As one door closes, another one opens

It was a busy day at the Arizona Humane Society (AHS) Sunnyslope Campus Feb. 20, as staff prepared for a massive undertaking — moving some 200 shelter animals the 15-plus miles to the new Rob & Melani Walton Papago Park Campus. With the move, intake, shelter and adoption services are no longer available in Sunnyslope.

Opened in 1957, the Sunnyslope Campus, located at 1311 W. Hatcher Road, has served hundreds of thousands of sick and injured strays, abandoned and otherwise vulnerable animals over the years. In fact, AHS serves as the biggest intake shelter in the state, and they saw 22,000 animals come through their doors in 2023 alone, 18,000 of which were treated in the hospital.

Amidst the hustle and bustle in February and again as the new hospital opened in March, AHS president and CEO Dr. Steven Hansen sat down to reflect on the history and future of the Sunnyslope campus and their new state-of-the art medical campus.

"In 1957, we were an adoption facility and over the years we developed a trauma hospital here, the most active trauma hospital in the Southwest," Hansen said. "And that hospital treated animals that are homeless, so they can be animals that are hit by cars that don't have homes. We do a lot of cruelty

Changing Hands thrives in changing times

Gayle Shanks and her business partners know magic when they see it. Even if that magic is buried under the dust in an old building. Correction: Especially if that magic is buried under the dust in an old building.

Changing Hands and the First Draft Book Bar, which is located inside the bookstore, are celebrating their 10th year in the old Beefeater's building at 300 W. Camelback Road. The building itself holds sweet mem-

ories for Shanks, who grew up in Phoenix.

"When I was a little girl in a big family, our dad would take us out to eat, one kid at a time. It was a special time to spend time with him, and Beefeater's was my favorite place to go. It was big, felt really fancy, and the food was great," she remembers.

"So, when we saw that the building, an iconic landmark on Camelback Road from the 1950s, was being redeveloped, we had to check it out," said the little girl now all grown up and known, with her partners, for carving a niche where an independent, community focused bookstore in Tempe has thrived since 1971.

"Customers had asked us to open a Phoenix location for many years, but we had our hands full with the growing Tempe store. We kept saying 'no' to a second location. Then Beefeater's redevelopment came along, and we changed our minds," she said.

The building, now named "The Newton" in honor of Beefeater's founder Jay Newton, is a mixed-use concept developed by Venue Projects, LLC, and John Douglas Architects. Changing Hands is there, along with other businesses. Changing Hands and First Draft Book Bar offer far more than books and drinks.

"We're a community event space, complete with classrooms and meeting rooms. We host classes, book







Sunnyslope staple closes after 30 years

It was a good run, but after 30 years and thousands upon thousands of from-scratch baked goods sold, the doors at Karl's Quality Bakery will close on March 31.

Karl Boerner, a native of Germany, began his apprenticeship as a baker in 1958. He immigrated to America in 1976 and worked for a while in New Orleans, Hawaii and California, before moving his family to Sunnyslope in 1993. He opened Karl's in September 1994 at the southeast corner of 7th Avenue and Dunlap. Together, with his wife Stefanie, they grew their business, and raised a family.

The bakery has been a staple for many in the Sunnyslope area. And while it's said that "bread is life," the European style bakery served not only fresh baked breads, but became known for Boerner's doughnuts, as well as a wide variety of cakes and cookies, pastries, and seasonal specialty treats.

In 2014, Karl's daughter, Christine,

took over the bakery and moved it to its current spot on Central and Dunlap avenues.

Despite growing up in her family's bakery, Christine resisted the profession. "I never wanted to work in a kitchen. Ever," she recalled. But one morning over Christmas break, her dad

woke her up saying, "You are old enough to see the top of the oven. You need to help." She was 12. She continued throughout her years at Sunnyslope High School, but she really didn't understand the alchemy of what she was doing, she just did as her dad directed, as an extension of him.

When she moved out, with her sights set on studying architecture, she needed a job and found that where she was most comfortable was in the kitchen, "because I'd been trained for six years," she laughed. So, it was off to culinary school, where she began to understand the theory behind the baking. After completing her apprenticeship and working in Switzerland, she came home to help with the family business, briefly opening The Baker's Daughter, offering chocolates alongside Karl's baked goods, before purchasing the business and moving to the Central Avenue location. But after 10 years, the time has come to move on.

