents, who lived out of state, had never met him but when they learned of his birth in 2018, they decided they wanted to raise him. However, Angela said doctors warned that moving him to another home would be harmful as he had bonded

with the Barbas and was suffering major health problems. Making their case in court to keep their young son would have been expensive and difficult without the assistance from Generation Justice, which immediately connected her with Smith Masterson and another attorney working on behalf of the non-profit. Generation Justice provided legal assistance at no charge to the Barbas, which included calling an expert witness to testify in favor of keeping the boy with the Barbas.

"For us to be able to try to fight and be a party to the case, we had to file to intervene on the case," Barba said. "It's a lot of money and it's very hard to do

Grand Canalscape is officially open

Phoenix's Grand Canal is a modern recreation destination after undergoing a major transformation.

City officials held a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Feb. 15 near Central Avenue to officially open the Grand Canalscape, a 12-mile continuous trail along the canal. Improvements included a paved multi-use trail, pedestrian bridges, and traffic signals with crosswalks at key intersections.

The festivities stretched over a onemile portion of the trail from Ninth Avenue to Seventh Street between Camelback and Indian School roads. Participants could visit more than three dozen booths that offered games, face painting and free food and water.

Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego spoke before a small crowd at the celebration about the history of the canal system and how crucial it is to the booming metropolis Phoenix has become.

"The city of Phoenix would not exist without the canals," Gallego said. "They're our past and they deserve to be our future.

Phoenix City Councilmember Laura Pastor, who represents District 4, through which most of the canal runs, was one of a handful of city officials who attended the celebration.

Growing up in the district she now represents, Pastor said she wants the canal to unite the Valley, especially in this current age of technology.

"To me that's what's important, is to see and greet one another, especially in this day and age of internet, phones and games," Pastor said.

To enable this, 17 improved neighborhood access connections have been added to allow people greater access to medical, educational and employment centers, as well as bus and light rail lines. The trail is Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-accessible with paved walkways on both sides of the canal.

Pastor also recognizes the dangers for pedestrians with a majority of pedestrian deaths occurring in her district, which includes central Phoenix around I-17 and north of the I-10.

This is why it was paramount to add 13 new crosswalk signals where the trail crosses roadways to make it safer for pedestrians to walk.

Much of the funding came from U.S. Department the \$10.3 Transportation's million Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) Grant.

Along with another \$10 million from Salt River Project's aesthetic funds, only about \$2 million or 9-percent of the project was paid for by local funds.

Currently more than 80 miles of multi-use trails have been developed along canal banks throughout the Valley, according to a press release.

SRP has allowed licensed recreational use of the canal banks since 1964.

The Grand Canal was developed in the 1870s to bring water from the Salt and Verde rivers to the Salt River Valley and is the oldest remaining pioneer canal in the Valley north of the Salt River.

River, will offer alternative water supplies to north Phoenix as a water shortage looms, city officials have said.

Many of the residents had said they were worried about increased traffic, safety risks and potential environmental damage that the two pipelines would bring to the Preserves and the neighborhoods. Later they said they were happy the city listened to their concerns and changed the planned route for the 66inch-diameter pipeline to move it closer to the 51 freeway in one area and farther from their homes. The City Council in January approved an intergovernmental agreement with the Arizona Department of Transportation for permanent use of a right-of-way next to the 51 freeway as a different route for the 66-inch-diameter pipeline.

Libby Goff, board secretary for the Phoenix Mountains Preservation Council, is glad the 66-inch-diameter pipeline route was changed to be closer to the 51 freeway.

"This is clearly a win and it's much better than it was before," Goff said. "The pipeline will not be going through the most pristine area and it will be a lot less disruption for the neighborhood and the school (Madison Heights Elementary School)."

She said she and the others on the Phoenix Mountains Preservation Council are still concerned about the plans to put the 66-inch-diameter pipeline going "far east into the preserve" to avoid the Dreamy Draw Dam.

"Any time you disturb the desert, it just doesn't recover well," Goff said. "In most cases it's never the same as before it was disturbed. We're going to continue to watch this and work with the city on this."

The pipeline is expected to go from the 24th Street water treatment plant, north along 21st Street, then west on Myrtle Avenue and then go north near 20th Street, ending near 32nd Street and Shea Boulevard.

