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City prepares for General Plan vote

As the city of Phoenix moves closer to finalizing its 2025 General Plan Update, the Planning and Development Department spent late November and December presenting the PlanPHX draft to residents at a series of six "Road Show" events. Each event had a specific focus, but the overarching theme was "Creating a More Connected Phoenix."

The General Plan is required by state law (A.R.S. 9-461-06) to be updated every 10 years. The voterapproved long-range planning tool is meant to provide a vision and policies for the growth and development of cities. In 2015, Phoenix voters approved an update to the Phoenix General Plan, referred to as PlanPHX. Once the current plan is finalized it will go to Phoenix voters in November of this year.

At two different PlanPHX presentations in North Central areas, residents offered their varying opinions about the needs in their neighborhoods. At both the Nov. 30 meeting at Park Central and the Dec. 5 meeting at Cholla Library, the focus was on Transit Oriented Communities.

Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) are broadly defined by the city as areas with compact, pedestrian-scaled, mixed-use developments strategically located within a short walk of high-capacity transit. The intent of TOC is to make walking, bicycling and

Community 'mainstay' celebrates 50 years

The city of Phoenix's Century Library, located on Highland Avenue just east of State Route 51, celebrated its 50th anniversary Dec. 16 with an open house celebration featuring family-friendly activities, giveaways and remarks from city leadership. In addition to the branch staff and community members, City Librarian Rita Hamilton, Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego and Councilman Kevin Robinson joined in the festivities.

We caught up with Robinson, who represents Council District 6, at the event, and he talked about the importance of libraries and general and his own personal connection to the Century Branch.

"Libraries have always been a mainstay in our communities," Robinson said. "They've been there in times of need for people. [At the event] one young lady spoke about when she first moved here. The first thing her mom did was get them a library card. They couldn't afford a lot of things, DVDs and things like that. So, they were able to check it out at the library. That's so important.

"I have a background in law enforce-

ment, 36 years, and I know, especially with young folks, that they have to have something to do, because if they don't, they'll find something to do, and we would much rather them be using their time in a more productive way. The libraries have always been there for that very reason.

"For me personally, this library specifically, I used to come here and study for the sergeant's exam. That was in 1986, I think. It was several months, several hours a week hunkered down in the corner. It's been remodeled a few times, but I would hunker down the corner and just study."

These types of stories are familiar to many in the

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



City reduces speed limits

At its Dec. 6 meeting, the Phoenix City Council voted unanimously to approve the reduction of speed along 15 stretches of Phoenix roadways. Twelve of the changes were made due to traffic and road conditions — whether based on Complete Streets Policy or to create a consistent speed limit for the corridor — and three were made for record-keeping purposes, where the current speed did not match the current ordinance.

Twice annually, the Phoenix Street Transportation Department does a comprehensive review of Phoenix City Code with regards to local speed limits. In fall 2023, department staff proposed the changes that Council approved.

Changes in the North Central area include the following reductions from 35 mph to 30 mph based on Complete Streets' context sensitive speed limit policy: Hatcher Road, from 19th Avenue to Central Avenue; Osborn Road; and 12th Street from Indian School Road to Mountain View Road.

According to the city's website, the goal of its Complete Streets Policy is to create a more sustainable transportation system that is safe and accessible for everyone. Complete streets provide infrastructure that encourages active transportation such as walking, bicycling, transportation choices and increased connectivity. Through the policy, the primary focus of street design will no longer be solely on the speed and efficiency of automobile travel, but on the safety and comfort of all users of the

public right-of-way (ROW).

Within the policy, "context sensitive" means that there is no one-size-fits-all approach to design. It reads in part, "Flexibility enables projects to be tailored to the specific needs of each community with regards to their surrounding land uses and street character, allowing for the selection of facilities and amenities best suited to the needs of each community." Other North Central changes include a reduction from 45 mph to 40 mph to create consistent speed limit for the following corridors: Lincoln Drive, 800 feet east of Ocotillo Road to 32nd Street; 24th Street, Montebello Avenue to Lincoln Drive; and 32nd Street, Arizona Canal to Lincoln Drive.

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community, and as the Phoenix Public Library system celebrates its own milestone — 125 years — we talked to Lee Franklin for some history and perspective. Franklin is not only the public information officer for the Library Department but is a major cheerleader for libraries in general.

