Residents to developer: 'Stick with the plan'

At its Sept. 11 meeting, the Encanto Village Planning Committee (EVPC) approved by a 9 to 4 vote the developer's request to modify or remove stipulations that bound The Central Park to a 2019 plan, putting the development of the last large parcel along a mile stretch of Central Avenue that much closer to realization. For better or worse, barring any challenges by City Council members, the future growth of Central Avenue from Indian School Road to Camelback Road may soon be in the hands of developers.

The Petree Properties project (on the northwest corner of Central and Glenrosa avenues) and the Forty600 project (on the southwest corner of Central Avenue and Coolidge Street) were approved by Council Sept. 6. However, there are still some hurdles for other Central Avenue projects. An appeal was filed on PHO-1-23—Z-27-15-4, the project located on the northeast corner of Central Avenue and Pierson Street known as Omninet East, and will be heard by the Planning Commission Oct. 5. The Planning Hearing Officer (PHO) heard the case for The Central Park (PHO-1-23—Z-9-19-4) Sept. 20, and continued the project to Oct. 18, citing a lack of adequate time to review an updated site plan and a pending meeting between the developer and the Parks & Recreation Department that may have ramifications on the site plan, among other issues.

This month, the self-guided Sunnyslope Studio Tour returns for a sixth year, and both aficionados and those curious about art will have the opportunity to meet local artists in their own creative spaces and explore art's many facets in person.

"Since I was a kid, I've always wanted to be an artist," said Kris Kollasch, who has not only fulfilled that dream as a working artist but is spearheading the organizational efforts of the 2023 Studio Tour.

From fine art and murals to themed environments and public art, Kollasch says that she's always liked to explore different mediums. Residents will enjoy visiting the artist's fun and quirky domain in Studio 11 on this year's tour. (Don't miss saying "hello" to Simon!)

"What's great about the Studio Tour is you get a chance to meet the artists face to face, and there's a real diversity of artists and styles," said Kollasch, who has lived in North Central and worked from her home studio for nearly three decades.

She sees the studio tour as a way to engage and connect with the broader community, and to highlight the diversity of the area as well.

"Sunnyslope is a very interesting community because we cover so many demographics. I think this is a great opportunity for us to invite people from the larger Phoenix area to come and see what's happening inside.

"We've learned to live and commune together and that's important — that we respect the people that have been here for a really long time. And I think





Community celebrates Solano Skate Plaza

The community came together Sept. 18 to celebrate improvements to Solano Park — in particular a new skate plaza.

Since December 2022, the park has been undergoing extensive improvements, including the new skate park, pickleball courts and a resurfaced basketball court. But there is still work to do. The City of Phoenix Office of Arts & Culture will be adding a skateable art feature, "Pipe Dreams," to the center of the skate plaza. The feature is expected to be completed in early 2024.

At the celebration event, Phoenix District 5 Councilwoman Betty Guardado thanked the many entities involved, including Laura and Trent Martin from Cowtown Skateboards, Shannon McBride of 19North, the Parks & Recreation Department, Osborn School District Superintendent Michael Robert, and especially the Solano Elementary students, who were in attendance and will keep the park activated.

"I know that this park has been challenging at different moments," Guardado said, "but it's been very exciting to see everyone out here playing pickleball...I see the kids out here skating. It's very exciting and it warms my heart every single time that we're able to activate a park."

Phoenix Parks and Recreation Director Cynthia Aguilar also thanked the children at the event and encouraged them to share their ideas on other amenities that they would like to see at parks. "Tell your parents, tell your teachers, tell your superintendent...they will get the information to us and we would love to continue putting things in this park that will bring you here to enjoy a safe park," Aguilar said.

Also in attendance, Trent Martin spoke on behalf of Cowtown S.K.A.T.E. foundation, which was instrumental in bringing the skate plaza to fruition. The foundation, founded by Martin and his wife Laura, also in attendance, is the philanthropic arm of Cowtown Skateboards, a skate shop founded locally in 1997 by Phoenix skateboarders.

"Our whole mission is expanding access to skateboarding for children, adults, everybody," Martin said. "Just the mental, physical and social, health, well-being, all the benefits that it provides."

The foundation has worked with the City of Phoenix extensively, Martin added, "It's really exciting that they believe in our mission of expanding access to skateboarding. We approached them with other community members from the area probably five years ago and they were receptive to it and wanted to have a skate park in central Phoenix. Here is where we decided, with the community, and we're really happy that this is here."


