Small but mighty pantry serves those in need

On a morning just after Thanksgiving, the Arizona Kosher Food Pantry is absolutely bustling with activity. Volunteers are busy cooking an evening meal, sorting through donations from a recent clothing drive and putting together food boxes for neighbors who stop by seeking assistance.

All are welcome at the pantry says Daniel Gilkarov, who has managed the kitchen, kosher meat shop and other aspects of the pantry for the last two-and-a-half to three years. "Any faith, any denomination. There's no racism here. There's no discrimination."

And their service area?

"The Valley, that's the boundary," he added.

Now, thanks to grants secured by Yecheskel Friedman, president and founder, the organization has a new food service trailer, placed into action in November 2022, that will make serving the expanse of the Valley more manageable.

Ezras Cholim of Arizona was founded in 2015 by a group of volunteers, including Friedman, who sought to meet the needs of people in the Jewish Community facing catastrophic illness. The group became the foundation of the nonprofit organization, which has expanded to provide a continuum of services to alleviate hardships of sick, hungry and

Indian School property rezoning sought

The Camelback East Village Planning Committee, at its Dec. 6 meeting, heard a presentation from developers who are seeking to rezone a 5.61-acre property at the southwest corner of 22nd Street and Indian School Road from a mix of general commercial and residential zoning to a Planned Unit Development (22nd & Indian School PUD) to allow multifamily residential and limited commercial uses.

The developer, Embrey Partners, LTD, is proposing a multifamily residential development consisting of a fourstory, for-rent apartment building with a parking garage. According to the applicant narrative, the proposed development will have a unit mix of approximately 227 one-bedroom, 89 two-bedroom and 4 three-bedroom units, for total of 320 apartment units. The site will feature amenities including, but not limited to, a community club house, pool and spa, fitness center, open space landscape court with dog park, and a leasing office and mail lounge. The pool and open space landscape court provide approximately 20,325 square feet of common open space.

The narrative also says that the development will celebrate the historic quality of the site by preserving the historic sign on Indian School Road (currently for the Die Trying Training Facility and previously a Beall's Plumbing sign) and creating a compatible design with the surrounding commercial and residential areas.

During the Dec. 6 presentation, representative for the developer Wendy Riddell addressed some comments regarding the height of the project.

"One of the comments that we had early on, both from community and from [planning] staff was about



Project gives schools a 'green' boost

Arizona Sustainability Alliance (AZSA), in partnership with Bank of America, American Forests, Maryland Elementary, Washington High School, and the Girl Scouts Arizona Cactus Pine held a successful tree planting Dec. 3 to beautify the campus while providing much needed shade to students and staff. Over 50 volunteers planted 56 trees between the two school campuses.

AZSA's Tree Planting Program aims to increase shade canopy within urban spaces by incorporating native and desert-adapted trees into the landscape, as well as educating local residents on the benefits of urban forestry.

Kayla Killoren, AZSA's Tree Planting programs manager said, "I am extremely happy with the turnout of the event. Seeing people out here planting trees to help beautify the schools and improve the overall community is really rewarding.'

Regions in need of urban forestry development are often identified using the American Forests Tree Equity Score Tool (https://treeequityscore.org). This index determines need by identifying social and economic factors including unemployment rates and poverty levels, as well as ecological factors like average temperature and existing tree cover. Maryland Elementary and Washington High School both have a tree equity score of 73. Prioritizing areas with lower tree equity is crucial in Arizona, so that we can improve the overall shade canopy and bring about equitable change across all communities.

Travel identification deadline extended

In December, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security announced that it has again extended the deadline for domestic airline travelers to have a federally-compliant form of ID.

The new date is May 7, 2025. The Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division follows TSA guidelines, and still encourages people to consider getting the Arizona Travel ID to avoid delays or other travel issues at TSA checkpoints once this takes effect.

Beginning May 7, 2025, you will need a federally-compliant credential — like the Arizona Travel ID — to get past TSA checkpoints at airports for domestic flights. For most people, the main reason to get the Arizona Travel ID, the state says, is because it will make travel easier. Without the Arizona Travel ID or other form of federallycompliant identification such as a valid U.S. Passport, fliers risk missing an airline flight because the standard driver license will not be accepted at TSA checkpoints.

This credential is distinguished by a star in the upper right corner and is available to Arizona residents as a driver license or identification card.

Residents can walk in to an office for this service, but scheduling an appointment is suggested, which can be done online at www.azmvdnow.gov. Even if you haven't activated your AZ MVD NOW account, you can still schedule a Travel ID appointment.

