Preserving a library and a legacy

Tucked back in a modest Sunnyslope neighborhood sits an equally modest-looking building. Designed by Bennie Gonzales & Associates and opened Jan. 5, 1969, the Acacia Branch of the Phoenix Public Library system has quietly served residents for more than 50 years. And now, the residents that it has served it for so long are seeking historic status for the building.

Designed to resemble burnt adobe and maintaining most of its original integrity, the library reflects the signature style of Arizona native Gonzales, whose "regionalism" style, according to Modern Phoenix, focused on "the culture, building materials, and climate of the region." Step through the library doors and patrons are transported into a light-filled space with an airiness that defies its modest exterior.

The activity at the library, too, defies its small 6,600-square-foot footprint and humble demeanor, welcoming nearly 90,000 visits each year and circulating almost 72,000 items. One wonders if Gonzales imagined the impact the library would have on the community.

Acacia, located at 750 E. Townley Ave., was his second Phoenix library – Ocotillo Branch opened in South Phoenix in 1967 – and he designed libraries in Wickenburg, Scottsdale, Sedona and beyond. This represents just a small sampling of Gonzales' work,

Sunnyslope business owners give back

On a bright morning in early December, a handful of Sunnyslope business owners gathered at 3A Automotive on Hatcher Road. The purpose? To give back to one of their own: Cleo Lewis of Cleo N. Lewis Ministries.

The call had gone out: "[Lewis] is a true gem and driving force for service in our community, leading

with faith, compassion, and a heart for second chances," a community letter read. "Through his faith-based nonprofit, Cleo has dedicated years to serving first responders, veterans, and families in need. Cleo has worked tirelessly for many years – often at his own expense – to improve the lives of those around us." Lewis had invested endless hours of service in Sunnyslope, improving the community in ways that cannot be measured in dollars, the letter said, and an opportunity to give back was at hand.

His current vehicle, which was restored and donated by 3A Automotive in 2023, had served him faithfully, but

needed a new engine, and it was simply not worth the expense to repair it. To ensure his continued work, Jimmy and Nadine Alauria, owners of 3A Automotive, launched a community effort to raise \$3,000 to purchase and restore another dependable vehicle.

Giving back to the community through refurbished vehicles is nothing new for the 3A team – they have been doing it since 2008. In 2018, they launched a new community nomination process and have since given vehicles to two Sunnyslope school teachers, a homeless youth coordinator, and a neighborhood association/block watch leader. But this time was a little different, says



Light rail decision goes to council

At its Dec. 17 meeting, the City of Phoenix Transportation, Infrastructure and Planning Subcommittee voted to reevaluate high-capacity transit options to reach the West Valley, rather than move forward with an adjusted route for the already approved Capitol Light Rail Extension (CAPEX), which will serve as the connection between the existing downtown Phoenix line and the future I-10 West Light Rail Extension (10WEST).

Councilmembers Kevin Robinson (D6), Debra Stark (D3) and Jim Waring (D2) voted for the reevaluation – citing concerns ranging from state pushback to funding certainty at the federal level, among others. District 8 Councilmember Kesha Hodge Washington abstained from the vote, commenting that she wanted to hear from councilmembers in the impacted districts (4, 5 and 7) before deciding. The full council will make a decision at a Jan. 27 policy meeting. The timing is critical – an April 2026

deadline to complete the federal funding process looms.

Transit connecting the West Valley to downtown and beyond has always been part of the plan – going as far back as 1978 when the I-10 was built and a 50-foot median separating the east and westbound lanes was designat-

ed for transit use. Fast forward to 2000, when Phoenix voters passed a transit plan that included a light rail route along the I-10 corridor from downtown Phoenix to 79th Avenue. In 2004, county voters passed Proposition 400, which included an 11-mile "West Phoenix transit corridor."

After public input, much discussion and environmental assessments were made, a Capitol/I-10 West Extension route was approved in 2012. Voters approved Phoenix's T2025 plan in 2015, which also included the extension. In 2016, the Phoenix City Council phased the project into two extensions. They further reexamined the route from 2017-2019 and in 2021, approved a new route for the CAPEX that would consist of a single track loop along Washington and Jefferson, connecting from the existing downtown line to 19th Avenue, where it would jog north to Van Buren to connect with the 10WEST phase.