After addressing the crowd, Martin drew raffle tickets and presented two excited kids with brand-new Cowtown skateboards.



that's what is beautiful about it — the diversity of it."

For Kollasch, art, in all its various forms, is at the heart of that communal experience.

"Art heals us, whether that's music or dance, or the art of cooking — the things that we have these passions about. Art helps us cope. It gives us a language to get out things that we can't normally express."

Further up the road from Kollasch's studio is artist Ed Taylor, Studio 5 on the tour, whose art feels like a voyage of discovery — a seeking of something greater. A newcomer to Sunnyslope, but not to Phoenix, this is Taylor's first year participating in the tour.

With everything from large painted panels, burlap coffee bags and pāua adorned pieces to small watercolor prints on camel dung paper and letterpress books of poems (created on his ca.1890 Washington Press), much of the New Zealand transplant's art also is an examination of language within the art itself.

During moments of grief and pain in his life, two of his more striking pieces became a source of healing and catharsis for the artist. The first was painted after a 2011 earthquake that devastated Christchurch, New Zealand.

"I'm quite attached to my hometown, I hadn't lived there for 20 years, but they had a massive earthquake that killed 200 people, and it really affected me. I just started painting little scenes of places I remember growing up. So, it was kind of about healing the damage," Taylor recalled. Pointing to one portion of the piece, he added, "This is Māori in here for, 'Send love to the future. Send love to the past. Be love now.' I borrow from other languages." On another section of the piece, "That's Galilean Aramaic — the first part of the Lord's Prayer."

Another work, one of his largest and perhaps most personal pieces, depicts the Lady of Guadalupe and has held various titles, but the one that resonates most with Taylor is "A future free from the limits of language."

"I spent my whole life being agnostic and it was while I was painting that, my father died, and I started really thinking about what it's all about."

Taylor added a poem, written to his father, that his friends helped him translate into Spanish. The poem adorns the edges of the painting and explores the "eternal questions that change and yet stay the same" and looks toward "a future free from the limits of language."

"That's why I put language into my paintings...old language and things that I really don't understand. I feel like language is so important to who and what we are, and yet it binds us to who and what we are. If we are more than just humans, if there is an afterlife of any sort, I think it'll be free from language. I think that's the premise [of the painting], once I'm free from language, I'll see my father again."

Another artist participating for the first time this year is Harold Lohner, Studio 9 on the tour. For him, art is largely about the process — a puzzle of sorts that he has engaged with since childhood.

"I've been doing art my whole life," Lohner said. "I became an art major in college and then graduate school and then I taught for 33 years at a college in upstate New York.

"Printmaking is my major medium. I enjoy the process of it. You have to take images apart and put them back together, like a separation that you would have in color printing. I print one color at a time and build up the colors on top of that — layer after layer, that appeals to me."

Lohner has also created fonts for the past 25 years, "They're what you would call display fonts; decorative things that you can use."

The artist has lived in the Phoenix area for close to 10 years, and as he researched the history of his new home, he incorporated it into his art, such as a monoprint series that focuses on Dreamy Draw. He is eager to share his discoveries and his artistic process with tour attendees.

"One of the things I love about the tour is that it is self-guided," Lohner said. "You can start and stop anywhere. So, if you're having fun, you can keep going on and if you've had enough you can stop."

Lohner will have his printing press set up and in production throughout the tour weekend, which is bound to draw the interest of attendees.

"People love to see that stuff, the behind-the-scenes process. And I think it makes the art more meaningful, seeing a little bit of how it was made," he said.

The opportunity to see artists in their creative space and to learn how art

At issue is a request to modify or delete seven stipulations — which the 2019 rezoning approval was contingent upon. The project, as proposed and approved by Phoenix City Council in July 2019, featured a total of 600 residential units, a 200-room hotel, 760,000 square feet of commercial space, and 170,000 square feet of ground-level retail and restaurants. At the same time, the Phoenix Indian School Specific Plan (Plan) was repealed on the basis that its primary goals had been met (the development of Steele Indian School Park and expansion of the Veterans hospital), and that The Central Park development, as presented and approved in 2019, "will address the outstanding goals and policies" of the Plan. Adopted in December 1991, the Plan's Land Use Concept included minimums of 1,200 housing units and 100,000 square feet of retail development, and a number of items focusing on open space and walkability, including a 100-foot diagonal view corridor from Central Avenue and Indian School Road that focused on the historic cafeteria tower

and the distant Piestewa Peak.

