Protect your critters during summer's heat

It's summertime in Phoenix and you wouldn't think of walking down the street barefoot. Or even walking across the patio without shoes. So, why would you expect your dog to do it?

"Sidewalks, streets and parking lots get extremely hot," said Tara Tillotson, DVM. "Dr. T," as her colleagues and patients' owners call her, is a Phoenix native and associate veterinarian at Desert Ark Veterinary Care of Arizona.

"If it's too hot for your feet, it's too hot for your pet. Take walks early in the morning or late in the evening. Put the palm of your bare hand on the surface. If it is uncomfortable to hold it there for five seconds, it is too hot for your animal's bare paws," she said.

Dr. T also cautions about how quickly animals confined to a closed vehicle can suffer fatal consequences. "It happens within minutes in a hot car," she said. "Leaving a pet outside without shade and water can also kill pets. We see it every year, starting in early spring and lasting into the fall."

Here are a few tips provided by veterinarians and the Arizona Humane Society:

- Provide fresh water and plenty of it for all pets, whether they are inside or outside.
- If your animal is outside, be sure they have shade throughout the day, and a way to lie down on dirt or

Preserving the legacy of Grover Thompson

The story of why Grover Thompson created the whimsical Sunnyslope Rock Garden has largely been lost to time, but two area residents, Marion Blake and Julia Taggart, are working to preserve the artistic labor of love for current and future generations.

Grover Cleveland Thompson was born in Fossil, Oregon, on New Year's Day 1892. The oldest of seven

children, Thompson remained in Oregon for three decades. During that time, he married his wife Fay and had two children, Lucille and Cloydene, before moving to a suburb of Seattle, Washington, in the early 1930s. Then, in February 1941, tragedy struck — both Thompson's wife and oldest daughter died, just five days apart from one another.

At various times in Thompson's life, he identified himself as a farmer, a service man, a master mechanic, a heavy equipment operator and heavy construction engineer, and according to his 1942 World War II draft registration card, he lost the two center fingers on his right

hand at some point. All of this history and more is what he brought to the Sunnyslope area when he and his second wife, Nancy, moved to Phoenix in the early 1950s. They settled in at 10023 N. 13th Place in March 1954, and Thompson got to work on what has become his lasting legacy.

Said to be inspired by the Petersen Rock Garden in Thompson's native Oregon, and similar in style and construction to the Watts Towers in Los Angeles and reminiscent of Louis Lee's Phoenix garden, the folk art garden was painstakingly created over the course of 20-plus years out of concrete forms, rocks collected from

Libraries extend hours for heat relief

There were 645 heat-related deaths reported in Maricopa County in 2023; 71 percent of those occurred on a day when the Weather Service issued an excessive heat warning, and 45 percent of heat related deaths were among people experiencing homelessness. So, this year, when the county launched its annual Heat Relief Network May 1, it had another partner in helping combat heat-related deaths – the Phoenix Public Library system.

Providing relief from summer heat is not new to Phoenix libraries; they have always been open to residents seeking to come in from the heat during operating hours, and many summers have provided water, cooling towels and heat-related safety information.

This year, however they are stepping up their efforts.

For the first time, Phoenix is offering two heat Respite Centers that will be accessible overnight. Burton Barr Central Library will offer a 24-hour respite center and the Senior

Opportunities West Senior Center at 7th Ave. and Buckeye will offer overnight respite hours daily from 6 p.m. to 5 a.m.

In addition, three library locations will serve as designated Cooling Centers, offering extended hours. Cholla, Harmon and Yucca Libraries will stay


open as Cooling Centers (full library services will not be available during designated extended Cooling Center hours) Mondays through Saturdays until 10 p.m. On Sundays, these three locations will open as designated Cooling Centers only from noon to 10 p.m.

These designated Cooling Centers will remain open for heat relief during city holidays, including Memorial Day, Juneteenth and Independence Day. Respite Centers' holiday hours will be the same and the Cooling Centers' holiday hours at the three other library locations will be noon to 10 p.m.

Libraries are working in tandem with Phoenix Human Services Department, Office of Homeless Solutions, Office of Heat Response and Mitigation and others to provide a coordinated response to residents seeking relief during extended hours.

A library spokesperson said, "During those hours, people can come in out of the heat, they can charge a phone, and they can have access if they want to connect with further resources," and emphasized that this service is available to anyone who needs to get out of the heat.