10WEST would run along that I-10 median until moving to the north side of the freeway before a 51st Avenue station, eventually connecting to the Desert Sky Transit Center at Thomas Road and 79th Avenue. Proposed stations on or adjacent to the I-10 include 35th, 51st, 59th, 67th and 79th avenues.

CAPEX was accepted into the project development phase by the Federal Transit Administration's Capital Investment Grant – a key process to secure the estimated 39 percent of federal funding needed.

City updates 911 protocol

People calling 911 in Phoenix are hearing a new option during the initial call intake. 911 operators on both emergency and non-emergency lines will ask callers during the call, "Do you need police, fire or behavioral health?"

Launched Dec. 15, this addition comes after the Phoenix City Council unanimously adopted a series of measures aimed at modernizing public safety services and expanding community-focused support.

If the caller requests behavioral health, operators will triage the call to determine whether a police or fire response is also necessary, or if behavioral health professionals can handle the call without assistance. When only behavioral health is needed, the call will be transferred to the Behavioral Health Dispatcher at the Phoenix Fire Department, who will deploy a Community Assistance Program (CAP) Team.

"The additional prompt will let callers know there's an option to get mental health services to someone in need," said communications bureau administrator Allie Edwards. "Our operators have been trained to ask additional questions in order to ensure the appropriate responders get dispatched."

The goal is to ensure the right help is sent to the right calls, reducing unnecessary police responses while providing faster, more specialized support for behavioral health-related emergencies.

"This enhancement represents a critical step forward in ensuring individuals in crisis can quickly and clearly identify the behavioral health services they need," said Phoenix Fire Department Community Assistance Program administrator DC Ernst.

Nadine Alauria, who, beyond being a business owner, serves in a leadership role in the HUB (Hatcher Urban Businesses) and the West Sunnyslope Neighborhood Association Block Watch.

"What he does is beyond amazing and he definitely operates on a higher level of purpose and passion," Alauria said. "We're honored to be a small part of that and bring our Hatcher businesses together to help make this happen for Cleo. He literally is saving lives every day – whether helping a mom and kids who've been living in a park or in a parking lot in their vehicle or getting people into a rehab or a hotel for the night and then connecting them with services the next day.

"Cleo is the main resource, nights and weekends. The city of Phoenix and resource partners call on Cleo when everything else is closed. A lot of us call on him – we're just so thankful and honored to know him and have him as a friend. He's a real-life angel here on earth and a hero."

The other business owners gathered that day were equally full of appreciation for the work that Lewis does in the community. And while some had never met him personally, they didn't hesitate to contribute funds to the cause. Donors in attendance at the low-key gathering included Robin Peterman and Greg Barton with Arizona Fire Features, Kim Preach Abberton with Preach Building Supply, Derek Rogers with Aqua Therapy Tubs and Jason Boysel with Symmetry Construction. Other donors included Brian Fabig with Econolite and Marcia Veidmark with SSC Underground.

The community support was heartwarming for Lewis, and he will jump right back into serving the neighborhood with the vehicle.

"What I'm going to do is a continuation of what I have been doing," Lewis said. "I store a lot of stuff – extra water and supplies – and people do a lot of riding, and I need a comfortable vehicle to do that and to win somebody's trust. This vehicle is durable; I can cover a lot of area. I already feel that I can increase my effectiveness. I am already imagining that I can carry four more cases of water – I can reach 23 or 24 more people every day and continue making contacts with people. So, I am just ecstatic."

He added, "It shows another thing: You do a lot of work and it's very tiring and sometimes you think you are all by yourself, but this community is so awesome – I am not by myself in what I do. They are alongside me in many things and this support is tangible.

"These businesspeople...we have changed this community with their support. They represent every type and part of our community, and it inspires me to watch them, and for them to contribute their resources to something that I do."

Voters have time and again supported light rail and these extensions specifically. So, why is the council once again reevaluating this route? One answer lies in SB 1102, signed into state law on Aug. 11, 2023, which

"prohibits public monies from being used to extend light rail service in Phoenix to the area of 17th Avenue on the East, Adams Street on the North, 18th Avenue on the West and Jefferson Street on the South, and any property within 50 linear yards of that area" – effectively cutting off access to the approved route.