Opened Sunday, Dec. 16, 1973, the Century branch was the seventh in the library system. The library is currently located within the Camelback Colonnade, in 1973, it was known as the Sears-Rhodes Mall. This branch came about because of a 1969 study done by the Phoenix Growth Committee, which recommended adding a library to the fast-growing area, and the Phoenix City Council agreed. The area has seen a lot of changes since that time, most dramatically, SR51 being built immediately to the west of the building in 1990, and the library itself is a historical snapshot of our communities at the time Franklin says.

"If you look at our Phoenix Public Library system, we have kind of a clustering of our library branches that came into existence during this window," Franklin said. "And one of the concepts at that time was to include a library facility either as part of or very closely adjacent to shopping centers or malls, as the mall concept evolved and came into being."

The name "Century" has double reference. Most of the Phoenix library names are inspired by desert plants, Franklin added. Century is a desert plant, but also the library was the first new library built during the second century of the Phoenix Public Library's history — it was officially established in June 1898.

Fast forward to 2023 and the Century Library serves as something as a commuter library, due to its convenience along the 51. Currently, all libraries are seeing an increase in foot traffic and Century welcomes more than 5,000 visits per month, with around 6,000 items checked out each month. And the future is bright for Phoenix libraries with a Bookmobile, 24-hour book lockers and more in the works, thanks in part to ARPA funding.

At the end of the day, though, Franklin says that libraries do so much more for communities than just pro-

viding a place where people can check out a book. They are also a place to access the internet, to gather with neighbors, to find enriching and entertaining programs and resources. And sometimes, just a place to be. And it's all offered free of charge.

She added, "We are that open access to information, and we literally have something for everybody. If somebody needs to get information, start at the library. If we don't have that book or we don't have that piece of information, we know where to go find it. Anything that anybody's got going on or wanting to figure out — always start at the library."

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using transit convenient, safe and enjoyable for daily life.

Before Planning staff spoke about the impact of transit, however, they put forth the city's accomplishments since 2015, including establishing the Transportation 2050, 2050 Sustainability, Housing PHX, PHX Food Action, Climate Action, Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Policy and Road Safety Action plans, as well as Reimagine PHX, Historic Preservation partnerships and an Arts/Culture inventory.

Although the city established these plans over the past 8 years, opinions at the meetings varied as to how successful the implementation has been, particularly the Nov. at Midtown/Uptown meeting regards to TOD and road safety. At that meeting, Planning director Joshua Bednarek spoke about how the city is reinventing and connecting its 15 urban Villages, each of which have a Character Plan in place, and how that relates to the General Plan.

Since 2015, 63 rezoning cases have been approved in Midtown/Uptown, the majority have been built and eight more are currently under construction. Beyond rezoning, seven other major projects have been built, with one under construction. Developments since 2015 have brought over 6,500 dwelling units to the area, with another 3,800 units planned.

Bednarek then spoke about lessons learned and what is next for the Midtown and Uptown areas. With a please see PREPARES on page 8

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

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goal of "preserving and creating a network of vibrant commercial corridors," Bednarek said that in the short term, Planning will stipulate mixed-uses along Central Avenue where active commercial uses will be removed — something that many residents have argued did not happen with many approved developments — as well as stipulate enhanced streetscapes, greater connection to parks and public spaces, encourage developers to work with communities on how projects interface with neighborhoods and promote adaptive reuse. Long-term goals include updating the Walkable Urban Code to address all these shortterm aspects as well as to include the character plans for all the TOC areas.

At the Dec. 5 meeting, the focus was on the Northwest Extension Phase II (NWE) of the Valley Metro light rail, which is already in the testing phase and expected to begin service in early 2024, and how the TOC Plan for the area fits into the General Plan. The study area for this TOC runs from 19th Avenue to 35th Avenue and Butler Drive to Peoria Avenue, excluding 23rd to 19th Avenue from Dunlap south to Butler.

At the meeting, residents were asked to identify their main priority for the future of the area, and safety came up most often. Other priorities included economic vitality and growth, walkability, access to multimodal transportation, hospitals and food, a better mix of housing (including affordable), better circulating roadways, as well as broad efforts to clean up, beautify and connect communities.