The regional Heat Relief Network includes an interactive map with more than 124 locations where people can find shade, water and indoor cooling centers, or where those wanting to help can drop off donations, such as bottled water. The network, and the services provided at libraries, will be active through Sept. 30. 



grass instead of concrete or asphalt.

- Older pets as well as pets that are ill are especially vulnerable to heat. If your pet takes medications, ask your vet or pharmacist if any of their medications make them especially vulnerable to heat and sun.
- Hot, thirsty animals will seek water anywhere they can find it. They may chew on plants that they otherwise would ignore, and some backyard plants are toxic. Among the common ones in Phoenix are oleanders and Mexican Bird of Paradise. Call the Arizona Poison and Drug Information Center at 1-800-222-1222 if you are concerned.
- Sunburn? Yes, pets can get sunburned. Their noses and around their eyes can be burned by exposure to the sun. Don't use sunscreen they may lick it off. Should you shave a particularly hairy pet in the summertime? If you do, remember that this will expose their skin to possible sunburn.
- Backyard pools are a hazard to children, disabled people and to pets and wild animals. Be sure your pool is secure. For pets, teach them where the steps are so they can get out. Some pool owners affix a door mat to the side of the pool, so that pets as well as other animals can use it as a ladder to get out of the water.
- Teach your children and others in your household to pay special attention to pets in the hot weather. Even the youngest ones can remind adults to fill water bowls.

Susan Fuchs, North Phoenix resident and pet lover, recounts a hard lesson learned.

"My Chocolate Chip, a rescue Lab, got into my pool on a hot summer day. Maybe he fell in — we're not sure. I went home from work at lunch to check on him and he was in the pool, desperate to get out. He had forgotten or didn't know how to use the steps, and in his panic, had clawed at the tile until he was exhausted and all his front nails were gone. I got home just in time to help him.

"Big lesson for us — we immediately started locking his doggie door when he was home alone, to secure the pool and not take a chance that he might be outside by himself. Please learn from our mistake that almost cost Chocolate Chip his life."

Some veterinary practices offer urgent care services to animals who need immediate help. Experienced pet owners advise that all animal lovers

identify the closest urgent care center before the need arises. Post the numbers on your fridge or somewhere everyone in the household will see it. Put them into your phone.

"Take the same care of your animals that you do of your children and elders year 'round," said an experienced vet tech at a 24-hour emergency care facility in North Central. "It's so very sad to see animals suffering, and their owners are heartbroken when they realize they could have prevented the problem. Teach the little kids by your example, and stay vigilant during these hot days."

Dr. T said that awareness is key, "But even the most devoted, heat-aware owner can make a mistake. Watch for excessive panting, drooling and being out of it. Prevention is so important, but if your pet starts to act disoriented, off balance, panting, vomiting or having diarrhea, get help immediately."

around Arizona, seashells, tile, and even colorful shards of Fiestaware, blue Bromo-Seltzer bottles (provided by a neighbor who was a nurse), and dozens of other unique found objects.

The visionary environment depicts everything from the Seattle Space Needle, Dutch windmills and Native American cliff dwellings to dozens of quirky human forms – many of their faces created by pouring concrete into 1950s Halloween masks – along with dozens of arches, fountains, tables and other forms that themselves house creative figures.

Grover Thompson died Oct. 27, 1977, eight months after Nancy, and his artistic endeavor may well have been destroyed if not for an NYU art history student who happened to be visiting her parents in 1978.

Blake recalled, "When I saw this, oh my gosh! My parents had a little hideaway out in the desert, and while they were building it, they had stayed somewhere around here, and in the evening when they would take a walk, they happened to come by this place. When I came to visit them, they took me here, right from the airport. They said, 'you have to see this.' It was for sale, and I was in love with it! I mean, there was no question. If I could possibly afford it, I had to have it."

From an artistic standpoint, Blake, who is a retired teacher, said, "[Thompson] was very sensitive to color and shape and form, even though he had no artistic training. He was in construction. So, he knew about vertical structures, he could make forms, he could cast the concrete – like those curved supports for the Space Needle – he had great skill to be able to do that."

Beyond just the personal enjoyment that she derived from the property, from the get-go, she wanted to preserve the garden and hoped that others would recognize its value.

