# Associations push back against development

At a June 7 presentation to the Camelback East Village Planning Committee, the developers of Zola North Central made their case to rezone 2.55 acres located at the northeast corner of 7th Street and Colter Street. The request would rezone the lot from the existing C-2 zoning (Intermediate Commercial) to PUD (Planned Unit Development) to allow for a new, five-story multifamily residential development.

The proposal, as presented, met with opposition from area neighborhood associations.

In its narrative, the developer, ZOM Living (www.zomliving.com), states, "This project provides an opportunity to redevelop this underutilized site into a neighborhood enhancing, luxury residential community. Development of the project will help to further diversify the availability of housing types and density ranges in the immediate surrounding area, as well as attract residents with disposable incomes to spend at

# Community comes together over tragedies

In the early morning hours of June 3 and 4, two violent incidents took place that left the Sunnyslope community shaken and looking for answers.

Just before midnight on June 3, 15-year-old Damarkus Edison was shot and killed just steps outside of his home near 13th Avenue and Vogel. Barely an hour later, shots rang out at a strip mall near 10th Avenue and Hatcher, where some 100 people had gathered for a social media promoted party. That incident left another teenager dead, 14-year-old Emily Morgan, and eight others injured.

The back-to-back incidents have left one Sunnyslope family grieving and leaders looking for answers on how to help the community heal and move forward.

In an online "Go Fund Me" set up to help the family (www.gofundme.com/f/damarkus-edison-funeral-expenses), Damarkus' aunt, Nicole Walter, described the teen as, "an ambitious child who pursued the things he loved. He had a passion for music and wrote songs regularly. He enjoyed playing basketball in the park, singing at the top of his lungs, and spending time with loved ones."

Walter added, "Nothing in the world could have prepared our family for the tragic shooting that took my precious nephew's life that night. His murder is still under investigation, and we are only left to try to make sense of such a senseless tragedy."

She encourages anyone who can offer investigative leads to contact the police.

Action from city and state officials came swiftly. On June 22, the Phoenix Police Department (PD), Mayor Kate Gallego, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms & Explosives, Maricopa County Attorney's office and the U.S. Attorney, District of Arizona, were joined by the family of Emily Morgan as they announced the launch of Operation Gun Crime Crackdown, a multi-agency effort to reduce gun



# Neighborhood group urges involvement

There is a newly reorganized neighborhood association in the North Central corridor, and they are looking for neighbors to join their ranks.

The North Central Canal Neighborhood Association & Block Watch (NABW) covers the area of Northern to Dunlap, Central Avenue to 7th Street. While the organization is not entirely new — it was founded about a year and a half ago — it has recently undergone a change in leadership, adjusted its boundaries and has an updated mission. It's goal? To build a resilient and inclusive community, promote neighborhood pride and unity, connect its many diverse neighborhoods with each other and to available resources, and to be that unified voice that can speak their concerns to city, county and state officials.

Led by Wallis Hardie, president, and neighbors Joyce Brown, Bruce Canon and Kate Brophy McGee, who are part of the leadership team, the organization

is currently in the process of setting up a 501(c)3, identifying and prioritizing issues and closely collaborating with the leaders of other area organizations.

Hardie previously served the vice president of the East Sunnyslope Neighborhood Association and Block Watch, and when the founder of the Canal NABW announced she was moving out of state, Hardie stepped in. Her first order of business was to change the boundaries, which previously ran to 7th Avenue, but stopped at the canal.

The change allowed for a smaller,

more manageable, yet more diverse area, that included businesses, both big and small, multiple schools, houses of worship and both single-family and multifamily housing.

One of the top priorities for the group is to address the parking situation in the neighborhoods surrounding Sunnyslope High School. As the popular school continues to grow, overflow parking has become an issue.

Crime also is in the forefront of many neighbor's minds.

"If people don't feel safe in their

homes, people don't feel safe in their businesses... It's not a real community, it's not a real neighborhood," McGee said, adding, "We are experiencing an increase in crime, and it works so much better to be ready, to be an organized voice with the city council and with our city council members, when our voice is needed."

