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## PMPC puts civic stewardship into action

The Greater Phoenix area wouldn't be known as the Valley of the Sun without the natural mountain boundaries that surround it. And in the city of Phoenix, the more than 41,000 acres of preserve land found in the smaller interior mountain ranges would not exist without forward-thinkers and collective effort. While Phoenix has a robust parks system, continued stewardship can be a heavy lift. That is where Phoenix Mountains Preservation Council (PMPC) steps in.

Any land designated as preserve within the boundaries of the city of Phoenix, which includes the Phoenix Mountains Preserve, South Mountain Preserve and Sonoran Preserve, fall under PMPC's advocacy efforts, said Stacia Hurst, board secretary for the organization.

"The Phoenix Mountains Preserve grew out of a grass roots movement, which began more than 50 years ago and continues today," Hurst said. "It has become a cause in which ordinary people are deeply and emotionally involved."

Efforts by individuals to save the mountains within Phoenix began in the early 1960s, but coalesced into a group effort when the Phoenix Mountains Preservation Council was founded in August, 1970.

"From land preservation to public education, the work of PMPC reflects a shared promise: that the Phoenix Mountains will remain open, protected and

## Collaboration helps robotics team find its way

Kevin and Lauren Locker were looking for a volunteer opportunity where they could lend their skills and their time. Sunnyslope's Desert View Elementary School had eager learners who needed an opportunity to expand their horizons. When they came together last fall, all of the pieces clicked – literally.

"We became acquainted with the school through our church, Scottsdale Bible Church," Kevin said. "They have adopted a couple of schools in the area, to help out wherever they can. One of the Desert View staff members came to our church campus and I asked, offhand, if they were interested in doing any kind of STEM after school program. It was something that I had done previously. He was really excited about it – they had never done anything like that at their school."

Kevin is a recently retired semiconductor engineer. After spending 20 years at Honeywell Aviation, another 10 years designing semiconductors elsewhere, then the last 12 years at Intel working as a chip

architect – he had a lot of knowledge to pass on, and a willingness to give back to the community. As did his wife, Lauren, who picks up the story.

To gauge the student interest in creating a FIRST LEGO League team, the couple attended the parent-teacher open house at Desert View prior to the beginning of the 2026-27 school year.

"We set up a display at the open house and talked to parents," Lauren recalled. "And, of course, whenever you have LEGOs out, students are just drawn like bees to honey."

Next, they sponsored two days of LEGO game day

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

### Light rail decision will impact North Central

With a 7-2 vote on Jan. 27, the Phoenix City Council chose to re-evaluate high-capacity transit options for west Phoenix and prioritize the proposed West Phoenix corridor along Indian School Road, putting a halt to current project development and the Capital Investment Grant process for the Capitol Extension (CAPEX).

The decision shifted away from the much-anticipated CAPEX project, which would serve as a connector between the existing downtown line and the future I-10 Extension. Both of these extensions have been supported by voters on multiple occasions, and there was significant support at the January meeting to stay on track with the projects, which could have seen completion by 2029 and 2033-34, respectively. There were also dozens of Indian School Road business owners who showed up to voice their opposition to light rail on that arterial road. Although, through the Valley Metro online survey, many expressed Indian School Road as a preference.

District 4 Councilwoman Laura Pastor, in a social media post following the meeting, said, "Last night, I voted in support of the Capitol Extension. West Phoenix and Maryvale deserve timely investment and the same opportunities other parts of the city have received. The decision made last night halted progress on a voter-approved project, put federal funding at risk, and stepped away from years of community feedback that helped shape the Capitol Extension. While this vote did not go the way I hoped, my commitment to fighting for equitable transportation investment in our communities has not changed."

For their part, the city of Phoenix said that they and Valley Metro "remain committed to advancing high-capacity transit to west Phoenix to meet significant demand, support mobility in this corridor and to continue to deliver upon the community's vision for transit and transportation."