"It really meant a lot to me," she tearfully reflected. "You know, it's like a comma. It's a small place, but in and of itself, it's a jewel. And there are not a lot of places like this left."

Blake began her efforts to obtain historic recognition of the garden in the mid-80s, and submitted an application to gain Phoenix historic status for the property in 1992, but the application was rejected by the Historic Preservation Office, mainly because the property was not yet 50 years old.

Now, with the help of Taggart, who is president at the Sunnyslope Historical Society and Museum, another push is being made for not only historic status, which Taggart explains will still not protect the garden from demolition should it change hands, but for a conservation easement.

In Phoenix, a conservation easement, which is tied directly to grant funding, usually ranges from 15 to 40 years, says Helana Ruter, a historic preservation officer with the city of Phoenix, and provides a greater level of oversight of modifications to historic buildings.

Ruter adds that the grants are typically geared towards exterior rehabilitation and maintenance of buildings, although the easement would be recorded on the property as a whole.

"This is an interesting one," she said. "The significance lies more with the rock garden than the building on the property."

The application is currently in review with the Historic Preservation office as they conduct a formal determination of eligibility, which should take about 30 days. If accepted, the application will then follow the public process, with neighborhood notification and a three-four-month long schedule of public meetings. While that process unfolds, residents are encouraged to show up at the Historic Preservation Commission meetings (the next one is June 17) or send a letter in support of preserving the Sunnyslope Rock Garden.

"It's good to start this process ahead of time and make sure that the city knows what we value as well as let developers know what we value here in Phoenix and our communities – before they're in jeopardy," Taggart said. "We're always making history, but sometimes we're not preserving the history we have."

Once the weather cools, Taggart hopes to schedule a public tour of the garden so that others can learn about its history. "It's not just a beautiful art piece," she said. "There is a memory to it."

Blake added that the space is deserving of appreciation and preservation, "There's something very, very precious about it. It's important and it's something that is unique."

In the meantime, Thompson's artistic endeavor continues to capture the hearts and imagination of Sunnyslope neighbors and out-of-town visitors alike, and if Blake and Taggart are successful, it will continue to do so for many more decades to come.



Wonderview moves to planning

At the May 7 meeting of the Camelback East Village Planning Committee, members heard the Wonderview at Highland Planned Unit Development rezoning case (number Z-79-23-4), which they subsequently approved by a vote of 17-0.

The project consists of 2.49 acres located at the southwest corner of 14th Place and Highland Avenue - formerly the 1950s era Wonder View Trailer Park - that will be redeveloped as a mixed-use development with three two-story office and commercial buildings near Highland Avenue and 34 one- and two-story residential units toward the southern portion of the site, which ends at Meadowbrook Avenue. Single-story duplexes will be built along 14th Place, with the two-story residences on the west side of the property. William Allison with Withey, Morris, Baugh, PLC, speaking for the developer, Venue Projects, stated that prospective commercial tenants include a nonprofit, a community bank and a small market or coffee shop.

One resident concern raised was that of an adjacent property owner who requires access to an irrigation ditch along the property's western boundary. VPC chair Jay Swart asked committee member Barry Paceley, who works with SRP, to work with the developer to make certain that the resident maintains the required access as the development progresses.

The Phoenix Planning Commission will consider the case June 6; it will then go to Council July 1 for final approval.

New movement to revitalize park

After thousands of new residential units were approved for development along Central Avenue in the last year or two, a new citizen-led effort is underway with the intention of preparing a proactive plan for the revitalization of Steele Indian School Park.

After the May 13 general meeting of the Carnation Association of Neighbors (CAN), area resident Jeremy Thacker presented an outline of possible improvements that would make the park more accessible and functional for current residents, as well as help it grow along with future development. The park is located at 300 E. Indian School Road, and roughly 3,000 new residential units are planned near the park, mostly along Central Avenue between Indian School and Camelback roads.

Bulk trash switches to appointment-based

On May 15, after a presentation at the City Council's Transportation, Infrastructure and Planning Subcommittee meeting, the city of Phoenix Public Works Department announced that it is changing the way bulk trash is collected beginning Sept. 30. The new program will offer residents the ability to schedule their own bulk trash collection using an online portal, rather than waiting for quarterly bulk trash pickup during the dates assigned to their area.

Under the current bulk trash program, Public Works lays out a collection schedule for the entire year for 13 different regions across the city, giving each region four designated collection periods annually.