But as McGee points out, that also requires that those in the community get involved.

"[We] want people who are reading this to say, 'I can do that. I can show up to a meeting, I can contribute, and then if I have a problem, then I know where to bring it.'"

The group began meeting four months ago on the third Thursdays of the month at Desert Mission Anglican Church, 234 E. Alice, but Hardie says that it will be on hiatus over the summer as it works to prioritize issues and grow the organization.

The North Central Canal Neighborhood Association & Block Watch will reconvene meetings in August. In the meantime, residents who would like information on how to get involved should send an email to north-centralcanalphx@gmail.com.



the local retail and restaurant businesses within the 7th Street corridor."

According to Nick Wood, Esq., who presented in June on behalf of the development, the 194-unit Zola would consist of 24 efficiency units, 122 one-bedroom units and 48 two-bedroom units.

From the developer narrative, "The project's architectural style is focused on a modern, contemporary design vernacular, complementing the surrounding built environment while also following a development trend that has reinvented this area with higher density housing with an emphasis on quality design and visual interest within the pedestrian realm."

During the public comment period, Mike Freret, vice president of the Windsor Square Historic District laid out his and other neighborhood association's opposition.

"Windsor Square is adamantly opposed to changing the zoning from the current C-2 designation to the proposed PUD," Freret stated. "There's simply no compelling reason to permit the level of density proposed on a site that's already approved for residential at a density level that is consistent with the overall ethos of North Central. To approve such a project would be to ignore what is already an unsafe traffic level on 7th Street, which the city traffic staff has already acknowledged is operating substantially over capacity."

Freret continued that Windsor Square is not anti-development, "We've

worked closely over the years with developers in the area to be able to build creative, attractive and lucrative projects, but that exist in balance with the surrounding neighborhoods."

He added, "We are sensitive to the housing shortage that the city is under pressure to address. But let's not address that challenge by permitting wildly inappropriate developments when a more measured approach, such as asking the developer to create a residential project that works within the current zoning classification, can create a balance between municipal needs and the importance of retaining the character of historic neighborhoods."

Mary Crozier, president of the North Central Phoenix Homeowner's Association, citing a delay in communication from the developer added, "We're not opposed to the developing of this site. But the project, as presented, does not meet the minimum requirement as a superior product for our neighborhood. We appreciate and hope to use the time between now and September to work with the applicant collaboratively on this proposed PUD."

The June presentation to the committee was for information only. The developer will go the Village planning committee again in September of this year.

As some of you know we sold the Jockey Club on Highland and 22nd Street in 1985.

Dad then opened another Jockey Club in the former Navarre's Restaurant at 52 E. Camelback in Uptown Plaza in 1987 (together with Burt Lewin, Mal and Marsha Straus and Mike Hayes). We had that club until 1995 when we sold our lease to Sweet Tomatoes. The last 5 months at that location we leased the club to the producers of the major movie Waiting to Exhale, which used our club for all the nightclub scenes. The movie starred Whitney Houston, Angela Bassett, Gregory Hines and Forest Whitaker, which was really a thrill for me to see our club on the big screen.

I have said many times in this article that I was very fortunate that my dad chose to live, work and make so many friends, in North Central. It has been almost 60 years, since he moved to the Valley and if he were still alive, he would tell me two things, "son, I am very proud of you and your family" - and "Bobby, you owe me, your father, referral fees for introducing me to all of his friends and family members who have bought and sold homes from me in my 33-year real estate career living in North Central." crime in Phoenix that will launch July 5.

The Phoenix Police Department will assign detectives to precincts with the highest gun related crimes to work with neighborhood enforcement teams and patrol officers. In addition, the ATF will provide access to gun intelligence technology, PD will work in real time with Maricopa County prosecutors, and the U.S. Attorney's office when a federal crime is indicated. But above all, the community is asked to speak up when they see something.

Police Chief Jeri Williams implored, "If you hear gunfire in your neighborhood, we want you to know we need you to call 9-1-1. Please don't turn a deaf ear."