The city added, "We will advance planning of the West Phoenix corridor along Indian School Road. Comprehensive community engagement will be central to this work, ensuring we hear from all residents, business owners and stakeholders along the corridor as we develop solutions that serve the needs of west Phoenix."

As the focus shifts to Indian School Road, the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) route approved in 2024 will need refined to select a connection point to the existing light rail in central Phoenix. As of its adoption by the city council (May 2024) and Valley Metro board (June 2024), that connection could be either at Central Avenue and Indian School Road or at 19th Avenue and Camelback Road, which would travel a mile south to Indian School Road. From there, the roughly 10-mile extension would travel to 75th Avenue, turning south to Thomas Road and terminating at the Desert Sky Transit Center.

Next steps will include a more refined right-of-way assessment, preliminary engineering including station locations and a refined operating plan. Construction could begin by 2032-33, with completion estimated in 2036-37.

events and invited interested fourth, fifth and sixth graders. Through Kevin's contacts at Arizona State University, they created LEGO pits, where students could build anything they wanted. Alongside that were robotics activities that would be used in the League.

"So, they got to dip their toes in the water and see what it would be like to be part of a team," Lauren said. Then, working with the school principal, John Mospan, and the after-school coordinator, they put together a team of 10 students, dubbed the Wayfinders.

The League competition has four aspects. First, there is the actual Robot Game – a timed event where the students take their designed robot and attachments and place it on a 4-foot by 8-foot game map where it autonomously interacts with a set of mission models.

"They do the programming, they do the designing of the attachments, they do the building; they're involved in every step of that process," Kevin said.

The team also is assessed on the robot design – how innovative it is; the way that the students solve the mission – not just the game score, but the process behind the solution; and the innovation project – where the kids have to solve a problem that aligns with a theme. This year, it was archaeology. With the Lockers leading and support and mentorship from members of the Brophy Robotics team, the students got to work.

Fast forward to the second week in December, when the Wayfinders attended the regional competition and earned second place out of 28 teams. This put them on a path to attend the state championship in January, where they earned fourth place overall among 66 teams.

In the Robot Game event, the rook-

ie Wayfinders scored an impressive 420 points – an increase of 70 points from their regional competition score and the third-highest total recorded at the championship.

Another big part of the League is demonstrating its six core values, said Lauren: Discovery, Innovation, Impact, Inclusion, Teamwork and Fun.

"We really saw them grow in these areas – they really caught on to that. It was one of the best parts of the whole season."

The students also found future inspiration – one sixth grader, who won the Innovation Award after visiting an archaeological site, said that he wanted to build the team idea when he grows up... "I want to be an engineer," he told the Lockers. Another student, who won the Most Valuable Teammate award at the end of the season, "rose as a natural leader," the coaches said.

John Mospan, who has served six of his 11 years in the Washington Elementary School District as principal at Desert View, explained what this kind of program means to his students.

"Our school is 98 percent free and reduced lunch, which means that we have an overwhelming majority of students that are facing challenges that some of their more affluent peers don't face," he said. "We have high confidence in all of our students. But they might not have the same opportunities that some of their peers have. So, bringing in this robotics club was a chance to provide them with some opportunities to really excel and shine in other ways that our district curriculum or our current school activity couldn't provide."

Beyond technical skills, the program offers an opportunity for students to develop life skills.

"The students are learning about what it means to develop teamwork, that camaraderie to work as a group and maybe achieve a goal that you could not achieve on your own," Mospan added. "And they're developing that skill within them that we hope will be able to translate for continued development and continuous growth over the course of the years to come."

As a small neighborhood school with only 275 students, Mospan says being a part of the community and connecting with the community is a big part of the school's identity – and its success.

"It's too hard for us to do the work that we're doing, which is critically important work, in isolation," he said. "We need to work together as a team, just like our students do in this club where they're developing that teamwork mentality and working collaboratively."

Beyond ongoing partnerships with community organizations, the principal points to his team as part of the success equation.