"It's a culmination of a lot of things," she said. Choking back emotions, she explained that running a business is challenging in itself, added to that the pandemic, family obligations, changes in the industry – it can be a heavy load to carry. "You put so much effort and so much love into something...but you can't do it if you don't love it."

Residents will not be left completely bereft of a local baker. Dawn Hernandez will soon open Dawn's NY Baker in the spot. While an opening date is not yet confirmed, she is aiming for a mid-April opening.

Hernandez moved to the state with her family in 1997 and, much like Christine, she grew up in her family's Arizona bakery business. She will bring those 22 years of experience to the Sunnyslope space.

"I'm excited to be in the Phoenix area and bring a New York family bakery into the community," Hernandez said.

Hernandez says that she is still working on the menu, but the focus will be on classic New York offerings, including items such as cannolis, doughnuts, pastries and other goodies. The company has not yet set up a website or social media presence, but neighbors can watch the space at 111 E. Dunlap, Suite 13, for developments.

While Christine has mixed emotions as she closes the doors at Karl's for the last time, she plans to stay in Sunnyslope, and her next chapter is yet to be written — but she is not done baking yet, she says. Fans can follow her at https://linktr.ee/karl-squalitybakery.

In the meantime, she has a simple message of gratitude for the community, "Auf Wiedersehen and thank you for 30 wonderful years!"

signings, trivia nights, author talks and even weddings and baby showers," said Shanks

An astute visitor to Changing Hands—that is, if they aren't focused on looking ahead to the books inside —will notice the letters to the Beefeater's sign embedded in the walkway in front of the store.

"We love to see little kids skip across that iconic sign and they race into the store, headed for the children's book section," said Shanks. Little footprints and initials also adorn the concrete.

The offerings at First Draft Book Bar are tasty, and the comfortable tables and chairs are often occupied by singles, couples and families, all reading, writing, working remotely via laptop or just plain old visiting with one another. The First Draft Book Bar offers coffee, tea, wine and beer, as well as pastries and small bites.

When so many bookstores, even the big chains like Borders and Bookstar, have closed and their customers buy books from Amazon by clicking their smart phones, how is it that Changing Hands is thriving in not one but two locations?

"We really focus on providing a community, inclusive experience, in addition to books," said Shanks. In fact, the original Changing Hands was a "worker-owned collective," occupying all of 500 square feet in Tempe. "We bought a lot of our books from swap meets and took a creative approach to the entire project. The original partners — we were friends from volunteering together at an alternative school. So, we knew one another well, and we all were creative types. We had lively conversations with our customers about what they wanted, and for the most part, we found a way to provide it," she said.

She remembers keeping a running list of ideas and requests on a yellow legal pad by the "ancient" cash register. Changing Hands owners have always emphasized inclusiveness and sustainability in everything they do, from hiring to event programming.

"We trade used books—that's

where the name 'Changing Hands' came from. Books are often shared, passed from reader to reader. They 'change hands' and we help that happen," said Shanks.

The "trade counter," where books change hands, is open Sunday through Friday from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. until 8 p.m. Customers bring in their books for consideration by Changing Hands staff.

Between the two stores, Changing Hands hosts more than 400 events a year. They vary from story time for little ones to book clubs for 'tweens and teens to author events to poetry readings. Events, such as their March 30 50th anniversary celebration, can be found through their website or their emails

The original Tempe store opened on April Fool's Day of 1974, and the Phoenix store opened 10 years ago this May.

"We were greeted by 3,000 customers lined up around the block, eager to see the new Phoenix store. Many of them commented on eating and celebrating special occasions like birthdays and graduations at Beefeater's over the years.

"It's been a lot of fun to see the little kids grow into reading parents who bring their kids and their grandkids to story time, or simply settle into a comfy chair with a kid and a book in their lap," she said.

"Books are simply magical. They take us to new places, and they open our minds," said Shanks.

The first book she remembers owning is Winnie the Pooh. "As I grew, I loved the Cherry Ames books about an adventurous nurse, and Louisa May Alcott was a favorite author.