The city and Valley Metro went back to the drawing board and came up with three alternative CAPEX routes that would satisfy the requirements of SB 1102 and allow connection to the I-10. Along with those three alternatives - created through community feedback and environmental and economic studies – came a question posed to Council: should the city choose an updated CAPEX route and stay on track with the funding request or should they reevaluate high-capacity transit options serving West Phoenix, thus stepping out of line for funding and further delaying high-capacity transit service to the area.

After the city and Valley Metro launched a fall public outreach campaign, the answer from the residents who weighed in was clear: 62 percent were in favor of moving forward with the current CAPEX timeline, which would put construction somewhere around 2028-29. The same sentiment was expressed to the subcommittee before it voted to reevaluate.

Three more public meetings will be held (two Jan. 8 and one Jan. 15) prior to the Jan. 27 Phoenix council policy meeting.

but he enjoyed designing libraries, Modern Phoenix says. Spending hours at local libraries as a youth and with aunt who was a librarian in Nogales, it seems as though he understood the value of public libraries.

Fast forward 50-plus years, and a movement is underway to preserve this Sunnyslope mainstay for future generations, spearheaded by Julia Taggart at the Sunnyslope Historical Society.

"In Sunnyslope, the first library they had was at the Desert Mission," Taggart said. "This is the second library they had, and it still has both historical and architectural integrity of Benny Gonzales, who is a world-renowned architect. It is so beautiful to see and it's one of the smallest libraries in the city of Phoenix, but it has so much heart and people love it — it's their hometown library."

It was the love that the community expressed that prompted the Historical Society to seek historic status for the library, which would protect it from future redevelopment.

She added that, while many have generational memories of going to the library, and they enjoy the diverse offerings they can find there, "not too many know the actual history of the library or the architect, which we are hoping to fix."

The community will have the opportunity to learn more about Gonzales' legacy when his son, Barney, speaks at the Sunnyslope Historical Society, 737 E. Hatcher Road, at noon on Saturday, Jan. 3, and learn more about the library

and the services that it offers at an open house event scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 10, from 9:30 a.m. to noon.

The historic preservation case is currently under staff review, said Helana Ruter, Historic Preservation officer, "We do not have an existing historic context for libraries constructed in Phoenix in the post-World War II era, so we are having to compile some research on how Acacia compares to contemporaneous libraries," Ruter said. "Should the Historic Preservation Office determine the Acacia Library property eligible for historic designation, it would go onto the Jan. 12, agenda of the Historic Preservation Commission for initiation of historic preservation overlay zoning (designation)."

For their part, the library supports the effort, says Lee Franklin, community relations director for the library system.

"Phoenix Public Library is pleased to have Acacia Library designated with this historical preservation status as it speaks to yet another unique community and generational connection the library provides to library users, neighborhoods, and members of the community," Franklin said. "The library holds a special value to so many in the community, this acknowledges and honors how the library has been relevant and responsive throughout the years, based on the needs individuals have had at any given time throughout the history of Phoenix."



County launches shelter pet nonprofit

In December, Maricopa County announced a new nonprofit that will benefit pets throughout the region. The Friends of Animal Care and Control will raise funds to enhance the resources available to pets in the community, while easing the pressure on public resources.

"I want to build a community where every dog has a home," said Thomas Galvin chairman of the Board of Supervisors, District 2. "Providing a funding source for county animal shelters beyond what's allocated in the general fund not only enables better care for animals in need, but it also saves taxpayer money. It's a win-win for both our two-and four-legged residents."

On Dec. 10, the Board of Supervisors voted to increase the expenditure authority for Maricopa County Animal Care and Control's (MCACC) Donation Fund up to \$350,000, which will allow MCACC to explore the formation of the Friends of Animal Care and Control.

"The Friends of Animal Care and Control will allow MCACC to work more closely with donors, and it will provide opportunities for grants that are only available to nonprofits," said MCACC director Debbie McKnight. "This new nonprofit will have a singular goal: funding programs and services that directly or indirectly serve the homeless pet population."

This new endeavor is one of several ways MCACC says it is working to improve care for animals in the community.