Because the Arizona Travel ID is compliant with the federal standards, you will need to provide extra documentation.



impoverished community members. In January 2018, Ezras Cholim was named a partner agency by St. Mary's Food Bank — and its first kosher food pantry. The Arizona Kosher Pantry opened its doors to the public Feb. 14, 2018.

Currently, the pantry and its small team of volunteers provide 300-400 prepared meals each week, including 60-70 meals to Ukrainian war refugees through the Beth El Phoenix congregation.

"We do a majority of the cooking literally out of these two, little dinky ovens and this kitchen," Gilkarov said, as we walked through a small kitchen area humming with activity and into the meat preparation area.

"About 3,000 meals, nearly 4,000 meals have gone out in the last three to four months. I mean we are cooking nonstop."

The whole facility is only about 2,600 square feet, from which the staff not only prepares meals every day but serves those in need who stop by and preps the new state-of-the-art food service trailer that takes the pantry's services on the road every-other week.

"We bring it out to Solano Park and different areas where we can hand it out to the homeless, clothing for the kids, clothing for women, for men. And they can come and choose what they want," Gilkarov said, adding, "We provide this not just for the homeless community, anybody who really needs a meal. We don't charge anything for it."

Of course, to do this kind of work, grants can only get the organization so far, and donations are always welcomed, as are volunteers.

the height and wanting to make sure that we actually stepped back that height where it is adjacent to more traditional single-family residential zoning. So, the area that you see in blue [located along 22nd Street and Amelia Avenue] is actually only a maximum height of 35 feet, when its adjacent to that single-family zoning within 65 feet of the center of 22nd Street."

Riddell added that the 22nd Street streetscape would include a new five-foot detached sidewalk and 5-foot landscape strip between the curb and sidewalk.

Later in her presentation, when discussing featured and potential amenities, she noted that the developer has been talking with a local art organization to potentially bring in an artist incubator space where art could not only be show, but also provide for artist workspace.

Dreamy Draw bike path to open in 2023

After its closure for construction of the Drought Pipeline, the Dreamy Draw bike path is now scheduled to be completed and opened in early 2023. In addition, the Perl Charles Memorial Trail (#1A) remains closed as construction of the 66-inch pipeline continues and is anticipated to reopen early 2023.

Open routes within the Phoenix Mountains Preserve include the 22nd Street trail, 32nd Street trail, 40th Street trail, Mesquite trail, Quartz Ridge trail, Piestewa Peak Park, and Trail 100.

Dreamy Draw Recreation Area and its facilities are anticipated to reopen in the summer of 2023. The City of Phoenix held a celebration Dec. 21 as the final section of pipe in the drought pipeline is set to be installed to address drought conditions. As of Dec. 19, the City says that the final section will be fully installed in the next few weeks of final construction and added that restoration activities have been delayed due to supply chain issues and the high demand for construction services in the Valley.



Council approves GO Bond Program

Tuesday, Dec. 13, Phoenix City Council voted to approve the proposed \$500 million 2023 GO Bond Program as presented by the GO Bond Executive Committee.

After three months of committee deliberation and public input, the GO Bond Executive Committee recommended several projects and programs for City Council consideration. A summary of allocations per subcommittee as well as a list of recommended projects/programs to be completed is available on the City's website.

Phoenix City Council approved the following allocations per program area totaling \$500 million: Arts & Culture, \$50,385,000; Economic Development & Education, \$38,000,000; Environment & Sustainability, \$26,000,000; Housing, Human Services & Homelessness, \$63,000,000; Neighborhoods & City Services, \$44,615,000; Parks & Recreation, \$64,000,000; Public Safety, \$132,500,000; and Streets & Storm Drainage, \$81,500,000.

City staff will begin the next steps to prepare election materials for City Council approval and then voters will decide the outcome during a November 2023 Special Bond Election.

In a released statement, Mayor Kate Gallego applauded the GO Bond committees for the months of effort that went into creating the final proposals.

"This was a complex project, and our committee members — who already lead busy lives — generously gave of their time and expertise to prioritize and craft these proposals that came to the council today. I am deeply grateful for their commitment to making the City of Phoenix a better place." Read more about the proposed projects at www.phoenix.gov/bond.

Homeowner guidance, assistance available

Arizonans who fell behind on their mortgage or are struggling to make payments due to effects from COVID-19 can receive free help from nonprofit housing counseling agency Take Charge America to apply for up to \$40,000 in financial assistance through the Arizona Homeowner Assistance Fund.