"Events like poetry readings and writing classes introduce us to new experiences and help us get to know one another. It's a lot of fun to see this community embrace Changing Hands. We work hard, but we feel so beloved. Phoenix natives and newcomers come in and get acquainted in the aisles or at events," she said. "And I get to work in a favorite place from my childhood. It's a changing world, but so many things don't change. Books shared with friends—that's so much fun and we help make that happen."





investigations. All of that activity has grown over the years. We've added special disease control units, we have a parvo unit here, we have a bottle baby nursery, we've got infectious disease wards for distemper — we treat just about anything that these homeless animals come across."

But the facility limited AHS' ability to control disease. Hansen added, "It's a huge problem here. You think about our trauma hospital here, just like a kindergarten room, all the air is shared amongst everybody. So, if we get a group of dogs that come in from one of our partners around Arizona and one of those dogs brings a virus with them, like canine distemper, everybody gets sick and it's a huge problem. The new campus is designed to manage diseases."

Located at 5501 E. Van Buren St., the 72,000-square-foot Papago Park Campus opened its doors to the public March 6. Situated on just under 5 acres, the \$46 million state-of-the-art medical campus is designed with safety and comfort in mind. Ninety percent of the pet spaces are designed with nat-

ural light, and the campus boasts 610 kennels (217 for dogs, 358 for cats and 35 for other critters), 5 fresh air "catios" and 13 play yards – and everything is transparent, open and offers a more natural environment.

AHS' primary function is as a teaching hospital for shelter animals, Hansen says, "Everything else we do supports

the hospital." Four out of five animals who enter their doors will be treated at the Lazin Animal Foundation Trauma Hospital, with 11 ambulances available to transport sick and injured pets to the dedicated emergency room entrance.

Addressing the need to manage disease and address health and welfare needs, the campus kennels are all

equipped with separate ventilation systems to prevent the spread of contagious illnesses. The dedicated ICUs have been expanded, including a parvo unit, "mutternity" suites and baby bottle unit, which is expected to see an uptick with kitten season, with staff on 24-hour bottle duty. Other wellness features include sensory gardens, acoustics that minimize noise pollution, selected paint colors and lighting that are calming and easier on pet's eyes.

The beautiful campus also takes its employees into consideration, with plenty of natural light, the in-house Echo Coffee Shop to provide staff (and visitors) with a readily available pickme-up, vibrant artwork throughout and relaxing spaces to help staff decompress from what can sometimes be difficult work.

This is not the end of the story for the Sunnyslope facility, however. Work has already begun on the expansion of the Marge Wright Veterinary Public Veterinary Clinic, which will still provide some services as remodeling work is completed over the next year.

"Sunnyslope has been very important to us," Hansen said. "It's gotten rather emotional over the last few months—we've enjoyed it here; it's been a good location for the trauma hospital. We're not leaving, we're growing and changing what the emphasis is here."

The hospital that is on the front of the building is going to move into the old trauma hospital, allowing the building to be gutted and remodeled. It will then reopen as a much larger, fullservice veterinary hospital for the community—right now, the clinic only offers spay, neuter and vaccine services.

With the Sunnyslope location no longer taking in sick or injured strays, residents are encouraged to contact the AHS Pet Resource Center at 602-997-7585, Ext. 3800, for guidance. Hansen added that their call center took 10,000 calls in the month of January, and a lot of those calls were, "how can I keep my pet?" AHS has seen a big increase in the number of not only strays but abandonments in recent years, and they can help residents who are facing financial struggles or housing insecurity find resources to help them keep their pets. 

Offer feedback on future development

The city of Phoenix Planning and Development Department hosted a five-day workshop in late February and early March to gather input from area residents within the Northwest Extension Phase II Transit Oriented Community (NWEII TOC) Study Area to help create a plan that will guide future area development.

The study area is roughly 19th Avenue west to 35th Avenue, Butler Drive north to Peoria Avenue, and impacts communities located along and near the Northwest Extension Phase II Light Rail extension (NWEII), a 1.6mile connection from Valley Metro's light rail system at 19th and Dunlap Avenues to the former Metrocenter Mall area in Phoenix. According to the project website, this plan "will serve to attract, guide, and prioritize strategic investments in infrastructure, housing, economic development, transportation, and other areas to realize a shared community vision for the future of the area."