When a "reimagined" project came back to the city in July 2023, the developer/owner of the property, Pivotal Group, had a brand-new design that stripped away much of the openness of the 2019 approved plan and the stipulations they wanted to get rid of spoke directly to many of the goals within the Plan their project was approved to meet.

At two August meetings, the devel-

oper's requests were continued to September by both the EVPC and the Planning Hearing Officer, with the caveat from the EVPC that developers meet with neighbors in the meantime, which they did on Aug. 21.

At the Aug. 21 meeting, 30 or so neighbors showed up to express their concerns to the developer's representatives, Jason Morris and Benjamin Tate of Withey Morris Baugh, PLC. At the subsequent Sept. 11 EVPC meeting, Morris indicated that, in response to neighbor input, the developer would remove all on-street parking on the east/west thoroughfare and add other pedestrian- and bike-friendly updates and presented an updated "market" space that would be situated directly on Central Avenue at Monterosa Street to create frontage retail access. Some of these items were added as stipulations, some were just updated design features.

Residents have found some positives in the July 2023 reimagined project. It is one of the few true mixed-use projects that has been proposed along Central Avenue, and residents are encouraged that the project is finally moving again after seeing no visible progress since 2019. The project offers an interior public gathering space and while it has significantly reduced the amount of retail and housing (to 78,000 square feet of ground-floor retail and restaurant space, to include a market/grocer space and 1,450 housing units, a portion of which will be for purchase), it is far more than the Petree development that sits on close to the same acreage and offers no ownership options. The Central Park also includes 245,000 square feet of office space; Petree has none.

Area residents were ready to pursue an appeal on The Central Park if the PHO had recommended approving the developer's latest request.

"The Central Park (TCP) 17.8-acre Transit Oriented Development (TOD) project at Steele Indian School Park Version 1.0 was nothing more than football's version of a 'pump fake,' a ruse utilized to get the city council to fall for repealing the overriding, and visionary Phoenix Indian School Park Specific Plan," said Ken Waters, an outspoken area resident who has appealed many Central Avenue projects that lack walkability and mixed-use components. He added, "Version 1.0's stipulation language complied with the visionary Plan, and TCP 2.0 does not. Let's obviously stick with the original visionary Plan stipulations."

Residents in the Carnation neighborhood have been working towards more symbiotic walkable development in the area since Reinvent PHX was established in 2015 with one main goal: To create walkable, opportunity-

rich communities. Implemented to guide future development along mass transit corridors, the policy plan came with a new Walkable Urban (WU) Code, and the establishment of TOD Districts. Residents say that many of the developments that they have seen come to their Uptown District in recent years have fallen short of the vision (www.phoenix.gov/pdd/tod/reinvent-phx).

Cliff Valenti, chair of the Carnation Association of Neighbors development committee (www.carnationassociationaz.com) goes further.

"The system in Phoenix is broken when a conditional up zoning is granted and subsequently all the agreed-upon conditions are disregarded," Valenti said in advance of the Sept. 20 PHO meeting. "The Encanto Village Planning Committee is failing at their role of scrutinizing development and supporting local residents who are supposed to have a voice in this process. Additionally, the Planning Commission leans heavily towards favoring developers, making it an uphill battle to make any meaningful progress without the

active participation of the EVPC."

Valenti added, "Nonetheless, we are considering an appeal to the Planning Commission if the Planning Hearing Officer fails us, too."

is made is a unique aspect of the tour, as is the personal connection that can be made with art and its makers.

"I think art is important, societally, because it documents history," Kollasch said. "And it's something pretty to put on your wall, too, but it also is a way for the art buyer to express their own interest, their own taste, their own feelings, because they might really resonate with a piece of work."

She adds that her hope is that residents will support local artists, not just during the tour but beyond.

"We are part of the community and a part of society — making things and creating things and documenting things," Kollasch said. "You can go to the store and buy something that was made in China that has no meaning whatsoever. Or you can buy something that actually goes directly into the pockets of your next-door neighbor and helps us survive."

The sixth annual Sunnyslope Studio Tour will be held Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 21-22, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The tour features 14 studios from Northern Avenue to Peoria Avenue and 19th Avenue to 18th Street., hosting 25 local fine artists. Artwork will be available for sale during the tour — ranging from \$50 to \$5,000.