Dreamy Draw Recreation Area will be shut down from February 2021 to the spring of 2022 while the 66-inch-diameter pipeline is installed and other park upgrades are made. The layout of the parking lot at Dreamy Draw will be changed to create better flow and access, the old restroom will be replaced and a new bicycle lane will be built in the park. Hikers will still be able to access the Phoenix Mountains Preserve from other areas during the construction period.

The city also is planning to rehabilitate and/or replace a 48-inch-diameter water main that offers water to the north part of the system, starting from the water treatment plant at 24th Street west to Maryland Avenue, to 20th Street and north to Orangewood Avenue, where it will cross the 51 freeway and link to the existing pipeline. That pipeline has come to the "end of its useful life," said Darlene Helm, deputy Water Services director for the city of Phoenix.



for a foster family. We never could have done that without Generation Justice. It was amazing. They literally dropped everything and made it possible for us to meet with them. They are literally helping the most vulnerable population in Arizona."

Barba said their youngest son, who is 3 years old, still struggles physically and sees many specialists but is making progress and is "a totally happy kid." She and Sean also adopted another, older, boy after fostering him and they have three biological children. The couple served as foster parents for four other children, who were later reunited with their biological families.

Olsen and Smith Masterson say many children in the foster care system are being abused and neglected. They started Generation Justice in 2017 as a way to push for laws and provide other ways of protecting innocent children. The organization represents abused children, pro bono, in their court cases and provides free legal trainings to anyone trying to help foster kids in order to

ensure the children's best interests are being met. Smith Masterson manages the legal clinic, which goes to churches, schools, agencies and anywhere else to provide trainings. Generation Justice also lobbies for and has successfully gotten several laws passed that aim to protect foster care children. The organization has helped 35,000 foster children through the laws it has helped get adopted and it serves more than 200 kids every year through the legal clinic.

"We really are the 9-1-1 for foster kids," Olsen said. "We need to make sure the children are able to see equal justice under the laws."

The cause is close to Olsen and Smith Masterson's hearts. Olsen has been a foster parent to 10 children and she adopted four of them. Smith Masterson fostered and then adopted a boy when he was 17 years old and also adopted a child from China.

Olsen, who has worked extensively in public policy, said she had planned to foster a teenager but then was contacted to see if she would take in a baby exposed to methamphetamines and that began her foster parent journey.

Smith Masterson was helping her nowadopted son as his pro bono special education attorney, then decided to foster him. He had lived in more than 40 different homes and at one point had said he wanted to commit a nonviolent felony so he would be sent to prison in order to have a shelter and regular meals. Smith Masterson said he had several backpacks that he had been given with school supplies every time he moved. The backpacks were appreciated but not enough to aid the teen.

"I was his 46th placement," Smith Masterson said. "We're trying to fix the bigger problem. He needed a family, not a backpack."

Smith Masterson said her son later earned his GED and is now in the U.S.

While Generation Justice helps foster families advocate for themselves, Olsen and Smith Masterson stress that they always try to help the kids get into the best permanent, loving home that is healthiest for them, whether it is with foster parents or biological family members. Their goal is to try to implement the same protection for foster children that

youths in any other home setting with biological or adoptive parents would have including trying to help authorities rescue the many kids who disappear from foster care each year, who become vulnerable targets for sex trafficking.

Generation Justice has helped get six laws passed in Arizona, including ones that decrease the time it takes for infants, toddlers and older teens to get adopted, expedite the search for relatives and require immediate judicial review of serious cases in order to help decrease foster children and teens' deaths.

The non-profit organization, which has a small staff but many volunteers, can always use support, both in terms of financial donations or volunteer time.

While becoming a foster parent can be difficult as it is unknown how long the child will stay in the home, it is well worth it to help improve kids' lives, the

"Just take the first step," Barba said. "It's been the hardest thing we've ever done but also the most rewarding thing we've ever done."





Local TV personality to share cancer story

A North Central Phoenix long-time television and radio host, reporter and anchor who is battling lung cancer will take her place in the spotlight at an upcoming performance where she and other survivors will share their stories.

Danielle Williams is battling stage four lung cancer that has spread to other parts of her body. She and eight other women who have survived cancer will share their stories of overcoming challenges and finding purpose at the "S.T.A.R.S.: Survivors Tell A Real Story" curated storytelling performance starting at 2 p.m. on Sunday, March 22, at Scottsdale Center for the Performing Arts at 7380 E. Second St.