A second community design work-

shop is scheduled for summer 2024. A date has not been announced, but in the meantime, residents can make their voices heard through a community input survey, which can be found, along with additional project details, at www.phoenix.gov/NWEII.

Weigh in on historic preservation

Residents who would like to weigh in on the future of historic preservation in Phoenix are encouraged to review the PreserveHistoricPHX 2025 update, and then take a brief survey, which will help the city of Phoenix Historic Preservation Office plan for the future.

The first comprehensive plan for historic preservation in the city of Phoenix was adopted in 2015. The update will assess the achievements made after the original plan adoption, address new challenges, and explore new opportunities to advance historic preservation in Phoenix.

accomplished through the help of an army of volunteers, and as kitten season approaches, foster parents are in particular demand.

"Foster homes are probably the most important thing right now," Hansen said. "There are kittens in the Papago Park nursery currently, but "over the next few weeks it's going to become really busy. We'll start ramping up with more staff members 24/7 and more volunteers 24/7. That's because it's full-blown kitten breeding season - it starts in March and doesn't end until November."

As kittens come in, they are stabilized and then sent out to foster homes and partner organizations to make room at the shelter until the kittens are ready to go back for sterilization and adoption.

Valley Metro plans westward expansion

Valley Metro concluded a fourth round of community meetings March 6 as it presented its West Phoenix Highcapacity Transit Alternatives Analysis to the public. The project looks at how best to improve high-capacity transit in the west Phoenix study area of Camelback Road, south to McDowell Road; Central Avenue west to 99th Avenue.


The Alternatives Analysis began in fall 2022 and is scheduled to conclude in May 2024, with action by the Phoenix City Council on the recommendation. If approved by the council, the project will move forward to the preliminary design and environmental analysis phase.

According to Marty Ziech, capital planning manager with Valley Metro, who presented at the March 6 meeting, the project is included in Phase 4 of the Maricopa Association of Governments MOMENTUM 2050 regional transportation plan, which puts a construction timeline between 2041 to 2045 (https://azmag.gov/Programs/Transportation/Regional-Transportation-Plan-RTP).

While both Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) and light rail were considered for this study, the final recommendation is for light rail to travel from the station at Central Avenue and Indian School Road west to 75th Avenue, then south to Thomas Road, and west to the Desert Sky Transit Center at 78th Avenue. An optional route extension would take it as far west as 91st Avenue.


The recommendation will be presented to the Citizens Transportation Commission, March 28, and the Transportation, Infrastructure and Planning Subcommittee, April 17, and City Council, May 1. Building community one brick at a time

North Central resident Sabrina Posillico was thrilled when she learned about Pass the Bricks, an organization that collects used Lego bricks, sanitizes and sorts them, designs "new" sets and distributes them through nonprofits to kids who wouldn't normally have access to them.

"Legos are one of the best toys children can play with," Posillico said. "They boost creativity, stimulate imagination and increase spatial, math and engineering skills. But due to their cost, many kids do not have access to them."

Although Pass the Bricks had ambassadors in over 50 cities, at the time, there were none in Arizona — she knew that it was a perfect opportunity for her family.

"We'd been looking for a way to give back to our community and as a big Lego family, it was just the perfect fit," she added.

Her two children, Liliana and Karsten Beth, were equally excited and quickly started building. They even added mes-

sages to each box, telling kids they have incredible imaginations and that the possibilities with Legos are endless.

So far, they have just been using their own Legos, but as outreach increases, they will depend more on donations. Recently, the family delivered its first batch of 100 sets to UMOM, a provider of shelter, housing and services for people experiencing homelessness. The goal

for 2024, the mom says, is to build 1,000 sets, and with the demand from Valley nonprofits they may surpass that number — assuming they can garner enough Lego donations.



THE ART OF DRIVING

Oh, Arizona's vast roads—a place where dreams of freedom driving are roasted under the sun, adventures begin, and, unfortunately, merging mistakes are more often than cactus sightings.