This year, MCACC also launched their Evaluation & Enrichment Team, which helps ensure dogs receive both inkennel and out-of-kennel enrichment everything from stuffed Kongs to playgroups. In March, MCACC opened the Everyday Adoption Center (EAC) inside the PetSmart in Old Town Scottsdale (www.maricopa.gov/6155/ACC-adoption-center). The EAC can house more than 40 dogs, and the convenient location has helped more animals find homes. By November, the center hit 1,000 adoptions. And in July, MCACC expanded adoption hours by two hours every day of the week, giving customers more time during their busy schedules to come find their forever friend.

AHS opens after-hours clinic

On Dec. 11, animal welfare organization Arizona Humane Society (AHS) began providing expert after-hours urgent veterinary care for owned pets at its Rob & Melani Walton Papago Park Campus, located at 5501 E. Van Buren St.

This after-hours care is for nonemergency, but time-sensitive veterinary medical needs and by walk-in only, Thursday through Sunday, 6 p.m. to 2 a.m. In its first weekend, the team saw 45 pets.

"As Arizona continues to experience a veterinarian shortage, which has led to longer waits for pet owners seeking medical care, we're excited to offer a convenient option to bridge the gap," said Dr. Melissa Thompson, Arizona Humane Society vice president of Animal Welfare and Medical Services. "Our goal is to provide trusted pet care when our community needs it the most, often after they get home from work or on the weekends. Our services are focused on conditions and ailments that cannot wait for a regular appointment with a veterinarian, things like vomiting, ear infections, urinary tract infections, minor wounds and other non-lifethreatening, time-sensitive situations."

As one of only a handful of animal wellfare organizatipoons viding urgent care, AHS is building on

its preventive and wellness services – offered through two veterinary clinics as well as mobile and online vet care options – to take another vital step in addressing Maricopa County's ongoing animal welfare crisis and keeping pets with the families who love them rather than in overcrowded shelters, the organization said.

"Pets and their owners deserve timely veterinary care," said Thompson. "The sooner a pet is seen, the better their chances of healing. When we increase access to care in our community, we help pets get the treatment they need before an illness or injury becomes overwhelming and before families are forced into heartbreaking decisions about whether they can afford to keep their pet."

Walk-ins are only available for owned pets, and veterinarians are unable to address emergency situations. If your pet needs emergency assistance, visit the closest emergency veterinary clinic. To find out what qualifies as an emergency, a list of emergency clinics in the Valley, as well as additional information about the urgent care clinic, visit www.azhumane.org/urgentcare.

Influenced by Beatles and books

Sharing a bottle of wine and tapas is a favorite way to connect with old friends and make new ones. But when the wine and tapas selections are guided by the friendly expertise of Craig and Danielle, owners, and staff at the Hidden Track Bottle Shop and Wine Bar, the wine and the food are elevated to a new level.

"We're a small but mighty shop," said owner Craig Dziadowicz. "We offer as much education about our food, wine and craft beer selections as possible, and that's one thing that sets us apart."

Dziadowicz became interested in wine when he was a teen, "People laugh because what teenager doesn't become interested in alcohol? But my interest was a bit different," he recalled. "My after-school job was working at a white tablecloth restaurant in my Wisconsin hometown. The owner asked me if I

wanted to learn bartending. I wasn't old enough to drink but I was learning all about wine – he sent me home with books about wine and how it's made, its history and how to pair it with food. I read everything he gave me.


"That was the beginning of my

career in wine and hospitality. I went on to work in the wine industry, and eventually opened my own wine bar downtown, with my partner Danielle Middlebrook, who also has long experience in the industry. Now we have opened our second location, and we really enjoy teaching our team and our customers all about wine and craft beer."

Where does the name "Hidden Track" come from? Think of the hidden tracks on an album – a concept first introduced by the Beatles. This shop offers "hidden tracks" about the wines they sell – they are different, and all have stories.

The bar and bottle shop is cozy, with couches and comfy chairs nestled in corners, and walls are lined with art and wine bottles from all over the world. Wine selections change weekly, and events like Wednesday wine tastings keep the experience fresh and fun. Dziadowicz and Middlebrook opened the first Hidden Track downtown in 2015. Their North Central location is tucked into a small development at 4700 N. 12th St.