Gabe Keely, Emily's father added, "We need help." He shared his confidence that there would be justice done in this case, and added, "But it will come sooner if you help us."

Those who have information on unsolved crimes can contact Silent Witness: 480-WITNESS or 480-TES-TIGO.

As the families of the victims cope

with their loss and grief, Sunnyslope leaders are thoughtfully, resolutely looking for ways to help the community heal and move forward.

The evening of June 4, Reverend Cleo Lewis was struggling to come to terms with the night's violence.

"This was probably the last thing... getting a phone call in the middle of the night that there's a mass shooting in a tight-knit community was surprising as well as shocking. To hear that teenagers were among the victims of this was, I can't even find the words for that."

Lewis is uniquely familiar with the area. As an outreach pastor, he ministers to area families and those who are experiencing homelessness, particularly in the Hatcher corridor. As a resident for more than a decade, he is also actively involved with the West Sunnyslope Neighborhood Association & Block Watch (www.facebook.com/groups/362132434276105).

Whether it is pushing for more programs at local youth centers, implementing the Hatcher Road Community Safety Plan, which was approved by the Phoenix mayor and council in February, or just engaging the community in

ongoing dialogue, Lewis feels that there is a lot that can be done.

"Sunnyslope may not be everyone's impression of a bedrock community; it's exactly our bedrock community. So, we're going to be communicating. We're going to be talking to residents. And we're going to help everyone heal from this, and we're going get better."

Nadine Alauria echoed many of Lewis' sentiments. She is a Phoenix native and Sunnyslope transplant. Her family's business has four decades of history in the area, and she, too, is deeply engaged with the community, particularly as co-chair with Caroline Lobo of the H.U.B. — Hatcher Urban Businesses (www.sunnyslopehub.com). Her message to the community is one of safety, "If you see something, say something," and of engagement.

"I've just never seen anything like the community; the neighborhood groups working with the schools, the police department, the businesses, some nonprofits here in the area. Then we work with other business alliances and other community groups outside of Sunnyslope, not to mention the six or seven here in Sunnyslope." (www.east-sunnyslope.com/sisterblockwatches).

She added, "Even though we all might have different beliefs on this or that, I do know that everybody would agree on peace."

Those messages of peace, love and healing for the neighborhood were echoed once again at a community vigil, held June 16 at the Sunnyslope Family Services Center, across the street from where the June 4 shooting took place.

Lobo, who organized the event, opened by saying, "We have come together today in solidarity and community healing spirit."

Community members young and old performed music, read poems, shared prayers and spoke of the spirit of Sunnyslope, community togetherness and a path forward.

Lewis closed the vigil by remarking, "The theme tonight is, 'We love you. We care about you.' And we will do anything to promote your healing and wellbeing. In spite of tragedy, we stand with you and among you. And we encourage our young people to keep moving forward and pressing in."

# Do you know who your legislator is?

As we move into election season, residents may be seeing some new names on the political signs that are blossoming on just about every street corner in Phoenix. In many cases, the names aren't new to the game, just new to the district. So, what's up?

In November 2000, Arizona voters passed Proposition 106, a citizen initiative that amended the Arizona Constitution by removing the power to draw congressional and state legislative districts from the state legislature and reassigning this task to the newly created Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC).

The IRC's mission is to redraw Arizona's congressional and legislative districts to reflect the results of the most recent census, in this case, the 2020 Census. According to the commission's website, "The concept of one-person, one-vote dictates that districts should be roughly equal in population. Other factors to be considered are the federal Voting Rights Act, district shape, geographical features, respect for communi-

ties of interest and potential competitiveness." The state Constitution requires the commissioners — two Republicans, two Democrats and an independent chairperson — start from scratch rather than redraw existing districts.

A new Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission was appointed in January 2021 to adopt new congressional and legislative districts for Arizona. The new legislative maps were enacted Jan. 24, 2022.

In June, the Food and Drug Administration and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention authorized the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines for use in children as young as 6 months. The Pfizer vaccine, which had been available to everyone 5 and older, is now available to children 6 months through 4 years old. Federal officials also have authorized Moderna vaccination for children 6 months through 5 years old.