"Over the last five years, our teachers have worked tremendously hard to support their students and have changed the school from a 'C' rating to an 'A' rating and then last year achieving an 'A+' rating. That speaks volumes to the hard work that our teachers and our staff have done to support our students."

And he had high praise for the Lockers, who have volunteered their time – spending two hours a day, twice a week for the past 20 weeks – and want to bring the program back next school year. After-school funding is always in question, the Lockers said, but they have been supported by generous sponsors this year, including Elaine Michaud, the FIRST Lego League Arizona representative, and Anna Prakash, the co-founder of Education

Empowers, in addition to their church. And the parents themselves were hugely supportive, Kevin said.

"The big encouragement for me was all of the people that rose to the challenge, saw the value in this and just made it possible for all this to work," he said.

Lauren added, "I think that Desert View is a real bright light in Sunnyslope. It's a really wonderful community and we're privileged to be a part of it."

cared for. This is civic stewardship in action, where love of place becomes responsibility, and responsibility becomes legacy.”

That understanding of community responsibility is part of what makes the organization unique. Their board is volunteer-led and their 80 members include hikers, conservationists, rangers and rescue teams, educators and volunteers, neighbors who live at the base of the mountains and families discovering desert ecology for the first time. PMPC brings these diverse voices together in collective action.

In the last year, PMPC strengthened partnerships that bring stewardship to life, Hurst explained. Working alongside the Save Our Mountains Foundation and the North Mountain Visitor Center, the organization supported educational and conservation-focused events that welcomed new audiences into the preserves. Behind the scenes, advocacy continued for land acquisition and preservation efforts, ensuring that key parcels remain public, protected and

free from incompatible development.

In 2026, the organization will continue to focus on building long-term resilience for both the preserves and the people who use them. That includes addressing one of the most pressing challenges the organization says is facing the Phoenix Mountains: the strain caused by extreme heat and inconsistent trail infrastructure.

“High use, undocumented trails, outdated mapping and limited signage contribute to safety risks, rescues and environmental degradation,” Hurst said. “These challenges affect not only park users, but also rangers, first responders, and nearby neighborhoods. At the same time, pressures including land misuse, rezoning efforts and incompatible development proposals, pose serious risks to ecological health and long-term preservation.”


Other 2026 goals include supporting the development and implementation of a comprehensive Trails Master Plan with the Parks Department; expanding educational programming; increasing memberships, donations and event volunteer crews; and acquiring volunteer crews to lead GIS mapping and updates of unused land parcels between residential areas and preserve boundaries.

Residents who would like to connect with PMPC will find them at the Libby Goff Memorial Seed Ball Toss & Hike, scheduled for Saturday, March 14 at 9 a.m.

The organization also partners with Save Our Mountains Foundation for the Festival in the Mountains each October, that highlights authors, creatives, small businesses, guided hikes, educational workshops and wildlife education. The community driven event serves a fundraiser to benefit the overhead costs of operating the North Mountain Visitor Center and Save Our Mountains Foundation projects and mission.

But the Windsor Square Home Tour is more than just a home tour, it's a full-day community experience.

"Visitors are encouraged to stroll the tree-lined historic streets, browse jewelry, crafts and other offerings from local vendors at the street fair, and enjoy live music in a relaxed outdoor setting," organizers said. "The popular beer garden provides the perfect place to gather with friends, while food trucks offer a variety of lunch options throughout the day."

Just steps away, guests can also explore the shops and restaurants at Uptown Plaza, making the event an ideal opportunity to experience the best of North Central Phoenix in one outing.

Whether an architecture enthusiast, a lover of historic homes or simply looking for a vibrant and enjoyable day in one of Phoenix's most charming neighborhoods, the Windsor Square Home Tour is not to be missed.



## City proposes waste rate increase

The Solid Waste Division of the Public Works Department is expecting a budget shortfall of \$20.8 million this fiscal year. To address this shortfall and to keep revenue on pace with expenses in the future, they are recommending a multi-year fee increase.