With the new program, residents will schedule a pickup date online. The portal will offer available collection dates based on the customer's address. Upon selecting a date, customers will get a text confirmation and can then begin to place their bulky items at the edge of their property no more than seven days ahead of their pickup appointment – a change from the previous nine-day window. Customers will be allowed up to 10 cubic yards of trash per collection (approximately 17 ft. x 4 ft. x 4 ft.) – a change from the prior 20 cubic yards allowed.

What else is different? The new program will do away with bulk trash collection in alleys, everything will now be picked up curbside.

A spokesperson for the department said that, "In unique property situations where it's not feasible to place piles at the front edge of the property, Public Works will educate customers on a case-by-case basis on where their pile should be placed."

Residents should also be aware that, currently, placing trash in an alley outside of collection time is considered illegal dumping.

"Once bulk trash alley collection ends, any placement of trash piles in alleys will be considered illegal dumping and enforcement efforts can be made," the spokesperson added. "Residents are always encouraged to call Crime Stop at 602-262-6151 if they see illegal dumping in the act. To report illegal dumping after the fact, they can contact Public Works at 602-262-6251 and we will begin a field investigation."

Residents can begin scheduling

bulk trash appointments online using myPHX311 Friday, Aug. 30, with the first available day of bulk trash by appointment Sept. 30. Residents can also call the Public Works Department at 602-262-6251 up to four weeks in advance to schedule an appointment. For additional information, visit www.phoenix.gov/publicworks/bulktrash.

Popular trails close on heat warning days

Phoenix hit its first 100-degree milestone on April 21, which is why once again this summer, three popular city of Phoenix hiking trails will close during extremely hot days.

On days when the National Weather Service issues an Excessive Heat Warning, all trails associated with Piestewa Peak Trailhead in the Phoenix Mountain's Preserve and Camelback Mountain's Echo and Cholla Trails will close from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

During Excessive Heat Warnings, trail access is limited, parking lot gates will be closed, and signage will be posted. Closure information will be posted on the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department's website and social media accounts, and to local resorts and hotels. Additionally, Phoenix Park Rangers will be visible at those locations to remind and educate trail users about the restrictions.

During the Valley's warm weather months, and regardless of whether an Excessive Heat Watch is in effect, it is recommended that trail users hike during the early morning or evening hours when it is cooler and there is more shade.

To help with that recommendation, extended summer hours are in effect annually from June through September at North Mountain Park and Piestewa Peak Trailhead in the Phoenix Mountains Preserve, and Pima Canyon Trailhead in South Mountain Park/Preserve. To provide an extra two hours of availability and promote hiking after 7 p.m., parking lot entrances are open until 9 p.m. at those locations. Year-round at those three trailheads, parking lots open at 5 a.m., and trails are open until 11 p.m. All other trails within the Phoenix parks system will remain open.

Shuttered pub makes way for dealership

It had a solid 20-year run, but Rosie McCaffrey's Irish Pub, which closed its doors in September 2022, was reduced to a pile of rubble in May to make way for a Chapman BMW display lot.

At the May 7 meeting of the Camelback East Village Planning Committee (VPC), members were presented with a request to rezone two parcels, located at 901 and 906 E. Camelback Road, to accommodate an expansion of the adjacent BMW display lot (rezoning cases Z-26-24-6 and Z-SP-7-23-6). Chapman purchased the property in June 2023 after the pub's 2022 closure, and a demolition request was posted in February and the permit was issued in April of this year.

At the meeting, no residents spoke in opposition of rezoning the property, but during the rezoning process, representatives from adjacent townhome communities used the opportunity to work with Chapman to address various street parking issues that they have

encountered. Both representatives and the committee chair praised the Chapman team for their willingness to hear and address the neighborhood's concerns.

After discussion, the VPC unanimously approved the rezoning requests, which will be presented to the Planning

Commission on June 6 and the Phoenix City Council on July 1.

Fireworks a nuisance for many

Pretty to look at but potentially terrifying to residents — human and animals alike — fireworks have become an ever-growing bone of contention in Phoenix.

As residents rang in the new year, the boom of aerial fireworks echoed across the city for hours, and many frustrated residents welcomed 2024 looking through the haze of smoke that settled in the Valley. Added to that, the sale and use of many fireworks is illegal in the city of Phoenix, but Arizona

State Law allows both — and that law supersedes municipal code.