The fund is a \$196 million program funded by the American Rescue Plan to

prevent foreclosure among the state's most vulnerable homeowners. The program provides up to \$40,000 per household to pay for mortgage, property tax or homeowner association delinquencies that could lead to foreclosure. HAF funds can also be used to pay other eligible housing costs including overdue utility and insurance bills.

To be eligible for the HAF program, homeowners must have experienced a financial hardship after Jan. 21, 2020, due to COVID-19 (job loss, reduction of income, increased healthcare costs, caring for a family member); have an income equal to or less than 150% of the area median income; and seek assistance for their primary residence.



The grants typically range from \$20,000 to \$500,000 and are awarded to strategic projects, with measurable outcomes, that demonstrate tangible, positive impact to the community and align with one or more of Mercy Care's community health focus areas.

These health focus areas are Managing Chronic Conditions; Supporting Mental Health and Well-Being; Addressing Housing Security; and Empowering Recovery from Substance Use.



AlphaGraphics breaks ground

After a decade-long search to find the perfect Camelback Corridor building site, AlphaGraphics Camelback will move into an all-new, custom-built printing facility on the southwest corner of 24th Street and Campbell Avenue in 2023.

Founded in 1981 and still operated by Tucson native Larry Furlong, the Camelback franchise is the fifth-highest volume location out of 270 AlphaGraphics nationwide.

Furlong first fell in love with printing during freshman year in high school, when he signed up for class at the school's print shop. After seeing a note that the AlphaGraphics near campus was seeking students for afterschool jobs, he started working part time, and then transferred to the company's new location in downtown Phoenix the day after graduation. Working his way up to manager right around the time that the company started franchising, Furlong launched his own franchise Oct. 10, 1981.

Defying predictions that the digital revolution would lessen the need for print shops, the Phoenix company has grown to more than 35 full time employees and often runs its printing press 24 hours a day. Which led to the search for the new space.

"After three decades in central Phoenix, we had outgrown our existing location, which pre-dated the digital printing revolution and was originally designed in the 1960s as an appliance store, so it was always an awkward fit for a print shop," Furlong said in a released statement. "But we were determined to stay in the Camelback Corridor, which meant competing with national chains for some of the most expensive real estate in the state."

Housed on the site of a former gas station at 24th street and Campbell Avenue, just a half-mile from the exist-

ing location at 2120 E. Camelback Rd., the company says that it worked with LGE Design Build to craft a bespoke printing facility that will serve the neighborhood and beyond for the next three decades. Besides expanding the previous footprint by 2,000 sq. ft., the stylish, contemporary design features a soaring double-sided glass atrium entry. Stepping into the high-tech printing bay, the sleek, grey concrete block walls are broken up with peak-through window walls to showcase the bustling print floor, and new, larger digital equipment that it couldn't fit at the old location.

"Because technology changes so quickly, we will be retiring a lot of our printers and taking advantage of our firstever facility designed for the digital age from the ground up," Furlong added.

In addition, as part of the company's commitment to eco-friendly practices, including using 90 percent FSC certified paper from sustainably managed forests, the lumber used in the new building will also be FSC certified. The new 12,000 sq. ft., state-of-theart, eco-friendly printing facility is scheduled to open in mid-2023.

Business Briefs Dunkin looks to develop Dunlap site

At a Dec. 1 Zoning Adjusting hearing, several zoning variance requests were approved that will facilitate a new Dunkin drive-through location at 701 W. Dunlap Ave.

Located on the southwest corner of 7th and Dunlap avenues, the property has been sitting vacant for many years. It is also directly across 7th Avenue from BlackRock Coffee Bar and less than a block away from locally owned Cultivate Coffee.

The existing building, a defunct gas station, and its canopy will be demolished, and the underground fuel tanks will be removed to make way for new ground-up construction of a 1,090 square-foot coffee and donut shop (Dunkin) with a drive-through lane operation, a walk-up window and small outdoor dining area. There will be no indoor dining or public restroom.

In addressing the concerns of the 7th Avenue Estates Homeowners Association regarding potential light pollution, Paul Faust, vice president of operations for Dunkin in Phoenix, stated that typical hours for this type of location are generally opening between 4:30-5:30 a.m. closing between 8-9 p.m. Given that the property is bordered by commercial buildings, the impact was considered negligible. Other concerns addressed were length of drive-through lanes, which the Dunkin representative said met the standard of their other locations, and potential noise from the positioning of the ordering box.