The Public Works Department has presented a plan to City Council that would adjust the residential solid waste rate, which they say is needed to keep up with rising operating costs. The proposal outlines a \$6 monthly increase for 2026 and 2027, and \$5 for 2028. They are also proposing an increase the optional curbside green organics collection subscription fee to one-fourth of the applicable monthly Solid Waste rate, effective July 1.

The last time a solid waste rate adjustment was approved was in 2020. Since then, the department says that staff costs have risen 32 percent, vehicle costs have gone up by 52 percent, and construction and maintenance costs for critical infrastructure have increased by 40 percent. During the same time period, the monthly solid waste rate only increased by 2 percent annually.

If a rate increase does not go into effect to start the fiscal year in July 2026, the city says that the Public Works Department would be unable to provide solid waste collection and disposal services as they currently exist. The alternative to a rate increase would be large reductions in service.

Residents are invited to attend any of the community info sessions scheduled this month – with two presented in Spanish and one virtual only – where

they can hear directly from Solid Waste representatives and have their questions answered. In North Central, a session will be held Tuesday, March 10, 6 p.m., at Washington Activity Center, 2240 W. Citrus Way.

## Pool fence program promotes child safety

In 2024, 79 adults and kids died from drowning in Maricopa and Pinal counties. That is the highest number since records started being kept in 2005, according to Child Crisis Arizona. To combat this crisis, the non-profit organization is partnering with Salt River Project (SRP), State Farm, the Independent Pool & Spa Service Association, Inc. and local firefighter charities on its 5th Annual Pool Fence Safety Program.

Through this initiative, now through April 5, Child Crisis Arizona welcomes parents or caregivers who are financially unable to afford pool barriers and have young children to apply for a free pool fence.

Families living in Maricopa County can apply for a free pool fence if they meet certain eligibility criteria. With applications available in both English and Spanish, those interested can apply on the organization’s website, [www.childcrisisaz.org/what-we-do/pool-fence-program](http://www.childcrisisaz.org/what-we-do/pool-fence-program). 
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### Who We Are

### City budget hearings begin

The Phoenix city manager is scheduled to present the 2026-27 City Manager's Trial Budget for Phoenix City Council consideration Tuesday, March 24. The meeting, which will be held at City Council chambers and broadcast online, begins at 2:30 p.m. The Preliminary 5-Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) will also be presented.

### Photo enforcement citations start in March

In late January, the city of Phoenix announced that photo safety cameras would be returning to Phoenix roadways on Feb. 23. A total of 17 speed-monitoring cameras will be placed at various locations throughout the city aimed at changing driver behavior, supplementing traffic enforcement efforts by Phoenix Police and complementing the city's other Vision Zero strategies.

"The Photo Safety Program is an important step forward in our commitment to reducing fatalities on Phoenix roads," said Street Transportation Director, Briiana Velez. "Photo safety cameras are just one resource towards safer roadways – I'm proud that we are implementing a program that strengthens our safety efforts and aligns with our Vision Zero Action Plan."

The Photo Safety Program will include nine camera locations that will rotate through corridors with histories of speed-involved crashes. Camera locations will rotate after a six-month period. Eight additional cameras will be placed in 15-mph school zones, rotating weekly throughout the school year.

In and around the North Central area, corridor cameras will be placed mid-block at the following locations:

- Thunderbird Road: 35th Avenue to Interstate 17; Interstate 17 to 19th Avenue
- 7th Street: Thomas Road to Indian School Road
- Camelback Road: 24th Street to 32nd Street

The program will include a 30-day warning period, which began Feb. 23, during which violators will be sent warning notices instead of citations. Enforcement with citations will start

March 25, for drivers exceeding the posted speed limit.

The city says that the Photo Safety Program is focused on increasing roadway safety and not generating revenue. It operates on a cost-recovery system, any remaining funds will be invested in implementing the city's Vision Zero Road Safety Action Plan ([www.phoenix.gov/roadsafety](http://www.phoenix.gov/roadsafety)).