Arizona Revised Statutes section 36-1606 (https://www.azleg.gov/ars/36/01606.htm) regulates when permissible fireworks can be bought, sold and used in Arizona. The sale of permissible consumer fireworks is allowed April 25-May 6, May 20-July 6, Dec. 10-Jan. 3 and two days before the first day of Diwali through the third day of Diwali, which varies and falls between mid-October and mid-November each year. The use of these fireworks is allowed May 4-6, June 24-July 6, Dec. 26-Jan. 3, and the second and third days of Diwali each year.

In addition, the use of fireworks is prohibited between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8 a.m., except for New Year's Eve, between 11 p.m. Dec. 31 and 1 a.m. Jan. 1, and between the hours of 11 p.m. on July 4 through 1 a.m. on July 5 of each year.

Beyond the noise, the danger of fire is real. The Phoenix Fire Department reported that the average fire call volume increased 161 percent from Dec. 30, 2023, to Jan. 1, 2024. Before 2010, fireworks were illegal. On July 4, 2009, the Fire Department responded to 17 fire incidents versus 176 fire incidents on July 4, 2023, a 935 percent increase.

A petition was launched in 2019 that calls for a ban of consumer fireworks, citing a variety of issues (www.change.org/p/doug-ducey-banconsumer-fireworks-in-az). Concerned residents can also contact members of the state legislature and ask them to repeal the law allowing the sale and use of fireworks.



"The Urban Land Institute organized a planning session with District 4 and the community in 2021. One finding of this study was the depth and diversity of the people and businesses that are in that area. They decided the best outcome would be to create the International District to celebrate the diversity present there."

The purpose of the establishing the district is to highlight local businesses that contribute culturally and economically to Phoenix, Pastor said.

"Establishing this district was incredibly important to me because these businesses have done so much for us — it's about time we give them the recognition they deserve and potentially bring more business through their doors."

The councilwoman added that the area has historically welcomed a large population of refugees and immigrants, and more than 43 languages are spoken within a three-mile radius of the International District, the boundaries of which run from Campbell Avenue north to Montebello Avenue and from 7th Avenue, west to the I-17.

"The International District is a celebration of all these cultural diversities," added Osaki. "But also, it's an opportunity where the community can grow and thrive together. It's community support and people support, ensuring that we are the ones creating a sustainable economy for ourselves. Even though we are the Asian chamber, we work in harmony with so many other cultures. So really, it's the reflection of just all these communities coming together."


District 4 is working with the city of Phoenix Community and Economic Development (CED), Planning and Development and Neighborhood Services departments, and the next step is to work on branding and physical signage for the area, "We are working with CED to see what the brand will look like; physical signage, art, marketing materials, and maps. That effort will officially begin in June and continue over the summer.," Pastor said.

Raising awareness of elder abuse

By 2050, the number of Americans aged 65 and older is expected to see a 45 percent increase from 2022 numbers, which is bringing the health and safety of older adults into sharp focus. Elder abuse can be financial, emotional, physical and sexual. It also includes people who are neglected and those who neglect themselves (self-neglect). Social isolation, financial or emotional stress, and dementia can make a senior vulnerable to abuse.

The consequences of elder abuse are grave: older adults who are abused are twice as likely to be hospitalized, four times as likely to go into nursing homes, and three times as likely to die. While studies show that 60 percent of abusers are family members, abuse can happen in any setting: in the older adult's own home or a senior living community.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, or WEAAD, is an annual initiative launched June 15, 2006, by the International Network for Prevention of Elder Abuse and the World Health Organization. WEAAD aims to provide opportunities for communities around the world to improve their understanding of the abuses experienced by older people by raising awareness of cultural, social, and economic processes and the demographics that affect them. Elder abuse is one of the least investigated types of violence and is not addressed in national action plans as often as other important social issues.

The United Nation's International Plan of Action has described elder abuse as a public health and human rights problem. Globally, the number of elderly people in the world is expected to be 1.4 billion by 2030. Research shows that four to six percent of older people suffer from some type of abuse, most of which go unreported. June 15 is a day to ensure that we stay focused on our elders, ensuring they lead a life of high quality and dignity.