The Zoning Hearing Officer approved the requests of the owner, Atlas BL Dunlap, LLC, with stipulations, among them that a west and south wall will be built at a continuous height of six feet to act as a noise buffer. The owners will have 18 months to pull construction permits.

Renovation planned for Esplanade

The ownership of the Esplanade office buildings announced plans to fully renovate and upgrade the four-building campus. Located at 2425,

2525, 2575, and 2555 E. Camelback Rd. in the Biltmore area, the \$45 million project will add approximately 30,000 square feet of new amenity space and overhaul the existing buildings. Construction is expected to start in early spring of 2023.

A new 16,000 square foot, twostory central amenity building will be the heart of the property and will include a full-service café and bar, collaborative workspaces, lounges, and game areas with pool tables and golf simulators. The second floor will be dedicated to health and fitness, offering a state-of-the-art gym and studio spaces for group classes and social wellness programs.

A new 8,000 square foot conference center will provide groups a venue that will accommodate up to 100 person events, including a variety of meeting rooms and coworking spaces outfitted with superior AV/IT equipment tailored to producing podcasts, live stream studios, and more.

The campus will also be enhanced with a redeveloped landscape, a new shade structure, new lobby entrances,

School excels in computer science

Computer Science Education Week (CSEdWeek) is an annual national program dedicated to inspiring K-12 students to take interest in computer science, advocate for equity and celebrate the contributions of students, teachers and partners in the field.

Xavier College Preparatory was one of the first schools in Arizona to require successful completion of a computer science coding class in order to graduate. Students take the course during their sophomore year.

The school also has the largest chapter of the National Computer Science Honor Society in the nation, and all its members are young women.

AP Computer Science teacher, Leon Tynes, Jr., said of the week-long event, "We celebrated the restart of the Robotics Team and Club, the addition of project-based learning in our Computer Science courses, the introduction of the Unreal Engine in our curriculum, and the large number of AP Computer Science Principles students developing mobile applications that make the world a better place. We are now incorporating robotics and physical computing in all of our introductory computer science courses."

It is appropriate that Xavier leads in computer science education. The school was started by the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The first person in the United States to obtain a Ph.D. in computer science was Sister Mary Kenneth Keller, of the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (BVM) (Irving C. Tang earned a D.Sc.

in computer science the same day as Keller, on June 7, 1965.) Xavier's administration continues to be led by Sisters from the same BVM order.

Xavier's computer science graduates have been accepted into prestigious computer science programs at Duke, MIT, and Princeton, and have worked for companies such as Microsoft, Pixar and Intel.

Annual 'Elf Drive' serves families in need

Brophy held its annual Elf (Extending Love to Families) Drive from Nov. 28 to Dec. 12. The Brophy community partnered with the Division of Developmental Disabilities to "adopt" 51 special families and collect gifts to help provide a holiday filled with joy.

These families, many struggling financially and falling within the state's poverty guidelines, have at least one child or family member challenged by cerebral palsy, autism, epilepsy or cognitive delays.

Student receives innovation honor

Brophy sophomore Bremer Kaprosy was honored in November at the Governor's Celebration of Innovation as a Future Innovator of the Year. The recognition included a \$1,500 prize and the opportunity to meet and discuss internships with more than 700 Arizona technology companies.

Bremer's project, "Building a Cold Rocket Engine," won second place in the Arizona Science Fair's Engineering Division.





Following the meeting, we tour up to 10 homes new to the market. We require those REALTORS who have a property on the tour to attend the meeting and then participate in the virtual tour of all houses on that day's tour. Each agent provides constructive feedback on price, condition, and key features of the home. The goal is to network with fellow REALTORS who also specialize in North Central Phoenix neighborhoods and help sell the property.

Tour Boundaries

Tour boundaries are Campbell Avenue to the south, 40th Street to the east, 19th Avenue to the west, with the northern border running south of the North Phoenix Mountain Preserve (roughly Peoria) and just north of Lincoln from 16th Street east to 40th St. The Phoenix Country Club area also is included.

Café Chat

One-stop shopping, dining at family owned spot

The corner of 7th Avenue and Missouri has long been a favored destination for North Central diners.

Over the years, there's been a changing menu of eateries including Sylvia's La Canasta (closed in 2018) and Hana Japanese Eatery on the northwest corner. There's a Starbuck's to the south and La Piñata across the street (in the former Mary Coyle's). A series of markets, next to pizza and burger spots rounded out the offerings, occupying the southeast corner's mini-strip mall.