Area businesses supporting the event as sponsors include 3A Automotive Service, Barry's Ace Hardware, Eye Opener, Hansen Mortuary, North Mountain Brewing Company, Phoenix Luv and Zipps Sports Grill. Physical maps will be available at some of the supporting businesses, and residents can find a list of participating studios, artist bios, and soon a Google map showing the studio locations. I'm so disappointed in the demise of the Pac-12 Conference, which will basically cease to exist as of 2024, as 10 of its 12 members have announced plans to move to other conferences.

I will miss college basketball commentator (and former UCLA hoops great) Bill Walton making his "Conference of Champions" statement before each broadcast. The Pac-12 has been in some form of existence since 1915 when it was formed as the Pacific Coast Conference, It is indeed the conference of champions, producing 553 national champions, more than 200 more than the next closest conference.

The Pac-12's dominance in Olympic Sports is unrivaled. In the recent Tokyo Olympics, Pac-12 affiliated athletes won 108 medals, 35 of which were gold. This would have put them only behind the United States in total medal count.

Though the Pac-12's overall excellence cannot be disputed, it has lately been lacking in the one area currently in the spotlight - men's football. Funny then that in its last season of football it goes undefeated the first weekend, the only conference to do so.







Trail closure program expands

Light rail extension begins testing

As construction of the Northwest Extension Phase II project nears its end, Valley Metro will begin system testing to prepare for the opening of the light rail extension this fall.

The testing phase includes station vehicle clearance overhead electrification system, traffic signal coordination, switches that allow trains to move from track to track and overall operational readiness. As testing continues, trains will operate more frequently to test the service schedule and prepare operators.

Safety is critical during this vital phase of the project, and Valley Metro asks residents who travel in the area obey all traffic signals and message boards; stay off the tracks unless crossing at designated pedestrian crosswalks; and look for flashing headlights and listen for warning bells and horns.

The Northwest Extension Phase II project extends light rail west on Dunlap Avenue from 19th Avenue, then north on 25th Avenue and across I-17 at Mountain View Road, ending on the west side of the freeway near the former Metrocenter Mall. Opening day is expected to be early 2024.

New high-capacity transit alternatives

Valley Metro and the city of Phoenix are seeking community feedback on the recommendation for the West Phoenix High-Capacity Transit Alternatives Analysis. The study, initiated in fall 2022, seeks to identify a high-capacity transit option for West Phoenix residents.

Currently, the recommended transit type is light rail, with a route that would travel from Central Avenue west along Indian School Road to 75th Avenue, then jog down to Thomas Road and on to the Desert Sky Mall Transit Center.

The project team hosted two public meetings in September and has an open public comment period, which closes Oct. 6, to gather input on the recommended transit route and mode for West Phoenix.







Preschool celebrates four decades

Established in 1983, Faith Lutheran Preschool is about to recognize a major milestone — and families both past and present are invited to attend the celebration.

The preschool is part of Faith Lutheran Church, located near the corner of 7th Street and Camelback Road. The church has a long history in Phoenix. Due to the rapid growth in the city of Phoenix, and increasing wartime attendance at Grace Lutheran Church, it was decided in early 1944 that consideration be given to the formation of a new mission in North Phoenix.

The first service was held on May 20, 1945, and by July 8 of that year, the mission was organized with 76 charter members. Those members, and others who joined them worshipped in Madison School until the chapel at Faith Lutheran was dedicated on Feb. 23, 1947. Even today, descendants of those original members worship at the church.

Fast forward to 1983, when the preschool was founded and housed in the education wing of the church, which was built in 1950. The preschool started with eight children, two teachers and a director. Today, the school has

15 employees serving 52 families with children ranging in age from infant to five years of age, says preschool director Alma Cortes — and multiple generations of families have been served by the school.

"Jan Kuenzli helped fund the preschool," Cortes said. "Her daughter was one of the first babies to attend FLP — her name is Jessica Jones. Jessica currently has a son in our program, Zachary."

It is that continuity and connection to the community that keeps the school thriving, Cortes said, "With families, staff and children, it's just like a small community, where we all know each other. Even though a child might not be in their room, they know the teachers just by seeing them in the hall-way...and it makes them feel more comfortable."

As the 40th anniversary of the preschool approaches, that community — both past and present — is invited to celebrate the milestone. An anniversary party will be held at the school, located at 801 E. Camelback Road, Sunday, Oct. 1, from 2–5 p.m. and will include food, raffles and games.