Still undergoing treatment, Williams, 51, has always been active, frequently hiking and working out and she has never smoked. She was having back pain and found out the cancer had spread to her pelvis, lower back and shoulder. Williams, who was diagnosed with lung cancer in November of 2018,

received radiation and had surgery on her lower spine. Now she is going through chemotherapy and has been on disability but maintains a positive attitude and as active a lifestyle as possible.

"This is just how I live my life," Williams said. "I've trained my brain and myself to be my own cheerleader.

You're the only one in charge of your life."

She wears heels and makeup to chemotherapy and is back in the gym working out, as well as hiking at Camelback Mountain.

A2ndAct, a non-profit organization, is producing the Scottsdale show. Olivia Fierro, anchor of "Good Morning Arizona" on 3TV, will serve as emcee for the event. A2ndAct supports and celebrates women who have survived all types of cancer who are using their newly discovered gifts of life and experience to give back.

Williams served as a judge on a panel that selected the other eight women for the show. She also plans to visit Washington, D.C., later this month as an invitee of the American Lung Association for Advocacy Day to advocate on Capitol Hill for funding for education, research and treatment for non-smokers who have lung cancer.



Police offer tips to stop burglaries

Banding together, reporting issues to police and arming their property with security systems are some steps neighbors should take in order to prevent more burglaries in Sunnyslope, after a recent rash of break-ins in the area.

Those were some of the tips Phoenix Police Department officials provided to many neighbors at an East Sunnyslope Neighborhood Association & Block Watch meeting at North Village Baptist Church recently.

In just one area of Sunnyslope, about a 20-mile radius of the intersection of 12th Street and Butler Drive, there were 15 residential and car burglaries in September, said Phoenix Police Commander Aimee Smith of the Desert Horizon Precinct. Smith said that was an unusually high number of home and vehicle burglaries for one month.

Phoenix Police Officer William Keech offered tips on preventing burglaries.

"What burglars look for, their mindset is the better your home looks, the more likely you have good stuff to steal," Keech said. "They want visibility into your house. They look through small windows on doors. They tap on glass to test dogs' temperament. Install wireless house security cameras. Get familiar with your neighbors."

He said police need the public's help and urged residents to write down

serial numbers for their TVs, computers, guns, electronics and other expensive items so police can track them electronically if they are stolen and criminals try to sell them. People may report burglaries and other problems after they have occurred at Crime Stop at 602-262-6151. While a burglary or other crime is in progress, the public should call 9-1-1.

In many of the recent burglaries, the burglars came in the backs of the homes, sometimes through unlocked gates and used rocks. Unmarked police cars have been patrolling neighborhoods and some arrests have been made

The peak hours for burglaries are from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Keech urged people to lock their doors and windows and to maintain their landscaping so plants are not blocking views. He also recommended installing lighting in the back, sides and front of their houses and now allowing solicitors to enter homes.

Len Stoudt, who lives around 12th Street and Las Palmaritas Drive, said his house was broken into in January of 2017. A crowbar was used to break into his kitchen window and many expensive movie posters, CDs, DVDs and Blu-ray discs were stolen.

"I had never been burglarized before," Stoudt said. "I saw open windows and oh, my God, an array of emotions from shock to utter rage."

Garden club marks 90th anniversary

In the 1920s things in the city of Phoenix were very different from how they are today but one group planted the seeds for an effort that is still blossoming.

Members meet monthly in the Encanto-Palmcroft Historic District at Valley Garden Center at 1809 N. 15th Ave. and participate in events in various locations around the Valley.

The club visits locales around the Valley to learn from master gardeners and draw inspiration. Members also make silk floral arrangements for tables at the Phoenix VA Health Care System and has linked with gardens at area schools.

In 1929, the garden club gave women a place to congregate, as they generally did not work outside of the home, said Glenna Teel, president of the Washington Garden Club of Phoenix.

"Most of us have gardens," Teel

said. "I am a third generation (member). My daughter is a fourth-generation. Our theme for this year is to nourish our world, our clubs, ourselves. I enjoy getting together with likeminded people. I'm a vegetable gardener, a dirt gardener. Gardening is just healthy; it's good for you, a good stress release. You're getting your vitamin D, your exercise."

A variety of speakers come to the garden club's meetings to share expertise on growing fruits, vegetables and flowers; pruning trees; and other gardening techniques. The group has made garden markers and hanging baskets and also gives back, including donating trees to Valley Garden Center and supporting Desert Botanical Gardens and St. Mary's Food Bank.