The latest in that location is Corner on the Market and the adjacent Hatchit Green Chile Burgers and Tacos, which opened four years ago. As the name suggests, Hatch-it's menu focuses on New Mexico chiles, with a green chile Santa Fe burger and green chile pork burrito leading the list as customer favorites.

Corner on the Market takes it up another notch, with a selection of crusty artisan bread — green chile, sourdough, olive, cranberry-walnut among the favorites — salsas from Las Cruces, N.M., green chile beef pizzas, taco salad,

stew and a green chile meatloaf sandwich. There are plenty of other offerings on the market's menu — pastries, cookies and other sweets, cheese, salami, salads, more pizzas and sandwiches.

The wall between the two business-

es has been opened, so it's an easy amble from Hatch-it to the market.

Owner Kathy Blackwell opened the businesses four years ago after happening on the location by accident.

"I was driving around, just checking out stuff, and saw the market was empty and thought, 'This looks like a good corner," she said. "Traffic is crazy along here."

With decades of experience in the food business, she immediately saw the possibilities and decided to lease the market space. (A taco shop was next door, and while she was working on painting and organizing the market area, Blackwell also leased that space, opening Hatch-it before the market was completed.)

"I've been in the grocery business most of my life," Blackwell said. "From Tucson to North Dakota, I've done it all — truck stops, delis, groceries, health food, convenience stores. My last job before here was helping to put together one of the largest truck stops in the country, in Tioga, N.D., from the ground up."

For more than 25 years, her daughter, Kelly Bower-Hall, has been at her side. "I've only had one boss in my whole life — after my first job at 16 it's always been her. I followed her around, everywhere she's gone."

Why the focus on Hatch chiles?

"My brother works for a green chile business in New Mexico," Blackwell said. "He worked with Mark Miller, a famous chef in Santa Fe, and helped me develop some of our recipes."

That includes those Santa Fe burgers. "They're really special," said Bower-Hall. "We use a special green chile guacamole, and green chile mayo."

"And the burgers are fresh, never frozen," Blackwell said. "They're made from chopped fresh chuck brisket and served on a brioche bun."

Together, the shops are a destination made for lingering, starting at breakfast, perhaps with a latte from the coffee bar (which includes Roc2 brews from the Roastery of Cave Creek), house-made bagels, scones and pastries, breakfast burritos and sandwiches and more.

Some customers almost make a day of it, tele-commuting at their laptops with breaks for pizza, burgers, salads from the market and Hatch-it, then picking up bread, milk, cheese, salami and other items before heading home.

Others meet friends and head for a quiet corner, sinking into comfy couches to chat, play games or cards and decompress.

"People can put the busy life aside and talk with people like we used to before cell phones," Bower-Hall said. "We hope people will come by, feel comfortable, take their time, sit, talk and hang out with friends and neighbors."

The corner also is a convenient stop for commuters, who can stop in for a quick meal, coffee and pastries for the office, and market items for home that might include a bottle or two from the extensive selection of wines from Italy, Spain, France, New Zealand and Australia. (There's a special on now that includes a pizza and bottle of wine for \$25, and 10 percent off a case of wine.) Customers can find some unique items in the market, Blackwell said. "You won't find these breads anywhere else. And our olive oil. We have olive oil from Spain and Lebanon. It's wonderful. Once you have this olive oil, you'll never buy it in the store again."

And don't miss the pies. "Like grandma's pies from the days when you visited and she always had a pie on the

table," Bower-Hall said. "We sold a ton of them — special-order pies and breads — for Thanksgiving."

There's also catering, Blackwell said. "We recently did a party for 150, with red and green enchiladas."

"We also will special order anything, including gift baskets and wine crate filled with our bread, olive oil, wine — anything," Bower-Hall said.

"We've done several for realtors as gifts for their customers."

Festival celebrates Arizona wine

Over the course of three days, some 20 Arizona wineries will pour over 150 wines at the 2023 Arizona Wine Festival. Presented by Willcox Wine Country Partnership, along with other wineries from around Arizona, the festival will be held at Heritage Square Park in downtown Phoenix, Jan. 27–29.

The three-day festival will kick off with a winemakers' dinner to support Horses Help Foundation, an accredited therapeutic and recreational agency that serves the special needs population through a unique collaboration of horses and people. The two-day festival will feature the wineries, live music, food trucks, artists and other local vendors.

While viticulture originally began in Arizona in the 16th century when missionary Spanish Jesuit priests began to plant grapevines and make wine for sacramental use, the modern Arizona wine industry has since grown from just a few wineries in the early 1980s into over 100 licensed and bonded