If you suspect that a vulnerable adult is in danger of abuse, document the signs; call law enforcement at 9-1-1 if the abuse is severe or you suspect the person may be in danger of more harm;





Café Chat

Serving dinner with a view for more than 40 years

Forty-two years ago, the Different Pointe of View restaurant opened as the crown jewel of a new resort sprawling along 7th Street on the site of a former quarry that sliced through the middle of what is now the North Mountain Preserve.

From the 14-foot-tall dining room windows, 1,800 feet above the Valley floor, visitors could take in a spectacular swath, or step out onto expansive patios paved with flagstone mined from the Tapatio hills around them to toast the sunset and growing shadows below them.

Today, in what is now known as the Hilton Phoenix Tapatio Cliffs Resort, evidence of that rugged foundation greets guests at the entrance, the restaurant seeming to spring from the jagged stone walls.

Some evenings, as the sun goes down and the moon rises over Piestewa Peak, you can hear the yipping of coyotes – a quintessential desert moment that has drawn visitors for more than four decades to its main dining room,

terrace lounge and patios below.

It was a special-occasion spot, where locals bring visitors to soak in the view and desert ambience. The terrace and connecting patios are popular wedding venues, and the romance

doesn't end there. "Sometimes we get two or three proposals a night," said Kelly Henderson, director of sales and marketing for Hilton Phoenix Tapatio Cliffs Resort.

Over the four decades, the view sometimes outstripped the quality of the cuisine, but management has been on a path to change that. Chef Alex Knezevic, who came aboard in 2022, and his team are continuing a process begun several years ago to offer innovative dishes that have elevated the cuisine to new heights, giving the view a run for its money.

Knezevic's culinary career began at 14 years old, when he would help out at his Rochester, Mich., church, setting up the hall for dining events and eventually working in the kitchen as a cook. He tried a spell in college but found classrooms boring.

"I opened up my first restaurant when I was 20," he said. "I had no idea what I was doing, and it failed miserably. I decided to go to culinary school, Schoolcraft College in Livonia, Michigan. They have the highest number of certified master chefs outside of the CIA (Culinary Institute of America) in New York, without the CIA price tag."

He graduated in 2004 and moved to Tampa, Fla., working four years with Fabrizio Schenardi, "the first chef to bring a Michelin star to a Florida restaurant," Knezevic said. In the traditional career path of learning world cuisines and trends under a series of chefs, he worked at several Tampa-area hotels and restaurants before making the move back home to Michigan.

He moved back home to Michigan for family reasons and opened up a highly-regarded restaurant called Vertical Detroit, this time earning top rankings from local and national food publications.

"Then COVID hit," he said, and in 2020 the restaurant closed. Friends and family encouraged him, now divorced with two young children, to move to Phoenix to be near them. "I did a couple of smaller events – catering and house parties – and in 2022 a recruiter reached out to me with this position."

"When I came here, I took the existing menu and tried to improve on that," Knezevic said. "My task was to



make it more modern, and we try to go local as much as possible. Noble Bread, Crow's Dairy, locally-grown microgreens, olive oil from Queen Creek. And we grow our own herbs here on the property."

Knezevic describes today's menu as American, with European influences. Guests want food that tastes great without being intimidating, he said.

Offerings include Iberico pork belly over black fried rice, with bananatamarind emulsion; and roasted bone marrow with pickled red onion, Maille mustard chimichurri and caperberries, a luscious blend to spread over grilled baguette slices. They're among the dishes served in the main dining room as well as the terrace lounge, a step up for guests who want to stop in for a few special bites with their sunset cocktail.

"It's such a great experience coming to the patio just for drinks and small plates," Henderson said. "We're so fortunate to have such an outstanding property and a chef like Alex."

Some of Knezevic's innovations: compressed watermelon salad, where the melon is compressed with a cryovac; olive oil powder dusting the crab

cake, served with Marcona almond romesco; and a 63-degree (Centigrade) egg served with grilled asparagus – "little things, introducing new techniques like molecular gastronomy," he said. "The yolk is almost like Hollandaise."

The menu also includes favorites like fried rice, steak, and roasted chicken with mashed potatoes.

"As long as it tastes good, that's the

main point," Knezevic said. "It's all about making it a little different, but still approachable and enjoyable."

Pizza and pups is a winning combination

Hunter Rodgers may have some impressive mentors in the world of restaurateurs, but with the opening of his first restaurant, Pizza to the Rescue at 26th Street and Indian School Road, he aims to make his own mark on Phoenix's culinary landscape, while at the same time making a positive impact in his community.