While the new school year may have just started, many families with children starting kindergarten in the 2024–25 school year are already preparing for their children to begin school next fall.

It's an exciting time, and parents and caregivers often have questions about how to help their children suc-

ceed as they begin their academic journey. Madison School District kindergarten teachers and early childhood program staff offer tips on preparing for this next big step.

Families should encourage independence, such as practicing opening lunch box containers and zip lock bags without help. It is also essential to build self-advocacy skills, such as ask-

ing when they need help or don't understand the instructions. Families also should encourage a child's confidence to try new things, provide opportunities to make simple decisions, and help children to accept minor disappointments, frustrations or changes in schedule.

Before school begins, children should be able to recognize all 26 upper

and lowercase letters of the alphabet and their sounds, write their first and last names, count and recognize numbers zero through 20 and identify and draw basic shapes.

Children may struggle with separation when school starts, but prolonging a goodbye can make the separation more difficult. If a child is upset when they leave, parents should assure the student that they love them, their teacher will take care of them and express confidence that they can handle the school day.

Finally, finding opportunities to schedule playdates with classmates is an excellent opportunity for children to interact with friends and peers outside of school.

For families with children entering kindergarten next fall, Madison School District is hosting its annual Discover Madison Tour Friday, Nov. 3. On the tour, families will have the opportunity to learn more about Madison's elementary schools and signature programs.







Help is just a phone call away

According to the Area Agency on Aging, older adults are especially vulnerable to suicide, but help can be as close as a phone call away.

Residents of any age can dial the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline at 988. In Maricopa County, the Area Agency on Aging's Senior Help Line, 602-264-HELP (4357), is another important resource for older men and women struggling with signs and symptoms of depression that could lead to suicide attempts.

According to the Suicide Prevention Resource Center, suicide rates are particularly high among older men, with men ages 85 and older having the highest rate of any group in the country. Suicide attempts by older adults are much more likely to result in death than among younger persons.

"Being aware of the suicide risk factors among older adults and how to address them is critical in saving lives," said Heidi Donniaquo, the Area Agency Director of Behavioral Health. "While senior adults comprise about 12 percent of the population, they account for nearly 20 percent of suicides."

Signs and symptoms of depression in older adults include sadness or feelings of despair; unexplained or aggravated aches and pains; loss of interest in socializing or hobbies; weight loss or loss of appetite; feelings of hopelessness or helplessness; and lack of motivation and energy.

"It's difficult when you hear someone you love or care for express thoughts about suicide, but it's critically important to remember that there are steps that can be taken to find help and support," Donniaquo said.

Those steps include:

• Talking. Your willingness to express your concern for the person in crisis can be the first step in getting that person help.

- Listening. Being an active listener is another way of reminding a person in crisis that they are not alone.
- Remaining present. Your physical and emotional presence in the person's life makes a difference. If you are worried about their safety, get help from a mental health professional immediately.
- Calling or texting 988. When someone dials 988, they will be connected to the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. This confidential support line is available 24 hours a day to provide free help to people in suicidal crisis or mental health-related distress.







Café Chat

Start the day with a smile at Original Breakfast House



John Stidham just couldn't get the hang of hanging out.

After nearly 40 years in the restaurant business, most of it on the Monterey Peninsula, he decided to retire and move to Phoenix, but retirement didn't last long.

"I got bored," said Stidham, who has owned and operated a string of 11 restaurants, from breakfast to delis to steakhouses to fine dining. Within two years, he was back in business, opening his 12th restaurant, Original Breakfast House (OBH), on 32nd Street just south of Thunderbird.

That was 10 years ago, and today OBH draws customers from all over the Valley, thanks in part to accolades that consistently list OBH as one of the top breakfast spots in the state. Recently Entrepreneur Magazine named OBH

one of the top 150 mom-and-pop businesses in the country, and one of the publication's 15 "hidden gems."

That notoriety helps bring firsttimers, Stidham said, but it's the friendly service and ample servings of scratchmade omelets, pancakes, waffles and baked goods that keep them coming back.

The restaurant's décor hearkens back to Stidham's roots on the California Coast, with surfboards and photos of seaside scenes filling every cranny of wall surface. It's all part of the fun atmosphere that begins with the huge vintage jukebox just inside the entry. (There's also a fee-free ATM for customers because OBH doesn't accept credit or debit cards.)