Fear not, dear drivers; I'm here to provide you with a comprehensive grasp of the blistering asphalt of our favorite desert cities. Whether you're a seasoned road warrior or a first-time driver, I have a juicy golden nugget of wisdom that's as valuable as a drop of water in our sun-kissed landscape. So, buckle up, adjust your sunglasses, and prepare to maneuver our busy streets with elegance and a bit of desert flare!

First and foremost, let's address the cactus in the room: So, you've been behind the wheel for a good 5 to 15 years, never so much as grazed a bumper, and your driving record is as clean as a freshly detailed dashboard. But does it imply you know how to drive? Or did you simply win the lottery of lane merging, escaping the pandemonium via pure luck?

As our Arizona cities expand quicker than a speeding bullet (or so it seems), we must all learn to adjust to increased traffic, newcomers who believe a turn signal is only a nice decoration, and the skill of remaining cool—both literally and figuratively—when the heat is on. Make sure to strap up, keep your wits about you, and remember that, in the larger scheme of things, we're all just trying to get from point A to point B without becoming roadrunner's food.

The open road is a place where freedom, adventure, and catastrophes may coexist in equal measure. Whether you are an expert driver or a rookie with no prior experience, these points are applicable to both types of drivers.

Let's Begin Navigating the Asphalt Jungle Without Turning Our Commute into a Demolition Derby...

SPEED HARMONY: Make sure that your speed matches that of traffic before entering the roadway. Think of it like dancing: if your rhythm isn't in sync with everyone around you, chances are high you may end up treading on some toes!

YIELD, BUT DON'T FREEZE: Make room for other drivers on the freeway while giving them space. However, try not to stop or slow down unless it's necessary; remember you are a motorist on a mission!

THE 3-5 SECOND RULE: Locate an opening in traffic that lasts 3 to 4 seconds wide. As an expert tip: don't target vehicles to pass ahead of; rather look for ones behind which would make good partners in an exciting game of dodgeball!

MIRROR, MIRROR, AND HEAD CHECK: Before entering any lane, make sure your vehicle is visible from all directions, and don't forget to inspect its blind spot. Don't rely solely on mirrors turning your head quickly could save a world of trouble!

SIGNAL EARLY AND SIGNAL OFTEN: To send an inviting invitation to other drivers and inform them of your intentions, use turn signals at least 100 to 300 feet before merging or changing lanes. By doing this, it sends out a polite reminder about what lies ahead for all involved.


RESPECT THE SOLID LINE: Don't cross until the solid line ends before merging; this rule applies whether it is suggested or enforced - think of it like the boundary line in a game of tag!

ONE LANE AT A TIME PLEASE: Take one lane at a time across traffic lanes to make it safer, rather than trying to be an action hero by crossing multiple lanes at once. Slow and steady wins the race!

PLAN YOUR EXIT STRATEGY: Be prepared for your exit way ahead of time and navigate toward it by moving into the far-right lane as you approach. Think of this like setting up your chess pieces before the final move!

KEEP THE FLOW GOING: In general, follow the flow of traffic until exiting. However, adjust your speed according to weather conditions and exit ramp designs; being flexible is key here!

THE ETIQUETTE OF PASSING: If you must bully and overtake another vehicle, please use the left lane, and pass from their back onto your own lane when visible in your rearview mirror. When passing larger cars, expand your distance—it's the courteous approach to overtake, like saying "please" and "thank



you" with your car. Oh, and keep your inventive hand signals to yourself; they merely add a dash of unnecessary road rage to everyone's day. Furthermore, that momentary feeling of pleasure will fade faster than your turn signal (assuming you ever use it).

Merging may appear to be a minor aspect of driving, but it is an art form that, if not executed correctly, can cause havoc on our roadways. As we move through our asphalt jungle, remember that the true art of driving is not merely arriving at your destination, but doing it safely, sensibly, and with the patience of a sea turtle taking a leisurely swim. The driver's technique, not the vehicle itself, defines the length of the trip. 

Savings maven launches podcast

Many residents still remember Daphne Munro for her upbeat television segments, but more recently, the North Central Phoenix neighbor has moved into the world of podcasts. And while the format is different, the content is still very much on brand for the savings maven.





New location offers preschool expansion

A Valley preschool is making the move to a new, expanded location after 60 years, but leadership says that their supportive, nurturing focus will not change.