In the works now, the city will create

this TOC plan by asking the community to articulate its vision for the future and how to leverage the potential of the city's high-capacity transit investment. The policy plan will be developed in three phases, taking place throughout 2024 with a final presentation for action by Council in winter 2025. Although the General Plan was presented at 90 Village Planning Committee meetings over the course of 2023, direct public input has been somewhat underwhelming, with only 1,700 submissions through the online surveys, and an average of 50-plus participants at the Road Show events. But residents will have two more opportunities to voice their opinions before the General Plan 2025 goes to the Council for final approval.

The Planning Commission will hold two public hearings, with the first scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 22, at the Goelet A. Beuf Community Center, 3435 W. Pinnacle Peak Road. The second public hearing will be held March 7 in City Council Chambers. A presentation will be provided on the General Plan at both hearings and anyone wishing to speak will have an opportunity to provide public comments. The Planning Commission will make a recommendation at the March 7 hearing, and the mayor and council will vote on the final plan at an April meeting.

Museum hosts local TV legend

The Sunnyslope Historical Society invites residents to hear from Mary Jo West at a January in-person discussion.

West has been called the First Lady of TV News in Phoenix. She became the first prime-time anchorwoman in Phoenix in 1976, opening the door for the women who followed her. She came to Phoenix in 1975 as a producer-host at the Public Broadcasting Station KAET-TV in Tempe. In 1976, West accepted a job at KOOL-TV Channel 10, the CBS affiliate.

The Historical Society noted that her first years there were not easy, as she shared the anchor desk with an old-school newsman who saw the newsroom as a "man's domain" and wasn't pleased that a 27-year-old woman would be sharing his anchor desk.

West wanted to talk about issues that were vital and to report stories of substance, and in doing so, she won her industry's top awards including the Peabody, two Rocky Mountain Emmys, 13 Arizona Press Club awards, and the national "Gracie Allen Award" from American Women in Radio and TV. She was the first news woman inducted into the Arizona Broadcasters Hall of Fame. The City of Phoenix honored her with the Martin Luther King Living the Dream Award for her work fighting discrimination against the mentally ill.

'Pets on Parade' celebrates 65 years

For the last six-and-a-half decades, "Pets on Parade" has touched the lives of pet lovers in Arizona and has inspired community action by featuring adoptable pets, educating the community on animal welfare, providing resources for pet owners and advocating for the sick, injured and abused animals rescued by Arizona Humane Society (AHS).

"Pets on Parade" is the longest-running local television show in Arizona and debuted in December 1958, just one year after AHS was founded. The show celebrated its 65th anniversary Saturday, Dec. 16, after the airing of the Fiesta Bowl Parade.

A new training facility in Phoenix geared toward helping bring skilled workers into the Arizona workforce is now open.





Café Chat

Restaurant serves up a spirited blend

Don't call it "fusion" - Chef/Owner Engin Onural hates the term - but his Sandfish Sushi and Whiskey, with its subdued décor evoking shells, waves and sea-washed woods, blends two very different, yet complementary regions: Scandinavian and Japanese.

"They have similar cultures," he said. "They're both very clean-cut, minimalist, uncluttered."

While born in the United States, Onural grew up in Turkey. He began cooking, learning from his mother. "I decided on this journey when I was 10," he said. "That's 30 years now." He expanded his culinary education after getting a business degree, an education that included extensive travel and jobs in a variety of Southern California hotels and restaurants.

At one point, Onural decided to learn sushi-making, and studied under chef Andy Matsuda at the Sushi Chef Institute in Torrance, California, He went on to participate in the 2017 World Sushi Cup, where he came in 27th. "I want to go back in 2024, just for fun," he said.

He brings influences from those culinary journeys - especially in Scandinavia and Japan - to his restaurant's décor and menu, collaborating with Head Chef Chris Wolf.

That combination - Onural grimaces at the term "fusion" - is evident in the restaurant's spare design. The building has been stripped back to its bones, with sand-blasted and stained original roof rafters, clean-lined furnishings, and a long counter backed by a wall of whiskeys, including what Onural believes is the Valley's largest assortment of limited-availability Japanese labels.

"We carry a lot of allocated Japanese whiskey," Onural said. "I think our idea, our concept, our collection is unique in the Valley."