"Our goal is to reduce fatal collisions, and this technology is a proven tool to help achieve that," said Phoenix Police Commander Nicholas Diponzio. "Helping everyone who lives, works and visits Phoenix reach their destination safely."

### Airport offers early bag check

Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport began offering Early Bag Check on Wednesday, Feb. 11. The free service is operated by Bags, a Metropolis company. It allows passengers to check their luggage before arriving at the terminal, helping them travel lighter and more easily on the PHX Sky Train and save time by skipping airline ticket counters, according to an announcement by the city of Phoenix Aviation Department.

Passengers flying domestically on the following airlines can use the service: Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest and United. Early Bag Check counters are located at the Rental Car Center and East Economy Parking and are open daily from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m., including holidays.

In addition to checking bags, passengers can also print their boarding passes at the Early Bag Check counters. Depending on the airline, passengers may check up to two bags per person. While there is no additional fee for the service, airline baggage fees still apply. Bags must be checked at least 90 minutes before the scheduled departure and no more than four hours before the flight, per airline policy.

“We were at a team meeting and here I was, the new girl working as a hostess, admonishing servers: ‘Stop dropping the lemon wedges! They cost money!’ After the team meeting, the manager said ‘Come with me. We need to talk.’ And of course, I thought I was in trouble. But no, he liked what I had said because, apparently, lemon wedges do cost money. He put me on the management track and I learned so much. I had found my sweet spot. And now? Here I am remaking a hair salon,” she said.

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

### Sister Lynn to retire after 52 years

Sister Lynn Winsor, BVM, Xavier College Preparatory's longtime vice principal and athletic director, will retire in June after 52 years of service to the school. She announced her decision to Xavier's faculty and staff in late January, noting that "after prayer, reflection and meetings with my Sisters at the Xavier Convent and our BVM leadership" (the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary), she concluded that it is time to "pass the baton – and to support Xavier from the sidelines."

She served as Xavier's athletic director for 49 years before stepping down in August and naming the school's associate athletic director, Tui Selvaratnam, to the position. She currently serves as the school's vice principal for Activities and Athletics.

A proud alumna of both Xavier and Arizona State University, Sister Lynn has dedicated more than five decades to building the top women's high school athletic program in both the state and the nation; advocating for Title IX opportunities for female athletes; serving the Arizona Interscholastic Association, the Arizona Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association, and the National Interscholastic

Administrators Association in numerous capacities; and incorporating the Catholic faith, kindness and sportsmanship into athletics and activities across the state and the nation, the school said.

Because of her dynamic leadership throughout the decades, Xavier was recognized by Niche.com in both 2025 and 2026 as the best all-girls high school for student-athletes in America – and the fifth best among all of America's high schools. Her astounding record of state and regional championships in the school's numerous sports has brought national recognition to Xavier's teams, securing many millions of dollars in athletic scholarships for the school's student-athletes.

Throughout her tenure, Xavier's teams have won 163 state championship titles and 73 state runners-up honors. Xavier's golf team, which Sister Lynn coached for 47 years, holds the national record for high school state championship titles (40). Among the most recent highlights of her myriad awards and recognitions were her inductions into the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame (2023) and the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association Hall of

Fame (2021). She was also honored as the USA Today Studio IX Trailblazer Award (2025), the Arizona Republic's Most Influential Woman in Arizona Sports (2022), and as the NFHS Title IX Woman Trailblazer of the Year (2021). She is the first religious Sister in history to receive these awards.

Sister Lynn concluded her announcement to the Xavier community by saying, "I love you all, and I will always be a part of Xavier College Preparatory. God Bless and Go Xavier Gators!"

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



## Café Chat

### A sensory symphony at Thai E-San

At Thai E-San, a server brings a bubbling bowl of coconut soup to a table as a cloud of steam – fragrant with coconut milk, lemon grass, ginger, curry, mushrooms and fish sauce – wafts behind her, causing heads to turn at nearby tables. A burner under the metal bowl keeps the soup piping hot as diners dip in.