Established in 1961, the Early Education Cooperative Preschool (EECP) is a parent-involved cooperative preschool that focuses on developing the whole child, supporting the growth of parents, and creating meaningful connections within an inclusive community. After over 60 years at its original location at 40th Place and Lincoln Drive in Paradise Valley, EECP will be moving to a new expanded location this fall, renting space from Shepherd of the Hills, UCC at 5524 E. Lafayette Blvd., Phoenix.

Preschool directors Sarah Root and Nancy Wilson, both parents of EEC graduates and North Central residents, say that they're looking forward to the move and having an even greater impact with their unique preschool model.

"Our new location will have five classrooms and an expanded outdoor space for playing and gardening," said Root. "And with the new space, we're looking forward to adding a mixed-age 3's class to our programming!"

Wilson says the longevity and success of the preschool is largely due to the thoughtful incorporation of parent involvement. "We are the only preschool in the Valley with regular parent participation in the classroom twice a month, plus monthly parent education meetings," she said. "Our unique preschool model helps our students gain the skills and confidence to thrive once they are ready to move on to elementary school."

Sarah Corwin is uniquely qualified to comment on the EEC preschool, having one daughter who completed the program, twin girls currently enrolled - and having attended the preschool herself as a child in the 80s.

"If you want a warm and loving community for yourself and for your children, this is the place to go," said Corwin. "There's so much nurturing, so much encouragement to explore and learn through playing with others." She adds that the parent education meetings are one of her favorite elements of the preschool program, as well as the fact that her children get to know their classmates and their parents in a positive nurturing environment.

"You don't feel alone. The meetings are so different at each age (language development, speech, potty training, playing with others, using your words, getting ready for kindergarten). It's an open safe space to talk with teachers and parents, ask if anyone else is dealing with challenges, and express what you're going through as a parent. I learned parenting techniques when my oldest was 2 that I still use!"

Enrollment is underway for programs serving children aged 2 through pre-K and families may apply online at www.cooppreschool.org. Applications will be accepted through May.

Don't fall for scams

You know those annoying calls and texts claiming to be a government agency with urgent information about your Social Security benefits ending or taxes you owe...don't fall for it. The Social Security Administration (SSA) says that government agencies won't call, email or text asking for money or personal information — only a scammer will do that.

In 2023, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) received over 228,282 complaints of government imposter scams, with Social Security as the most frequently impersonated agency. Over 14 percent said they lost money to a scammer — a total of more than \$126.5 million for Social Security scams. To prevent further losses, the SSA is urging everyone to use caution when receiving calls from someone claiming to be from a government agency.

Recognizing the basic signs of a scam is helpful in stopping fraudulent activity. Remember: Scammers pretend to be from an agency or organization you know to gain your trust; Scammers say there is a problem or a prize; Scammers pressure you to act immediately; Scammers tell you to pay in a specific way.

The SSA says that residents should hang up on suspicious calls from "government officials" calling about a problem with their Social Security number or account, never make payments with gift cards, wire transfers, or by mailing cash, and report Social Security scams to https://oig.ssa.gov. Report other scams to https://reportfraud.ftc.gov.

Kids & Families Help can be a text or call away

If there is a teen in your life, April is a good time to check in with them — a simple hello or message of support could make all the difference.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, strong, positive relationships with others can be protective and prevent suicidal thoughts and behaviors. These protective relationships can be especially important this time of year, as research indicates the number of suicides rises during the spring months.

The Teen Lifeline crisis hotline, staffed by volunteer teen peer counselors, handles a 10-percent increase in calls from teens in crisis each year between spring break and the end of the school year. Staff and volunteers are urging every Arizonan with a phone to take proactive action on National Telephone Day, Thursday, April 25, by calling or texting a teen in their life to check in, say hello and let them know you care.

"Whether it's finals, graduation or friends moving on and moving away, the end of the school year is more stressful for our teens than we realize," said Nikki Kontz, clinical director at Teen Lifeline. "Please use your phone for its best possible purpose on April 25 and throughout the next two months — to check in with a teen and see how they are doing. It could save a life."

It's important for teenagers to know that the adults in their lives care about them, Kontz says, yet she also urges teens to reach out to other teens on National Telephone Day. "It's all about making someone feel like they're cared about," she adds.