A Phoenix native, Rodgers loved cooking growing up, so much so that he spent his summers during high school and college volunteering in the kitchen of family friend Vincent Guerithault at his Vincent on Camelback restaurant.

"I worked in his kitchen and learned a foundation of French classic cooking. I really loved it," Rodgers recalled.

After college, he moved to Los Angeles and pursued investment banking and finance for six years, then came back home in 2017-2018. Not long after that, between 2018-2019, he and long-time girlfriend Geri Hormel, founder of Almost There, a mom and pups rescue,

(www.almostthererescue.org) were looking at a group of buildings for sale on the corner of 26th Street and Indian School Road, and the front building just felt right for a restaurant.

"There's some sort of energy in here that really felt like it was begging to become a restaurant," Rodgers said, "Street frontage on Indian School, a big sign, room for a patio. So, the idea was to create something that we both love. I love cooking and she could run the dog rescue from the opposite building. We figured that combining the two – pizza and puppies – couldn't be a bad thing."

Although the rescue has been operating at 2611 E. Indian School Road for a few years now, after starting work on the restaurant in July 2020 and facing plenty of setbacks, Pizza to the Rescue finally opened April 4 of this year, and the reception from the neighborhood has been overwhelmingly positive.

"It's really exciting to see a lot of people from the neighborhood coming in here telling us how long they've been waiting for this to open," Rodgers said. "They kind of watched our progress over the last few years."

He describes the vibe as super cool and very eclectic, "The design itself is a little bit of Moroccan and Mediterranean and Spanish and Mexican with a little bit of mid-century modern and contemporary, all kind of smashed together with found light fixtures and found finishes on the floor and tiles on the wall."

He also credits another Valley culinary icon and friend of many years, Chef Christoper Gross, with mentoring him through the process of opening a restaurant. The menu, however, is one of his own creation. It is based on dishes that he likes to make at home, meatballs that he perfected in college, and borrowing from recipes that his mom created (the Cesare salad that she's been making for family since he was a kid) and drawing inspiration from meals with family and friends over the years. "It's a combination of all the things just a lot of things that I love making and knew that I wanted to share with our guests."

The restaurant focuses on sourcing small and local whenever it can, and from Italy when it cannot. And everything is cooked over live fire utilizing a woodfired pizza oven and grill. Rodgers recommends the Margarita pizza (try

adding pepperoni, jalapeños or anchovies), the Mexican chorizo pizza or the mushroom pizza, featuring mushrooms from a local cultivator. He adds that everything is made fresh, including the bread, and never frozen. They also boast an innovative cocktail menu and an extensive wine list, with a focus on Italian wines.

From the beginning, the restaurant concept was connected to the rescue (thus the name) and 25 percent of all pizza sales goes directly towards providing shelter, care and love for rescued dogs on their journey to finding forever homes. The rescue even brings pups to the patio on certain nights to help boost adoptions and it has brought increased exposure for the work they do.

But at the end of the day, he wanted to create a space where guests to feel like they are being entertained by family.

"That's what we know how to do," said Rodgers. "We don't know how to run a restaurant. We just know how to hang out at our house and serve our friends and family and make some good food."

'Big Daddy' bids farewell

After nearly four decades of serving the Sunnyslope area, Dave "Big Daddy" Smith, owner of Big Daddy's Sports Lounge, is selling the bar and finally eyeing retirement.

The family owned watering hole first opened its doors on April 1, 1986. Back then, it was located at 7th Street and Dunlap Avenue. In July 2007, it moved to its current location on Cave Creek Road. The spot became known for its extensive menu that included pizzas and wings, burgers, sandwiches, hot dogs and Wisconsin cheese curds, as well as its dozens of televisions and off-track betting (OTB).

This isn't the first time that Smith has stepped away from the bar. He almost retired in 2018, turning ownership of the bar over to other partners. "As far as I know, everything else stays the same," Smith said. "I know he plans on shutting down for a period of time to remodel the inside, but everything else, I think the menu and everything else, the sports theme, OTB, will all stay the same."

To the neighborhood patrons who kept coming back over the years, Smith says a hearty "Thanks! Without them, I wouldn't have been here," he added.

Those patrons will have time to say their own farewells in June before ownership changes hands on June 24, including at a farewell bash, Sunday, June 23, beginning at 1 p.m.