The food? It's as interesting and as tasty as the wine and craft beer. The owners call their menu "Iberian Franco inspired, with chef-driven tapas that pair with the many different global

expressions of wine we curate." Ingredients are locally sourced organic products, and the menu varies with availability of ingredients.

Customers from across the Valley drive to Hidden Track to meet friends for happy hour, couples meet for date night and work-at-home professionals meet clients here.

"It's quiet enough to actually have a conversation, but lively enough to make you feel like you've 'been somewhere,'" said Sal Romans, who walked in from her home in the neighborhood. "I'm meeting my neighbors for happy hour. We like to stay local but we love to go 'out.' This place is perfect for us."

The shop has been named Best Bottle Shop in Phoenix, Best Wine Bar and Best Wine Shop by *Phoenix New Times* and *Phoenix Magazine*. The loyal crowd gathered on a chilly pre-holiday Tuesday was testimony to that. More than one customer purchased a bottle of wine to go, after enjoying a table of tapas and wine with friends. The outdoor patio as well as the bar and tables were almost full, and the aromas from the kitchen were spicy and added to the welcoming feel of the space.



One Camelback gets second life

For years, One Camelback sat empty – a shimmering glass landmark at the corner of Central Avenue and Camelback Road. Now, in what some insiders are calling the most important residential revival in the Valley, the landmark building has a new champion and a long-awaited second life has officially begun.

Kinella Capital, LLC, led by developer TK Stratton, has officially taken control of the stalled project – and Stratton says the building's future is no longer in question. Kinella Capital acquired the property from Acore Capital after the project stalled. 

Meet the micro-Montessori at CHS

Before 2012, families in Arizona seeking to continue a Montessori education beyond middle school had no public options – Montessori secondary programs ended after eighth grade.

"The vision behind Camelback Montessori was simple but ambitious," said Danchi Nguyen, Micro-School Leader, "to extend Montessori philosophy through high school in a tuition-free, public setting and to reimagine what high school could look like for adolescents by pairing rigorous academics with a learning environment that fosters independence, creativity and purpose."

Camelback Montessori College Preparatory (CMCP) opened its doors in 2012 as a micro-school embedded within Camelback High School, enrolling 24 students and sending two pioneering teachers through the Cincinnati Montessori Secondary Teacher Education Program, home to the first public

Montessori high school in the nation.

Today, the school serves 180 students within a campus of nearly 2,000 and is staffed by six teachers, a dedicated counselor and led by Nguyen.

"The small size allows for deep relationships while the large campus allows

rich opportunities," she said. "CMCP students participate in year-round athletics, choose from 70 and growing campus clubs, and frequently step into leadership roles that serve the entire student body – from Student Body president to lead cadet of JROTC to

president of National Honor Society."

Inside a Montessori classroom, learning begins in familiar ways. The teacher reviews a visual agenda, outlines choices for the day, and may launch into a short whole-class minilesson. From there, students take ownership of the remaining 100-minute learning block as teachers circulate to confer, coach and observe.

In English, students lay sentence strips across the floor, physically moving semicolons as part of hands-on ACT preparation. Across the hall, juniors are circled, debating the merits and flaws of the Electoral College. The room feels structured yet alive, marked by intentional choices, quiet conversation and sustained focus.

"All coursework is honors-level and college-preparatory, designed to demand both depth and independence," Nguyen explained.

Learning outside the classroom pushes students beyond their comfort zones and away from technology.



Sophomores sleep overnight during multi-day camping experiences, learning to cook meals using only two propane griddles, and applying math through orienteering challenges with compasses. At night, they gather by headlamp for Socratic seminars, discussing Maslow's hierarchy of needs and adolescent development in the dark. Biology lessons unfold outdoors, where students learn to fish while studying Arizona ecosystems.

"The work of the hands and heart is equally central," Nguyen added. "Students hand-tie hundreds of blankets each year for local homeless shelters, read weekly to peers with exceptional learning needs, and assist custodial staff with post-lunch cleanup. Through both large acts and small gestures, students learn to create the world they want to see."

College preparation culminates in voice. Juniors craft Humans of New York–inspired narratives, then stand on stage, microphone in hand, performing their personal statements for peers, families and community members. They learn listening is an act of love

and everyone has a story and know their community is one of trust and vulnerability.