In 2023, Teen Lifeline received nearly 48,000 calls and text messages from teens in crisis – a 10.6 percent increase from call volumes in 2022. Of those, nearly 16,000 calls and texts were from a teen experiencing thoughts of suicide.

A teen's cell phone, as Kontz explains, can be an important relationship building tool for parents, caregivers, family members and friends.

"Some teens who are nervous about opening up in person will be more likely to share their feelings through text messages, especially when they are struggling with something," says Kontz.

Sending memes, gifs or articles that align with a teen's interests is another way to use a cell phone to uplift, encourage and maintain a relationship.

Adults who suspect a teen may be having thoughts of suicide should ask the teen about it directly. Asking the question will not plant the idea of suicide in a teenager's head and it can give them permission to speak freely, says Kontz.

If a teen replies that they have been thinking about suicide, Kontz recommends thanking them for their honesty and then asking questions about how they've been feeling and why.

If a teen is in immediate danger of self-inflicted harm or of acting on sui-

cidal thoughts, call 911 or take the child to an emergency room.

If the teen is not in immediate danger, create a plan to get help by calling Teen Lifeline or seeking a referral to mental health services or counseling. While waiting for services, be sure to minimize suicide risks by locking up all medications, sharp objects and poisonous chemicals and securing all firearms, including storing ammunition separately.

In Metro Phoenix, the culture pass can be used at dozens of well-known establishments including the Desert Botanical Garden, Heard Museum, and the Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art. It also includes smaller and lesser-known facilities in the Valley like the River of Time Museum,



The Nash announces expansion

Exciting things are in the works at The Nash, the Valley's preeminent jazz venue, which opened in 2012. The club and its Jazz in Arizona leadership announced plans in February for an expanded center for jazz in downtown Phoenix on Roosevelt Row.

The \$2.5 million combined projects will include a new 3,200 square foot education center and extensive renovations for The Nash Jazz Club, located at 110 E. Roosevelt. The renovations for The Nash Jazz Club include plans for a new stage and green room, more relaxed seating including banquettes, booths and bar seating, a full bar and enhanced food offerings, and restroom facilities for patrons.

Café Chat Something for everyone at the Vig North Central

Jeremy Pacheco, culinary director for the sprawling Genuine Concepts restaurant group, is a stickler for details. Who else would have a tasting of six different sliced pickles for their cheeseburger?

Settled into one of the comfy couches in the spacious patio of The Vig North Central, one of the newest Genuine Concepts locations, Pacheco described the painstaking process of picking purveyors for the group's menus.

Take, for example, the seeming lowly cheeseburger.

"We put a lot of effort into it," Pacheco said. "Every component has to be right. We wanted to make sure it's the best burger we can make, so we went through tasting eight to 10 different burger patties, with five or six different styles."

They found a source, a 100-year-old local farm, he said, "but after several years, they decided they didn't want to be in the ground beef business anymore, so we had to go through the process again."

The same goes for buns – ending with Phoenix's Noble Bread.

And don't forget the fries. "Fifteen different options," said Blake Farbman, vice president for operations for the Genuine Concepts group.

"Jeremy's very conscious about The Vig having something for everybody," Farbman said. "That's why you see so many different components in the menu – familiar but elevated. I think that's the cool part about The Vig. You can get tacos, pozole, a burger, prime rib – a little bit of everything and that makes it cool."

"It's all scratch, with high-quality ingredients," Pacheco said. "We're an American upscale tavern. We want everything to be the best, and that's what we focus on."

Favorites include those cheeseburgers, along with tuna tartare and a steak salad topped with crispy onions.

And there's a wide selection of beverages.

"We're working the cocktail list all the time, and we just changed the wine menu," Pacheco said. "I took one for the team and tasted 40 different wines. We wanted good wine at a reasonable price."

Another focus is comfort – with a careful selection of locations, then layers of creature comforts such as comfy seating in the laid-back patios. The vibe is laid-back, with an edge of sophistication in a very cool setting. Lots of comfortable seats, lounge areas, spacious patios – a place to sink in and savor creature comforts and creative menu selections.

"Ambiance is always on point," Farbman said. "There's just this warm vibe that you get into these facilities; it feels cozy. It's comfort, and it's not pretentious," Farbman said.