While many traditional whiskey drinkers take their drinks neat, or with a splash of water, cocktail menus these days have become playgrounds for "mixologists" (another trendy word Onural eschews), who concoct amalgams of spirits, seasonings, juices, fruit, pickles - you

name it – to tempt imbibers.

Sandfish customers enjoy the rare whiskeys as well as more exotic creations blended by bar manager, Josh Martinez. "He has very good knowledge," Onural

said. "I have a hard time following him."

Martinez and other Sandfish staff can guide guests who want to experiment with a sushi/whiskey pairing, Onural said, offering an example: the

spicy tuna tostada with Nikka Whisky from the Barrell, a spicy whisky (they leave off the "e") that stands up to the pronounced flavors of the appetizer.

Those tostadas are his customers' favorite, Onural said. "We've probably made millions of those already.' They're a gyoza (Japanese dumpling) wrap that's fried flat, like a crispy a little tortilla, then topped with spicy aioli, teriyaki sauce and micro greens.

Another menu standout is the octopus. Wolf cooks it in oil and its own juice, confit-style, until tender, then chars it on a grill and serves it with edamame hummus, bubu arare (rice pearls), nori paste and micro greens. The result is incredibly tender, with a crusty, smoky exterior.

The menu offers traditional sushi, sashimi and a variety of rolls, but the signature dishes are the standouts.

"Yes, we do traditional sushi, but the way we do our food is really unique to us," Onural said. "It is hard to explain."

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

matcha creampuffs with chocolate and pistachio; and a coconut panna cotta with blood orange jell, coconut streusel, mango coulis and hibiscus powder; the Sandfish roll, with imitation crab, spicy tuna, avocado, spicy aioli, teriyaki sauce, green onions, micro greens and lightly fried potato threads ("That potato/truffle combination has a lot of umami behind it," said Wolf.); and the Sandfish scallop signature dish, which is raw scallops tossed with yuzu vinaigrette, lime and shallot, topped with walnuts and sea beans to add some crunch and saltiness.

"We also offer an omakase, with nine courses, and our matched whiskey flights are in the works," said General Manager Brittney O'Brien.

On this visit, the Sandfish team were celebrating their one-year anniversary in the Melrose location. The restaurant is Onural's second with the Sandfish name. His first opened in Palm Springs in 2018.

"In late 2018 I wanted to have a second Sandfish," Onural said. "I looked around to see if I wanted to go the L.A. route or the Phoenix route.' He chose Phoenix because, "I really liked the people in Phoenix. The people here are comfortable and real."

He chose the Melrose neighborhood for its laid-back vibe.

"I really like this district," he said. "I think it has huge potential. The people are very supportive."

That merges perfectly with Onural's ambitions for his restaurant, another happy "fusion."

"When you walk into Sandfish, you feel warm, welcome," he said. "It's a place you just want to be – where you come to eat good food, not to be seen. We have a beautiful patio in the back with a nice fireplace. And we're dog friendly.

"I would love people to come visit us and give us a shot."

Dining Briefs Ambrogio15 to open in early 2024

Set to open at Biltmore Fashion Park, the restaurant group behind Ambrogio15 describe it as a modern Italian restaurant serving authentic Milanese fare. With a job fair that was held in mid-December, the restaurant is one step closer to its anticipated early 2024 opening.

Local brewery takes top honors

Pedal Haus Brewery took home the top honor and was named the 2023 Brewery of the Year when the Arizona Craft Brewers Guild celebrated the craft beer community at the second annual Arizona Craft Beer Awards in October.

Fifty-three local breweries submitted 194 beers to be judged. An independent panel of 65 judges blind sampled the beers and evaluated them according to the Great American Beer Festival guidelines.

The brewery received 18 total points from the three gold medals it won for its German-Style Pilsner, Beach Cruiser Mexican Lager and Desert Classic Pale Ale beers – resulting in being named Brewery of the Year.

The company celebrated its seventh anniversary in 2023, having opened its first location on Mill Avenue in Tempe in 2015. It now also has locations in downtown Chandler, Phoenix and at Phoenix Sky Harbor Airport. The team, led by Wright and Derek "Doc" Osborne, head brewer, crafts all beer out of Pedal Haus' brewing facility in Chandler. The brewery makes a dozen beers - many of them are true to style and several are seasonal such as the Pumpkin Ale and Peppermint Porter.

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
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


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