The outcomes reflect the impact, Nguyen said. In the Class of 2025, 76 percent of students identified as first-generation college-bound, 91 percent enrolled in a two- or four-year college, and seniors earned \$7.7 million in scholarships, with one-third attending selective colleges out of state, including Williams, Swarthmore, Washington

University, Colgate and Davidson.

"Camelback Montessori College Preparatory represents what is possible in public education when adolescents are trusted with responsibility, supported by structure, and challenged to truly see themselves – and their power to build the communities they want to see," Nguyen added.







Senior Living Grant will support memory care training

Duet's Peer Support Program was included in the Leveraging Volunteers to Support Family Caregivers guide, highlighting how the program connects volunteer mentors with new family caregivers or those experiencing stress to provide caregivers with a listening ear and safe space to discuss their concerns. The YouthBuild Phoenix program provides at-risk youth aged 17 to 24 with the opportunity to earn their high school diploma or GED, receive job training and gain valuable work experience – all at no cost.

As part of the Chicanos Por La Causa's (CPLC) Workforce Solutions programs, the goal of YouthBuild is to provide workforce development opportunities for young people, helping participants build leadership skills, engage in community service and develop career pathways that lead to long-term success in the labor market. With a focus on construction and other handson skills training, participants work on building affordable housing in their communities.

As CPLC celebrated one the program's first graduating classes, they told

apprenticeship, gaining hands-on experience and industry-ready skills.

She is now pursuing employment that aligns with her training and she's working toward her long-term goal of joining the National Guard.

"Her dedication, determination, and vision for her future make her a standout example of what's possible when youth are given the tools and support to succeed," CPLC said.

Hannah Benally joined the program at age 23 after dropping out of high school. She described herself as having "no hope, feeling stuck and lost." However, through her determination and the support of the YouthBuild team, she began to regain motivation and a sense of direction, the organization said

Benally earned her High School Equivalency Diploma at no cost, completed Habitat for Humanity's Construction Pre-Apprenticeship Program, and gained real-world experience at residential build sites. She also earned key industry certifications including OSHA 10, CPR/First Aid, Flagging, NCCER Core, and Green Building Awareness. Today, Benally has successfully launched her career as an Industrial Apprentice at Ludvik Electric, building a stable and fulfilling future for herself.

'Pompeii' now open at Science Center

"Pompeii: The Exhibition" finishes its North American tour at the Arizona Science Center in downtown Phoenix. On view through April, the exhibition examines the lives of residents of Pompeii before and after the catastrophic eruption of Mount Vesuvius on Aug. 24, 79 A.D. Over 150 artifacts on loan from the collections of the Naples National Archaeological Museum in Italy and the Archaeological Park of Pompeii will be displayed.

Visitors to the exhibition will travel back in time to 79 A.D. when Pompeii bustled as a commercial port and strategic military and trading city. In a media-rich, object-based, immersive experience, they will learn how the people of Pompeii lived, loved, worked, worshipped and found entertainment.

On view: over 150 artifacts, including frescoes, mosaics, and statues, hidden from view and forgotten for centuries until rediscovery over 250 years ago. The sudden disaster that destroyed Pompeii also preserved it and over time archaeologists have uncovered a unique record of its daily life – roads, buildings, municipal services, paintings, mosaics, artifacts and even preserved bodies. Ongoing excavations at the site provide an ever-evolving picture of everyday life at the height of the Roman Empire.

Rock Lottery returns





Café Chat

The vibe at O.H.S.O. is vintage Sunnyslope

For Sunnyslope residents, it seems there's always been a restaurant on Central, just south of the canal. It began as Russ's Arbor, and through the decades has had a parade of different names and concepts.

Today it's O.H.S.O. & Little O's, evoking an old-time Sunnyslope vibe infused with memorabilia and historic photos, vintage table lamps, typography and graphics and a distinct midcentury modern ambience, thanks to a collaboration with the Sunnyslope Historical Society.

"It took us nearly two years to renovate the building," said General Manager Vinny Francini. "The society did all the photo wallpaper in the café, the timeline, the original menu from Russ's Arbor – they had it all for us and did a really great job. One of our owners who worked with them was pretty blown away by all they had."