# Renters have right to cool air

As high summer temperatures continue, residents who rent their homes and find themselves with underperforming or non-functioning cooling systems have rights when it comes to keeping cool.

Phoenix City Code Sec. 39-5 mandates cooling requirements for rental housing units: "Every rental housing unit where such systems are installed shall have cooling capable of safely cooling all habitable rooms, bathrooms and flushing toilet rooms to a temperature no greater than 86 degrees Fahrenheit, if cooled by evaporative cooling, or 82 degrees Fahrenheit, if cooled by air conditioning." Also, "Required cooling shall be provided by permanently installed cooling facilities." The city's ordinance also states that heating, cooling and ventilation systems in any building are to be maintained hazard-free, operational and in a state of good repair.

### Foundation boosts workbased learning initiative

In 2020, the Greater Phoenix Chamber Foundation, embarked on a two-and-a-half-year pilot program on a work-based learning initiative for secondary education. They convened business and education stakeholders to create a strategic plan and launched ElevateEdAZ in partnership with Phoenix Union High School District (PXU). The funding will be used to embed one ElevateEdAZ College and Career Coach at each of the campuses, provide a YouScience aptitude and interest assessment to all students to help them determine their career path, fund career awareness events such as mock interviews and resume-building workshops, and provide incentives to students, teachers and schools to accelerate outcomes.

With this funding, as well as other local and national philanthropic partners, the program will expand to a total of eight high schools in 2022–23 and at least one charter school.





# Café Chat A long and winding road for Geordie's chef

As a journalism student in Michigan, CJ Kahley, today chef de cuisine at Geordie's in the Wrigley Mansion, wanted to be a travel writer, exploring different cultures through the lens of their cuisines.

His career path took a turn when he entered culinary school to get a solid grounding in cooking.

"Culinary school (Le Cordon Bleu in Las Vegas) is where the passion started," Kahley said. "I realized I enjoyed being in the field rather than writing about it."

He graduated in 2007, then began a cook's tour of another sort. Being a top restaurant chef is a journeyman's profession, with chefs moving from kitchen to kitchen to learn hands-on about different cuisines and techniques from experts, and Kahley's career has followed that path.

"I chose Las Vegas because Vegas had everything," he said. Stops included Hubert Keller's Fleur de Lis, Bouchon by Thomas Keller (no relation) and at Michael Mina at the Bellagio, then on to San Francisco, where he worked with the MINA Group, helping to open Steph and Ayesha Curry's International Smoke restaurant and PABU Japanese restaurant, among others.

"I was fortunate to live in San Francisco and visit the restaurants and chefs I had only read about," he said. Eventually Kahley made his way to Arizona and another series of kitchens, learning all the way.

It began at The Mission in Old Town Scottsdale, with chef/owner Matt Carter. "I consider him my mentor," Kahley said.

The seven years he was at The Mission was an education in Latin cuisine, Kahley said, especially learning to work with fresh and dried chiles and various citrus fruits.

" I consulted with Matt to open The Mission in Kierland Commons and Fat Ox in Scottsdale," he said. "Fat Ox has a fantastic pasta program and I learned how to make pasta from a guy there named Chops Smith. I think he's the best in the state."

Last October, Kahley joined Geordie's.

As he relaxed at the chef's table, Kahley talked about his goals for the restaurant. "We changed a couple of the pastas, and added a couple of new dishes, like the octopus fritto, but I still feel like I'm trying to figure it out — what does this want to be?"

The octopus is braised for three hours in olive oil, almost like a confit, so it's succulent and tender, then it's dipped in a squid ink tempura batter for a light, crispy crust, served over fennel puree and topped with pickled fennel.

"It's been well received," Kahley said.

Another favorite is the steamed Prince Edward Island mussels, cooked with wine, fennel and garlic, then enriched with a bit of tomato nage, a buttery coulis with sherry vinegar, and served with baguette and pistou butter.

The menu is a work in process. For now, call it eclectic.