That aroma just adds to the sensory symphony that is Thai E-San. Opening the front door, the air is perfumed with aromatics that form the basis of the cuisine, including lemongrass, kaffir lime leaves, Thai basil, galangal, ginger, cilantro and curry.

Owner Pui Pongtratic is at a table nearby, chatting with customers who are digging into a plate of pad Thai – a beautifully balanced dish of chewy rice noodles tossed with tamarind, Thai soy sauce, scallions, mung bean sprouts, fish sauce and crunchy peanuts.

Moving to another table, Pui urges the guests to try the chicken satay, juicy skewers flavored with coconut milk and those aromatics, and served with peanut sauce and cucumber sauce. During her interview for this article, she continually springs up to welcome new arrivals, greeting most of them as old friends.

Pui and Rodger Pongtratic opened Thai E-San in 2011, naming it for Isan, a region of northeast Thailand. Rodger retired a couple of years ago and today, their daughter, Jan Pongtratic, helps to manage the marketing, sales and other business aspects of the restaurant.

Rodger and Pui were immigrants in Los Angeles, when they met and married. Rodger worked in insurance and Pui worked at a bank.

“My dad had a conference at the Biltmore and loved the area, and they moved here,” Jan said. They bought several businesses in the Valley, including the Bali-Hi Motor Hotel, a 60-room hotel with a 24-hour restaurant, owning it from 1980 to 1988.

They had other jobs as well, Pui as an interpreter for the state and Rodger pursuing his love of the West, especially vintage Levis. Western culture and clothing are popular in Thailand, and Rodger started a business exporting Western duds to Thailand and bringing back Thai art, another of his special interests.

“When my sisters and I were younger, we were either working at food festivals because Mom wanted to be with us, or were sourcing vintage Levis,” Jan said. “We thought it was so terrible at the time but now it’s cool.”

They eventually sold the Bali-Hi and retired, but that didn’t last long. Pui was at lunch with a friend when she discovered the Thai restaurant where

they were dining was for sale. “I was bored,” she said, so she bought it. Rodger did the interior design for Thai E-San, selecting traditional Thai art as well as more modern paintings.

From the first, forming close ties to their customers was a priority, Jan said. “It’s not that we just know the customers, but we know their kids, their whole family, if they went on vacation. We want to have a high-return clientele.”

That personal touch is the garnish on the main attraction at Thai E-San: a menu so extensive that it would take weeks of steady dining to work through it. The coconut soup is a can’t-miss selection.

“This is one of the most popular foods in Thailand,” Jan said. “Thai food makes your taste buds dance, and I think coconut soup is one of the best representations of that because it has all the flavors – sweet, spicy, salty, sour and umami.”

Other favorites include that satay and pad Thai; green papaya salad; larb (ground chicken, pork or beef with rice powder, lime juice and mint); spicy green beans with phrik-khing curry paste made with lemongrass, galangal, shrimp paste and kaffir lime leaves); yellow curry; and a deliciously refreshing Thai iced tea.

Tuesday and Thursday, rice soup, a sort of porridge, is served with the lunch special, and some customers come just for that soup, Pui said.

The selections highlight fresh ingredients – a result of Pui’s meticulous shopping. As often as three times a week, she’s picking the freshest produce. On trips back to L.A., she’ll pick up several bags of fresh Thai chilis, kaffir lime leaves and lemon grass grown by friends, along with her favorite brand of coconut milk.

“Thai people are really big about relationships, and some of the vendors treat her like a mom,” Jan said. “They’ll say ‘this is the best bag of Thai basil I saved for you.’ Every mango is hand-picked. Every dish is made to order. Chicken broth is made from scratch – it’s all the little things.”

When Jan came back to Arizona from California 10 years ago, she began to modernize some of the restaurant’s operations, for example, transitioning from old-style credit card payment systems to computerized operations and online ordering.

She also suggested that Pui do some

ordering in bulk, but that didn’t make it off the ground. Pui’s old-school passion for freshness and authenticity is definitely remaining on Thai E-San’s menu.

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
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