"We seem to be turning a tide toward growing our own food," Teel said. "We are seeing an interest in preserving our wildlife in order to grow our food. We will learn about creating an environment in our yard to support our local wildlife."







A festival at the Madison Center for the Arts this month will shine the spotlight on female filmmakers around the globe and also help transform the lives of local women.

"Soroptimist International is an international, global organization that's working to transform the lives of women and girls," said Karen Leone, chairwoman of the LUNAFEST Committee and a delegate with Soroptimist International of Phoenix. "We transform that through education and enabling opportunity. We've been

in Phoenix 82 years. We want to grow both the club and the impact."

LUNAFEST gets its name from the LUNA nutrition bars created for women by Clif Bars & Company. To inspire women and push for equality the company began LUNAFEST nearly two decades ago. The festival travels to nearly 200 cities every year, raising money for local women's causes.

There will be a raffle for prizes. Tickets to LUNAFEST are \$20 each. To purchase tickets, visit themadison.org.



Café Chat

A taste of Ireland is on tap at Rosie McCaffrey's

It's Wednesday afternoon at Rosie McCaffrey's Irish Pub and owner Seamus McCaffrey and a few pals are cheering on their beloved Celtics soccer team. Clad in the team's striped green and white jerseys, they toast a goal with Harp Irish ale, on tap at the spacious bar.

After the match, McCaffrey chatted with customers, welcomed newcomers and shared a laugh with familiar faces.

A native of Belfast, Northern Ireland, McCaffrey came to Arizona in 1981. His background wasn't in operating pubs, but necessity called.

"When I first got to Phoenix, it was summer, and I asked where I could find an Irish pub," he said. Someone mentioned a downtown spot and McCaffrey made a beeline for the bar.

"I asked for a pint of Guinness and the bartender says, 'We don't have Guinness,'" McCaffrey said. "I says, 'This is an Irish pub and you don't have Guinness? Can I have a pint of Harp?' They didn't know what it was."

For McCaffrey, his only recourse was to open the Dubliner in 1984. With it, he brought something new to the state: Guinness, the silky dark ale that so symbolizes Ireland to Americans.

"We were the first in the state to pour Guinness on tap," he said. "I had to fight hard for it. The distributor said there was no market here for it."

He sold the Dubliner and opened Seamus McCaffrey's downtown, which he later sold. That property still is operating. He then opened the Blarney Stone in Scottsdale, which he later sold, and in

2001 opened Rosie's, named for his wife. His daughter Kathleen McCaffrey-Flick, a former teacher, joined Seamus in running the pub three years ago.

"This has always been my life," McCaffrey-Flick said. "I did my homework at the bar and I worked in the pubs as a server in college. An Irish pub has a family feel to it more than other bars. It's a welcoming environment."

Her son, Brady Seamus Flick, is starting on the same road. At four months old, he's a frequent visitor, coming to work with his mom.

The atmosphere is Irish, and so are the drinks - Harps and Guinness predominant, with Smithwick's and Kilkenny ales, Magners Irish Cider and Irish whiskeys - and a healthy list of Arizona and international labels.

The food menu has a similar balance of Irish and American. Fish and chips, Guinness steak and mushroom pie, shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, and Irish potato boxty (shepherd's pie, corned beef and cabbage or Guinness prime rib served between two potato pancakes) lead the list of Irish standards. The pies are made with beef

rather than lamb to cater to American tastes, Seamus said.

American standards include burgers, sandwiches, salads and appetizers, including Rosie's egg rolls: wonton skins stuffed with corned beef and cabbage. Sliders - especially with fried fish - are favorites.

Seamus conceded that corned beef and cabbage isn't really Irish, but Americans expect it so that's what he serves.

While the menu is mixed, the atmosphere at Rosie's is pure Irish, from the rollicking songs piped through the sound system to the dark, cozy atmosphere. There are live bands and karaoke several nights each week, and as the Guinness pours, the singing swells.

There's an entire wall devoted to those beloved Celtics. The rest are festooned with crockery, figurines, maps, photos, mottoes, flags, posters of Irish Revolutionary War heroes - so much that there's scarcely a bare square inch.

On St. Patrick's Day, Tuesday, March 17, the pub will rope off the parking lot for its 28th Annual St. Paddy's Day Street Fair beginning at 8 a.m. (that may