"There's no such thing as a bad day at the beach," said Stidham, an avid surfer "many moons ago."

The extensive menu includes pancakes, waffles, eggs and omelets — the usual breakfast fare but with Stidham's personal twist.

"When I got here, I was really surprised that I couldn't get dishes with more Mexican flavors," he said. "Even the better breakfast restaurants might have a token huevos rancheros, but not much else from Mexico. That didn't make any sense to me."

OBH's fare includes breakfast burritos, chimichangas and enchiladas, along with chilaquiles, a crispy carnitas and avocado omelet topped with red chile sauce and queso fresco, and OBH eggs Benedict with birria — Mexican braised beef — instead of ham.

Stidham's menu also includes breakfast items from all over the country, including shrimp and grits, and creamed chipped beef on toast, a special favorite with the many veterans who are OBH regulars.

He prides himself on fresh ingredients, especially berries. "You won't see fresh berries anywhere in the Valley like I have," he said. That includes strawberries and raspberries piled high on the triple-berry French toast.

"My customers love to see our experimentation," Stidham said. "They'll come in and try all my specials. Chicken-fried chicken with deep-fried French toast is a customer favorite. It's a killer."

The menu includes monthly specials, and it reflects Stidham's tastes for distinctive flavors and house-made dishes with fresh ingredients — local whenever possible.

"We're one of the few restaurants in town that makes Hollandaise sauce from scratch," he said. "We make it three or four times a day, so our Benedicts are a step above. To me, a breakfast restaurant also has to have an

in-house bakery with cinnamon rolls, hand-squeezed orange juice and the best coffee you can get."

Fall specials will include pumpkin pancakes and other seasonal flavors.

November also will feature one of OBH's most popular events, centered around Veterans Day. "It's the biggest day of the year for us," he said. "We feed vets for free, all day Saturday of Veteran's Day weekend, there's outside music and a muscle car show in the parking lot. Veterans who come for this for the first time always come back." For Stidham, himself a Vietnam vet, veteran issues are a key focus for OBH's community outreach.

"For a couple of weeks before Veterans Day we do a big fund-raiser for Tunnel to Towers, matching funds our customers give," he said. Tunnel to Towers helps provide mortgage-free homes to military and fallen first-responder families and builds homes adapted for injured veterans and first responders.

"I'm very fortunate to be able to do all this at my age," Stidham said. "I couldn't do it without the staff. I don't have any turnover. It's a very upbeat,

cheerful environment, for customers and for staff."

To say Stidham pampers employees may be an understatement. One recent staff event included a pedicure party.

"I didn't just pay for it, I had one!" he said. "In November the girls are going to a place in Scottsdale where they teach you how to blend your own lipstick."

OBH is very much a family spot.

"We're not on Camelback or Scottsdale Road," Stidham said. "We're out here in the neighborhood. We have a very diverse clientele from all over the Valley, especially on weekends. It's kind of like 'Cheers.' I try to greet everybody who comes in the restaurant. I know all their names, and when a new person comes in, my servers know to introduce me.

"We take hospitality to the next

level. Our goal is to exceed the customer's expectations, starting from the parking lot. Every aspect should be 'Wow' and 'Welcome.'

Original Breakfast House, at 13623 N. 32nd St., is open from 6:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., seven days a week. The restaurant is cash-only and does not accept credit or debit cards. A fee-free ATM is available in the lobby. For information, call 602-482-2328, or visit www.originalbreakfasthouse.com.

The building, located along the Arizona Canal at 8525 N. Central Ave., was most recently the bicycle-centric Spoke & Wheel. The property itself started as a dance hall in 1883, where people would travel tree-lined dirt roads to enjoy the music of Robinson's Orchestra. By 1934, it had secured the state's second liquor license, transforming into The Arbor, where people dined, danced and relaxed in an old-fashioned beer garden.

"Throughout the years, despite changing names and owners, it has remained a vibrant community gathering spot," Roehrich continued. "We are fully committed to continuing that legacy."

He added that learning about its rich past has only deepened the team's commitment to preserving the architectural integrity and soul of the building. "Preservation has challenges, and our construction journey has had a few unexpected turns. Yet, we're navigating each step with respect for its history and excitement for its future. While we are hopeful for a fall opening, we have yet to finalize a specific date as we continue working on some unexpected yet necessary improvements. 