"We call it American food because American food is basically anything and everything," Kahley said. "I take little things from my chefs as well. One of my sous chefs is Jewish — I fell in love with that cuisine when I was in San Francisco — so we talked about doing something with an Israeli influence."

About that chef's table — a long table in the spacious kitchen that serves 10. Dinners run \$175 to \$195, not including wine.

Guests come into the wine cellar and have a few small bites and some sparkling wine, then sit at the long chef's table, where Kahley prepares and serves each course.

"We go all out at the chef's table, but for our regular menu we try to keep it with as little fuss as possible," Kahley said. As an example, the prime beef tartare gets taken up a few notches for the chef's table patrons, but the foundation is the same — prime beef, aged in-house.

Kahley points out the cabinet where whole prime rib roasts are aging in controlled humidity and temperature.

"We keep them in there for 60, 65 days before we start selling them," he said.

These days, the Mansion Cut of that beef on the main dish menu is one of those "if you have to ask you can't afford it" main dishes, but the taste and texture are incomparable.

Other menu temptations include onion soup gratinee; whole branzino served with toasted farro, chicory salad, black garlic and yuzu; bucatini carbonara; and can't-miss duck fat potatoes as a side dish.

Paired with those is the mansion's award-winning 12,000-bottle wine collection, under the direction of Paola Embry.

"I don't pretend to know much about wine," Kahley said. "I know what tastes good, and what I like, but I can't tell you where it's from or what vintage it is. Just sitting with Paola, sometimes just a few minutes, I take on more knowledge than I ever had before."

Geordie's, at 2501 E. Telawa Trail, is open 5 to 9 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday (the bar opens at 3 p.m.), and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Sunday, for brunch. For more information, call 602-955-4079 or visit www.wrigleymansion.com.

# Going strong after 45 years of burgers

One hundred-twenty pounds of mesquite wood charcoal a day, a handful of dedicated employees and a passion for the restaurant business — just three of the ingredients that have kept Wesley Herrera, co-owner of The Original Hamburger Works, going the past couple of years.

Originally opened in September 1977, and modeled after The Chuckbox in Tempe, The Original Hamburger Works has been a mainstay in Phoenix's Encanto area for more than 40 years. And while Herrera is not

the original owner, it feels like he was fated to be there.

"I've been in restaurants pretty much since I was in high school. I loved it. I love restaurant work," Herrera shared.

In fact, his high school job was at The Chuckbox, so when the opportunity came in 1994 to purchase Hamburger Works, he was in the right place, the timing was good, and he jumped at the chance.

While Herrera and his business partner, Paul Marquardt, have made improvements to the dining and bar areas, much of the restaurant has remained the same. Guests are greeted with the enticing aroma of mesquite wood, and instantly transported back in time through the eclectic décor that is like a trip through Phoenix history. The walls are covered with memorabilia — from a Legend City poster (where Marquardt worked in high school) to a vintage Mary Coyle Ice Cream sign, Phoenix Fire and Police shields, along with dozens of advertising signs from bygone eras and more.

is that their burgers and chicken are cooked over an open fire with mesquite charcoal (using up to 120 pounds each day), and that customers can fix the way they like it with a variety of condiments available.

Diners can get a burger from a quarter pound up to the "Super Great One," which is a pound of beef. Also available are mesquite broiled chicken sandwiches, hot dogs, broiled fish sandwich, garden burger and fish and chips, as well as go-to sides and salads. As with most restaurants, the last couple of years have been difficult for the business. From a complete shut-down during the height of the pandemic and figuring out a delivery model to staffing challenges and now skyrocketing costs, the business is constantly adjusting to meet the ever-changing landscape of the restaurant business, "Every single day just about."

Herrera credits his amazing staff, some of whom have been at the restaurant for 20 or more years, and the restaurant's incredibly loyal customers with their survival during the recent tough times, as well as their ability to adapt.

"We're trying. Trying to keep everything new, trying to keep everything fresh," he said.

And he still loves the business.

"I always tell my wife. 'I think we're in the right business.' She says, 'Why is that?' I say, 'Everywhere I go, I always eat a hamburger. I'm in the right business."