The Vig North Central's patio, with its leisurely ambiance, is an especially inviting example. It's in a location formerly occupied by another Genuine Concept restaurant, Ladera Taverna y Cocina. The renovation included the patio, making some changes to enhance creature comforts.

"We make the fireplace a focal point from any spot in the building," Farbman said. "You sit in the patio, and you almost feel like you're in a ski lodge with the fireplace and hardwood ceilings and décor."

Genuine Concepts was founded about 17 years ago by Tucker Woodbury and Jim Riley. Today the group includes Vig locations in North Central, Arcadia (the original), McDowell Mountain, Park West in Peoria, McCormick Ranch and downtown Phoenix on Fillmore; along with The Little Woody at 42nd Street and Indian School Road, Campo at

McCormick Ranch, The Womack at 7th Street and Bethany Home Road, The Genuine in North Central, and The McMillan on Route 66 in Flagstaff.

The group is looking to expand, Farbman said. "We've seen a lot of restaurateurs who are doing Buckeye and Surprise, Goodyear and Maricopa – that's where the magic is."

"We're a neighborhood place,"

Pacheco said. "We pick the neighborhoods for our restaurants, and that's what makes them different." The group has helped to transform the dining scene at several locations, helping to create hubs where creative restaurants cluster, he said.

"What we do, you have to love," Farbman said. "What I love about our group is we always want to do better, provide a better experience. We never settle. With our expansion, we're spreading out without selling out."

Deconstructing Devour 2024

The tents have folded, the chefs have returned to their kitchens, and the eager crowds have dispersed, returning the Desert Botanical Garden to its tranquil state—the 2024 Devour Culinary Classic is over, but the delicious memories continue to resonate.

Local First Arizona's 15th annual Devour, an event showcasing Arizona's top chefs, was hosted at the garden Feb. 24-25 in partnership with the Southern Arizona Arts & Cultural Alliance. As guests wound their way throughout the desert setting — which was punctuated by members of the Scottsdale Artists League demonstrating their plein air techniques—they were greeted by dozens of Arizona restaurants, drink purveyors and other food-centric vendors who treated them to samples of their wares. Also placed throughout the event were patient Devour volunteers, who helped attendees sort and divert a record three tons of waste from the landfill to recycling or composting, a 70 percent diversion rate.

A panel of top food critics and journalists from around the country tasted dishes served by over 50 participating restaurants and others, scoring on taste, presentation, degree of difficulty and creativity. Dishes that qualified for awards were then designated Best in Show, Double Gold Medal, Gold Medal, Silver Medal, Bronze Medal and Heritage Food Medal.

A Best in Show was awarded to the Gastronomic Union of Tucson (GUT)



chefs for their birria campanelle, tacos de Canasta de Calabaza & Cascabel and Jamaica & limoncello cheesecake. Judges called these dishes "mouthwatering," "killer" and "luscious." The North Central News team found GUT's tacos (mesquite roasted local white squash, Cascabel chiles, pepitas, tepary beans, corn tortilla, pomegranate pickled shallots, Azafran vegan crema, mushroom chicharron with Sonoran chile crisp and mico cilantro) especially delectable.

For the second year, the Heritage Food Medal honored the best dish with ingredients that are indigenous, heirloom, low-water, desert-adapted or locally sourced (within a 100-mile radius of the restaurant) and thus more sustainable for Arizona. This year's winner, also a gold medal winner, was The Rez: An Urban Eatery for its chocolate mole tamale and jackfruit taco on fresh blue corn tortilla.

Restaurants in the North Central Phoenix and surrounding areas made an excellent showing at the event, including Chilte, awarded the Double Gold Medal

for their Duroc Pork Tomahawk with Huitlacoche Chiltepin Mole, and Chula Seafood, taking home a gold medal for their Dry Aged Fish. Silver medal winners included Uptown's Clever Koi, Frites Street, Sandfish Sushi, Midtown's Poolboy Taco, Renata's Hearth at Arizona Biltmore and Camelback's The Gladly. Bronze medal winners included Aioli Gourmet Burger, Lylo Swim Club and Renaissance Phoenix: Dust Cutter, which is in downtown Phoenix.