The restaurant opened in March 2024. It's part of the group that began in Arcadia and has grown to include locations in Arcadia, Gilbert, North Scottsdale, Paradise Valley, Sunnyslope, Surprise and Sky Harbor and Mesa Gateway airports, the latter three in partnership with KIND Hospitality.

The Sunnyslope O.H.S.O. reflects its Arcadia origins, located on a canal and handy to bike and walking paths.

"I would say this store is maybe the most specific to the neighborhood, because of the history of the building and us being tucked in the neighborhood," Francini said. While O.H.S.O. got its start as a brewpub, there isn't a brewery on-site at the Sunnyslope location.

There still is a strong connection with beers and spirits, however, with a multitude of O.H.S.O. labels on tap, and custom cocktails made with O.H.S.O. spirits. During Arizona Beer Week in February, they'll do doughnut days, with tastings of six to 12 doughnut-inspired beers, such as blueberry or Boston Cream, paired with treats from Bosa Donuts. Then on March 14, Pi Day, they'll do something similar with pies.

The Sunnyslope O.H.S.O. is unique among the group in another

way, Francini said, the only one with a Little O's café and retail shop.

At Little O's, starting at 7 a.m., seven days a week, customers can stop in after a walk or bike ride, cool off with beer, wine and cocktails, pick up apparel and other merch, order breakfast at the quick service counter, and pop open the laptop to do some work or streaming at the outdoor tables.

"People drop in all day," Francini said. "Kids come in after school for an energy drink and pizza. It's very much a neighborhood vibe."

At 11, the restaurant opens for full-service dining and what may be the longest happy hour in town.

"We've always been known for our happy hour," Francini said. It stretches from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday for drinks, including all the Arizona-made beers at \$8 for a 32-ounce pitcher. The food happy hour is 3 to 6 p.m. including pizzas and a "plain Jane" Burger.

"Our menu is unique from the other four O.H.S.O.s.," Francini said. "We're the only one serving pizza."

On Saturdays and Sundays, the restaurant opens for brunch at 9 until 2 p.m., then goes back to the regular lunch and dinner menus.

"Our menu is pretty big, so we have a lot of options," Francini said.

Customer favorites include the hot pastrami sandwich, blackened salmon, and deviled egg toast – deviled egg salad on country loaf toast, topped with

crispy prosciutto, bagel seasoning and chili oil, served with a salad of corn, sun-dried tomatoes and arugula. Then there's the buffalo chicken dip, served with tortilla chips; the AZ burger with jalapeño cream cheese, poblano aioli and crispy onion strings; and pizzas including hot honey pizza with white sauce, the house four-cheese blend, pepperoni, ricotta, crushed meatballs, caramelized onions, pesto, red chile flakes, fresh basil and hot honey.

And if all that makes you thirsty, there are O.H.S.O.'s beers, including Popcycle Blonde fruit beer, Park Life Mexican-style lager and Handlebar Hefe wheat beer; and cocktails made with O.H.S.O. spirits, including the bloody Mary served with homemade beef jerky, and made with a choice of vodkas including Arcadia Horseradish, Arcadia Rosemary and Arcadia Jalapeño versions.

At lunch and dinner, the patio is a favorite spot. It's also dog-friendly, with a special entrance with a dog bar with water taps, and dog treats made from the spent grain from the brewing process.

"We've always been dog-friendly," Francini said, "dogs, bikes, beers, casual and neighborhood friendly."

Now owned by James Beard-nominated brothers Mike Mastro and Jeff Mastro, along with their father Dennis Mastro and longtime business partner Scott Troilo, the next chapter begins for the legendary restaurant, which opened in 1950.

Durant's has been closed while the restaurant was restored and underwent a year-long renovation. The ownership team — who also own and operate Dominick's Steakhouse, Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Steak 48 and Ocean 48 in cities across the country — completed the refresh of the restaurant just in time for its 75th anniversary.

All the finishes and everything from the kitchen to the dining rooms have been restored, including a brand new and high-end gourmet kitchen, new signature red booths, the iconic red walls, plus refurbished vintage neon signs and even the famous pink exterior paint has been redone, the team said. 
